SELF REFLECTION: LOVE & JOY

Sundays' Gospel, John 15:9-17, Jesus said "This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you."

When you really love someone you want them to be filled with joy. Joy is the essence of love. To love something is to enjoy it, to delight in it. As Christ remains in us and we receive His love we experience great joy as we delight in Him and His love for us. We lose that joy when we lose sight of Jesus.



Do I love others as Jesus loves me?

Am I willing to lay down my life for my friends by giving my time and energy?

Do I experience great joy knowing Jesus loves me?

Help me love others as You love me. Teach me that it is okay to lay down my life for my friends by giving my time and energy. Help me to always have spiritual joy knowing You are abiding in me as I abide in You. Amen.

First Reading: Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48 (JB)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

The gift of the Holy Spirit was poured out upon the gentiles also.

As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up', he said 'I am only a man after all!'

Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.'

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Sunday, May 5 Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48 Psalm 98:1-4 1 John 4:7-10 John 15:9-17

God is love. (1 John 4:8)

A statement like "God is love" can sound so abstract! But in today's second reading, John follows up this revelation with a second one: God's love is revealed to us in Jesus, who offered himself on the cross "so that we might have life through him" (1 John 4:8, 9). And as Jesus tells us in today's Gospel, we, too, are called to lay down our lives for one another out of love (John 15:13).

But unlike Jesus, we usually aren't called to literally die for someone. So what does it actually look like to lay down our lives for another person?

Today's first reading from Acts gives us a model. A Roman centurion named Cornelius invites Peter to come to his home in Caesarea, about a thirty-five-mile walk. Peter knows it is "unlawful for a Jewish man to associate with, or visit, a Gentile," yet he goes anyway (Acts 10:28). When he begins preaching the good news to them, the Holy Spirit falls on Cornelius and the rest of the people gathered there, and they are "baptized in the name of Jesus Christ" (10:48).

Peter was doing what Jesus had commanded when he said, "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12). He was laying down his life for these former enemies by listening to the Spirit's leading, taking the time to journey to Caesarea, entering the centurion's house, and then going out on a limb to baptize Gentiles.

Each day we are presented with opportunities to lay down our lives for one another out of love. It might cost us our time or our energy. It might require courage, patience, or forbearance. We might have to step out in faith. But as we do these things—even those that seem routine or mundane—we are making the abstract truth that "God is love" into a living reality. We are revealing God's love to the world.

"Holy Spirit, open my eyes to those times today when I can love someone as you have loved me."



SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint John of Avila, Priest & Doctor of the Church Feast Day: May 10

C. 1499-1569



Patron Saint of Spanish priests

John of Ávila was born on the Feast of the Epiphany in Almodóvar del Campo, Spain, less than a decade after Spain was liberated from almost 800 years of Muslim rule. His parents, who had struggled to conceive, attributed John's birth to the intercession of Saint Bridget of Sweden.

At age fourteen, John left to study law at the University of Salamanca, but after four years, he had a profound conversion experience and returned to his parents' home for three years of prayer and discernment. Obeying a call to the priesthood, John began his theological studies in 1520. John was smart, a good student, and devoted to the Holy Eucharist. When he returned home in 1526, he was ordained a priest and celebrated his first Mass in his home parish. John received a large inheritance when both of his parents died. Finding twelve poor people in the streets, he invited them to share a feast with him before selling the property he inherited and giving his money to the poor.

Father John's desire to be a missionary in the New World was waylaid when his devout celebration of the Mass, preaching, and catechetical approach drew admiration in Seville. The Archbishop of Seville convinced Father John to remain in Spain to help revive the faith severely damaged by centuries of Muslim rule and the confusion that was emerging from the Protestant Reformation.

At the age of thirty, Father John of Ávila began his ministry in the town of Andalusia. He often preached on repentance and the value of Confession, preparing for his sermons and celebration of Mass with long periods of prayer. After sermons to an overflowing congregation, he would enter the confessional, remaining there for hours until all who wanted to confess their sins could do so.

Living a life of radical poverty, Father John preached about the dangers of excessive wealth. Some local clergy, comfortable in their lavish lifestyles, reported Father John to the Inquisition. Arrested and imprisoned for a year, he translated the book, Imitation of Christ, and wrote much of his famous book Audi, filia (Listen, O Daughter), a spiritual masterpiece on Christian perfection and the universal call to holiness. The Inquisition found him not guilty, and he was released in 1533. For the next eighteen years, Father John engaged in active ministry in Andalusia and the surrounding towns. After experiencing ill health in 1551, he lived in semi-retirement until his death in 1569.

Throughout his ministry, Father John became a saint among other saints. He mentored Saint Ignatius of Loyola and inspired many young men to join Ignatius' newly founded Society of Jesus. He advised the great Saint Teresa of Ávila on her writings. Saint John of God was converted by John of Ávila's preaching and then founded the Brothers Hospitallers, a religious congregation devoted to the poor, sick, and mentally ill. Father John also left behind his spiritual classic Audi, filia, eighty-two sermons, Scripture commentaries, 257 letters, and various other minor works on reform in the Church in the spirit of the great Council of Trent in which he participated.

Saint John of Ávila, God used you to transform southern Spain during a most difficult time in the history of the Church. You prayed and devoted yourself to God's mission that bore much good fruit as a result. Please pray that I will see those around me as my mission field and will work tirelessly to set a holy example and guide them by the words you inspire me to share. Saint John of Ávila, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.

THE NEED TO CARE FOR WOMEN

The surge in domestic violence cases sparked rallies around Australia at the weekend with people protesting the appalling number of deaths.

Twenty-eight women have been killed by their partners or former partners so far in 2024 and Australians have rightly said "enough is enough".

May 1 is the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker, a man who epitomised the best of what men can be. When Mary told Joseph she was pregnant, he could have walked away or become angry knowing he was not the biological father, but he did not.

He stayed true to Mary and raised Jesus as his one and only son. Joseph the carpenter, devoted husband to Mary and loving father to Jesus is a fine example of how men should live their lives, providing love and support to their families.

It is important to note that while domestic violence mainly affects women, men can also be victims.

Victoria police say they arrest around 80 men a day over family violence that include homicides, assaults, stalking and property damage, and have responded to 94,000 incidents in the past 12 months. The situation is frighteningly similar in other states and territories.

There is no easy answer to ending domestic violence but it's up to all of us to call it out wherever we witness it or hear of it. Staying silent is not the answer.
