
Matthew 28:16-20

St. Philip Neri

Feastday: May 26

Birth: 1515 Death: 1595

Canonized: March 12, 1622 by Pope Gregory XV

Born in Florence (Italy) in 1515. Died at Rome on this day in 1595. An outstanding proponent of Church reform after the Council of Trent. Worked among the young and the poor in Rome and founded the Congregation of the Oratory. Remembered as a spiritual director, for his pastoral initiatives, and for his humour, simplicity, and charity.

He is the patron saint of Rome, US Special Forces, humor and joy.

REFLECTION - PENTECOST

Pentecost is both a private and a public event. Jesus breathes the Spirit of God upon the disciples, which not only renews the lifeless spirits of the disciples but also causes them to go forth and renew the world—to breathe life into a spiritless world.

The Acts of the Apostles records this in a dynamic way (see 2:1–11). The gift of the Holy Spirit that Jesus gives to the disciples manifests itself by transforming a group of cowering individuals into a vital force that boldly proclaims the Gospel of Jesus the Christ. Emboldened and accompanied by the Spirit of God, the disciples preach the Good News to anyone who will listen, without allowing the consequences to diminish their zeal.

Like the disciples, we are sent out to preach, teach, heal, and prophesy—using all our gifts, strengthened by the Holy Spirit— to renew the world.

We are to make God, who is love, apparent to the world through our words and deeds.

An excerpt from Bishop Anthony Randazzo's letter regarding Stage 1 Re-opening:

In respect to our own context, we can note the following which is possible from Friday 15 May 2020. Each of these provisions is contingent on

practising social distancing of 4 square metres per person and hand

hygiene through the ready use of sanitiser.

- Churches are able to be open for private prayer, with a limit of 10
- people in the church at any one time plus celebrant.
- Religious gatherings, either formal or informal, are permissible inside churches for groups not more than 10 people. The names of each person at the gathering must be recorded.
- **Weddings** may be permitted for a group of 10 people. Further clarification received from the NSW Premier's Office has been received advising that the couple and the celebrant are not part of the group of 10 people. Therefore it is permissible for a wedding to include the celebrant, the couple and 10 guests.
- Funerals may be permitted for groups of 20 people indoors or for 30 people outside, practising social distancing of 4 square metres per person and hand hygiene through the ready use of sanitiser at church entrances.

EASING OF RESTRICTIONS

Message for BBNeighbourhoods 26 May 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

In a sermon on Pentecost Sunday given by Pope Leo the Great in the fifth century, the Pontiff and Saint reminded the faithful, "The Spirit's work is still continued in the Church".

He said that it is the Spirit who "sanctifies the whole Church and quickens every rational soul". The same Spirit "is the Inspirer of the Faith, the Teacher of Knowledge, the Fount of Love, the Seal of Chastity, and the Cause of all Power". (cf. Pope Leo the Great, Sermon 75)

These wise and sensible words are as valid today as they were in the fifth century. The great challenge that each one of us faces is to believe them and in so doing, to allow the Spirit to use us in His work of the renewal and the sanctification of our Church and our world. The Spirit is at work in the community of the Church in Broken Bay and in each one of us, his faithful disciples.

Sometimes, there is a temptation to make our faith something rather sophisticated by quoting rules and regulations or theological essays or articles. Do not get me wrong, I am not anti-education. I am the first to encourage people to read more about the faith, to study more deeply, what we believe. However, if our newly acquired knowledge tempts us to think that we are sophisticated in the faith, the temptation might also be to establish a false hierarchy of discipleship where some are perceived to be "better" than others. That is something to be avoided.

As we approach the great feast of Pentecost this Sunday, might we see these days as a time of preparation for faithful discipleship? I think that in a simple kind of way God desires to reveal to us, the living disciples of Christ, the action of His Spirit in us and in our community.

It is encouraging to remember that the Spirit is given to all people – men and women, girls and boys, young and old, weak and strong. Saint Paul reminds us that the Spirit will come to our aid in our human weakness. During his mission and ministry, Paul was constantly confronted with difficulties, challenges and resistance. And yet, he constantly emboldened the community by reminding them that the Spirit enlightens our minds and hearts so that we might hear the words of Jesus, and in this way we will be led – and we will also lead others – to the all-embracing encounter with God our Father.

Over these coming days, I pray that the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit will be with you and your families.
