INTRODUCTION TO THE MASS

Today we celebrate the feast of the Holy Spirit, Pentecost, and the birthday of the church. Today the disciples, were given the gifts of the Holy Spirit, who were so timid and frightened, are now bold and courageous and are ready to be the messengers of His love and peace. As we prepare ourselves for this Eucharistic celebration, let us be sincerely sorry for our failure to be true agents of His love and peace. We ask forgiveness from God and from one another for our failure to be agents of His peace.

FIRST READING (ACTS 2:1-11)

The disciples, who were behind the closed doors for fear of the Jews, are now filled with the power of the Holy Spirit. Now they can boldly preach among the people, and people are bewildered because each one heard them speaking in their own language.

SECOND READING (ROM 8:8-17)

St Paul says that the Holy Spirit gives us the power to say that Jesus is Lord, and gives us different graces and gifts for our lives and for the working in the Church.

GOSPEL (JOHN 14,15-16;23-26)

Jesus advises his disciples to keep his commandments and the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, will be sent to them.

THEME: Every Christian is called to be an agent of His peace.

First Reading

Acts 2:1-11 (JB)
A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages.

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Second Reading

Romans 8:8-17 (Year C) (JB)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God.

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live. Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory.

GOSPEL REFLECTION PENTECOST SUNDAY John 14:15-16, 23-26

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit totally transformed the apostles, changing everything. Once cowardly, confused and lacking in confidence, they became convinced, certain and clear after receiving the Holy Spirit. The old creation gave way to the new.

Do you long for a greater glimpse of Jesus' glory? Do you thirst for a greater outpouring of the Spirit for yourself, the Church and the world? If the answer to these questions is a resounding 'Yes', be assured that this is the work of the Spirit. Just as a lover delights in showering gifts upon their beloved, so too God blesses and anoints his people with his Spirit.

The Spirit is given so we can live out our vocation, so we can live a life in the Spirit. At the dawn of creation God breathed his life into his disciples, saying, 'Receive the Holy Spirit' (John 20:22). Our capacity to receive the Spirit is determined by our attitude. The Spirit retreats from self-reliance, self-confidence and self-assurance, but is quick to comfort the broken-hearted, the poor in spirit, the needy and the humble. The disciples were filled with the Spirit because they were empty in themselves.

The gift of the Spirit at Pentecost is a recurring event in the life of the Church. Today we can receive and enjoy the Spirit in a new and exciting way. Don't be afraid to cry out, 'Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful.' What can prevent us from being filled with the Spirit is that we rely too heavily on our own ability, not necessarily realizing that even this is given to us by God. Our confidence in ourselves is often greater than our confidence in God! We need to be humbled by our own limitations and overwhelmed by our own weaknesses so that we can pray with heartfelt conviction:

'Renew your wonders in this our day, as by a new Pentecost. Grant to your Church that, being of one mind and steadfast in prayer with Mary...and following the lead of blessed Peter, it may advance the reign of our Divine Saviour, the reign of truth...justice...love and peace.' (Pope St John XXIII)

Continuing Pope Francis' message to Catechists, Pope Francis said "When one of St. Francis' followers asked to be taught how to preach, the saint responded by saying: "Brother, when we visit the sick, help children and give to the poor, we are already preaching. In this beautiful lesson is enclosed the vocation and task of the catechist," he said, explaining that catechesis is not simply a job or a task external to the person of the catechist. Rather, "their whole life revolves around this mission," he said, noting that to be a catechist is "a vocation of service in the Church, which is received as a gift on the part of the Lord and must in turn be transmitted."

Free training to all Catechists continues this week. The next session will be held face-to-face at Pennant Hills on Monday 20th June 9:30am – 2:30pm 'Encompassing Music, Stories and Drama in the Classroom'.



The new Diocese of Broken Bay World Youth Day website is live with Bishop Anthony Randazzo inviting the youth of the Diocese to join him on pilgrimage to Italy and then on to Lisbon, Portugal for WYD23.

Young people aged between 16 and 35 can register their interest at https://bbwyd.org.au/

To be held in August next year, World Youth Day is the gathering of young people from around the world with the Pope.

It is a celebration of youth, the universal Church and evangelisation.

Prior to the global event, Bishop Anthony will lead a group of students and young adults on a pilgrimage through Italy in July to some of the holiest sites and homes of our saints.

The group will visit Venice, Padova, Ravenna, Bologna, Florence, Siena, Assisi, Cascia and St Peter's Basilica in Vatican City and Rome before flying to Lisbon in Portugal.

"The theme for WYD23 is 'Mary arose and went with haste' (Luke1:39) and I implore all our pilgrims who join me to be filled with the same excitement and wonder for their own encounter with Christ and His Church as we journey to Lisbon, "Bishop Anthony said.

"I am very much looking forward to leading a group of enthusiastic, passionate young people from our Diocese to a number of holy sites in Italy, onto Lisbon and then to Fatima for a retreat. It will be a truly memorable experience."

