# First Reading: Acts 5:12-16 (JB)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles The numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily.

The faithful all used to meet by common consent in the Portico of Solomon. No one else ever dared to join them, but the people were loud in their praise and the numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily. So many signs and wonders were worked among the people at the hands of the apostles that the sick were even taken out into the streets and laid on beds and sleeping-mats in the hope that at least the shadow of Peter might fall across some of them as he went past. People even came crowding in from the towns round about Jerusalem, bringing with them their sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and all of them were cured.

#### **Second Reading:** *Revelation 1:9-13, 17-19 (JB)* A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever.

My name is John, and through our union in Jesus I am your brother and share your sufferings, your kingdom, and all you endure. I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the Lord's day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.' I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lamp-stands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One. I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

### GOSPEL John 20:19-31 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain,

they are retained.' Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord,' he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you,' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

DO NOT BE AFRAID. I am the First and the Last. REVELATION 1:17



"To prefer nothing to the love of Christ" Rule of St Benedict, Chapter 4.

GOSPEL REFLECTION Sunday, April 27 Divine Mercy Sunday Acts 5:12-16 Psalm 118:2-4, 13-15, 22-24 Revelation 1:9-13, 17-19 John 20:19-31

Do not be afraid. (Revelation 1:17)

Anyone would have been afraid! Most Jewsbelieved that if they saw the glory of God face-to-face, they would die. This explains why St. John, who wrote the Book of Revelation, collapsed to the ground when he was brought into the presence of the "one like a son of man" (Revelation 1:13). Even John, who had walked with Jesus, witnessed his Transfiguration, lain his head on Jesus' breast, and watched as he ascended to heaven, was overwhelmed!

Jesus' response to John is perfect for today's celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday: "Do not be afraid" (Revelation 1:17). He didn't tell John that there was *no reason* to fear; he touched him, offered a word of encouragement, and raised him up. That expression of love and intimacy overcame John's fears and enabled him to stand before his glorious Lord. That's what mercy is all about! It's the perfect love of God, which "drives out fear" (1 John 4:18).

This is the same mercy Jesus showed to Thomas in today's Gospel. Thomas doubted the resurrection because he hadn't seen it with his own eyes. But Jesus came and invited Thomas to touch his wounds and "believe" (John 20:27). Like John, Thomas experienced a mercy that saw his unworthiness and still drew him close.

We can experience that mercy, too. Jesus knows that in the light of his glory, we are all frail and flawed. He knows that in the light of his truth, we often doubt and distrust. He knows we are not worthy to come to him on our own merits. Yet in his power and holiness and glory, he is patient with us. As he did for Thomas, he sees our weakness and shores up our faith. As he did for John, he calms our fearful hearts and assures us of his love.

So don't be afraid to come to Jesus today. Don't be afraid to let him see you as you truly are. Come and hear him say, "Do not be afraid."

"Jesus, thank you for the depths of your mercy!"

# SAINTS OF THE WEEK

# Saints Philip and James, Apostles

Feast Day: May 3

Saint Philip: c. 4–c. 80 Patron Saint of hatmakers and pastry chefs Saint James: First century B.C.–c. 62 Patron Saint of pharmacists and the dying

Since the sixth century, the Apostles Philip and James' relics have rested in the Church of the Holy Apostles in Rome. The two Apostles are honored with one feast.

Philip was one of the Twelve, most likely a follower of John the Baptist who knew that John pointed to Jesus as the Messiah. He might have been Simon Peter and Andrew's brother, making him a fisherman by trade. The day after Jesus invited the brothers to follow Him, Jesus said to Philip, "Follow me" (John 1:43). Philip obeyed and told his friend Nathanael that they had found the Messiah. Nathanael was reluctant, saying, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Philip replied, "Come and see" (John 1:46). When Nathanael came and saw, he professed his faith in Jesus as the Messiah and followed our Lord from that time forward, witnessing Jesus' first miracle at Cana. In John's Gospel, Philip tells Jesus that two hundred days' wages would not buy enough to feed the crowd of 5,000 (John 6:6). Philip also comes up in connection with Greek-speaking Gentiles who want to see Jesus (see John 12:21), indicating that he could speak Greek and was known to the Greek community. At the Last Supper, as Jesus spoke about the Father, Philip said, "Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us", to which Jesus gently responded, "Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me, Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:8–14).

Traditions say that after Pentecost, Philip preached in Greece, Phrygia, and Syria, being crucified upside-down or beheaded at an old age in Hierapolis, Phrygia, modern-day southwest Turkey.

James was also one of the Twelve, sharing a name with James, the son of Zebedee. Today's saint is James the Less or James, the son of Alphaeus. His mother was possibly Mary of Clopas, the Blessed Virgin's sister, making James a first cousin to Jesus. In Scripture, he is referred to as Jesus' "brother" because it was common at that time to refer to cousins and other relatives as brothers and sisters. In Mark's Gospel, Levi (better known as Matthew) is also referred to as the son of Alphaeus (Mark 2:14) which could make James and Matthew brothers.

In his letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul relates that the Lord appeared to James after His Resurrection ( $\underline{1}$  <u>Corinthians 15:7</u>). After Pentecost, James became the first bishop of the Church in Jerusalem. The Acts of the Apostles relates that James oversaw the First Council of Jerusalem and declared the final judgment on behalf of Peter (see Acts 15). Eusebius, a fourth-century bishop, wrote about James' martyrdom, "...he was thrown from the pinnacle of the temple, and was beaten to death with a club." Traditionally, James the Less is believed to have been the author of the New Testament letter of James that gives encouragement in trials and persecutions, exhorts, warns, and ends by speaking of the power of prayer.

Saints Philip and James, you were blessed to be Jesus' companions, listening to Him preach, witnessing His miracles, and receiving from Him a commission to continue His work. Please pray that I will come to know our Lord and Savior through prayer and the Holy Scriptures, so that I will be prepared for the mission that God has for me. Saints Philip and James, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.