During the week of 1-6 August '23, Lisbon will host numerous celebrations and faith events. While clear in its Catholic identity, WYD is open to all youth of the world, no matter how close or distant they are from the Church.

St John Paul, while Pope John Paul II, was inspired to establish World Youth Day in 1986 following the Church's Youth Jubilee in 1984 and the United Nations International Youth Year in 1985. It has been a much-loved and hugely successful event every three years although WYD last year was postponed to the COVID-19 pandemic.

SAINT OF THE WEEK St Ephrem, Deacon and Doctor

Feast Day: June 9

C. Early Fourth Century—373



Patron Saint of spiritual directors The Harp of the Holy Spirit

The Councils of Ephesus in 431 and Chalcedon in 451 ended a centuries-long scorpion dance. Bishops, theologians, and scholars from Egypt to Syria had long circled one another with suspicion, stinging their enemies with sharp words and pointed tongues. Did Jesus Christ have one or two natures? If two natures, were they joined in His will or in His person? If united in His person, at conception? Was He one person or was He two? Smart, educated men defended every shade of every subtlety of every complex question with all of their considerable skill. The answers hacked out at Ephesus and Chalcedon, whose hurly-burly political intrigues were less than inspiring, answered the relevant questions definitively, establishing orthodox teaching for all time. The theological language coined during those fifth century debates is still familiar to the Church today: *hypostatic union, monophysitism, Theotokos*, etc.


Today's saint, Ephrem, was active a century prior to the great conclusions and clarifications of the fifth-century Councils. Although Ephrem did not deviate from what later Councils would explicitly teach, he used far different language to communicate the same truths, anticipating later teachings through poetry. Saint Ephrem was a poet and a musician first and foremost. His language is more beautiful, compelling, and memorable because it is metaphorical. Exactness in words risks dryness. You can say that the average density of the air in the ship's hull eventually equaled the average density of the surrounding water. Or you can say that the ship sank like a stone to the ocean floor. You can write that a day's high dew point caused the air's water vapor content to slow evaporation. Or you can write that it was so hot and humid that people melted like candles. The Church can teach that we eat Christ's body and blood in the Holy Eucharist. Or we can speak directly to Christ with the poet Ephrem and say, "In your bread hides the Spirit who cannot be consumed; in your wine is the fire that cannot be swallowed. The Spirit in your bread, fire in your wine: behold a wonder heard from our lips."

The Councils of Ephesus and Chalcedon taught that the one person of Jesus Christ united in Himself a fully divine nature and a fully human nature from the moment of His conception. Saint Ephrem wrote "The Lord entered (Mary) and became a servant; the Word entered her, and became silent within her; thunder entered her and his voice was still; the Shepherd of all entered her and became a Lamb..." Poetry, metaphor, paradox, images, song, and symbols. These were tools in Saint Ephrem's nimble hands. Theology for him was liturgy, music, and prayer. He was called the Harp of the Holy Spirit, the Sun of the Syrians, and the Column of the Church by his admirers, who included luminaries such as Saints Jerome and Basil.

Saint Ephrem was a deacon who declined ordination to the priesthood. He lived radical poverty, wearing a patched and dirty tunic. He had a cave for his home and a rock for his pillow. Ephrem founded a theological school and was deeply involved in catechesis through preaching, liturgy, and music. He died after contracting a disease from a patient he was caring for. Saint Ephrem is the Church's greatest Syriac language writer, proof that Christianity is not synonymous with the West or European culture. Ephrem's world thrived for centuries with its own unique Semitic identity in today's Syria, Iraq, Iran, and India. Saint Ephrem's Syria was not the "Near East," as Europeans later called the region. To him, it was home, the deep cradle of the new way of loving God that was, and is, Christianity. Saint Ephrem was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Benedict XV in 1920.

Saint Ephrem, you wrote tenderly and lovingly about the truths of our faith. Help all Christian artists to stay true to the Truth and to communicate Jesus Christ to the world through beauty, music, and images that raise the mind and lift the heart to God Himself. Amen.

The month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart. The Church actually celebrates the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus on Friday 24 June this year, 19 days after Pentecost. It is a "moveable feast", celebrated after the Corpus Christi octave. Devotion to the Sacred Heart is one of the most widely practiced and well-known devotions, taking Jesus' physical heart as the representation of His divine love for humanity – emphasising the unmitigated love, compassion and long-suffering of the heart of Christ towards humanity.

This feast wasn't always on the calendar and took many centuries before it was established and spread throughout the world. St Margaret Mary Alacoque, a French nun and mystic, received private revelations from Jesus on 16 June 1675, asking her to specifically promote a feast that honoured His Sacred Heart.

The first time there was a liturgical feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus was on 20 October, 1672. The first country to institute a liturgical feast was Poland and then in a decree from the Sacred Congregation of Rites on 23 August 1856, Pope Pius IX established the feast for the universal Church.

St John Paul II, a great devotee of the Sacred Heart, said: "This feast reminds us of the mercy of the love of God for the people of all times." The faithful are encouraged to discover the riches hidden in the Heart of Jesus that gives hope and trust and to love our neighbours.
