HE IS RISEN!

HE IS TRULY RISEN!

First Reading: Acts 10:34, 37-43 (JB) A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil.' Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 5:6-8 (JB)

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians Throw away the old yeast, that you may be new dough.



You must know how even a small amount of yeast is enough to leaven all the dough, so get rid of all the old yeast, and make yourselves into a completely new batch of bread, unleavened as you are meant to be. Christ, our Passover, has been sacrificed; let us celebrate the feast, by getting rid of all the old yeast of evil and wickedness, having only the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

Gospel Acclamation Alleluia, alleluia! Christ has become our paschal sacrifice; let us feast with joy in the Lord. Alleluia!

Why look among the dead for someone who is alive?

GOSPEL: Luke 24:1-12 (JB) A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke



On the first day of the week, at the first sign of dawn, the women went to the tomb with the spices they had prepared. They found that the stone had been rolled away from the tomb, but on entering discovered that the body of the Lord Jesus was not there. As they stood there not knowing what to think, two men in brilliant clothes suddenly appeared at their side. Terrified, the women lowered their eyes. But the two men said to them, 'Why look among the dead for someone who is alive? He is not here; he is risen. Remember what he told you when he was still in Galilee: that the Son of Man had to be handed over into the power of sinful men and be crucified, and rise again on the third day?' And they remembered his words.

When the women returned from the tomb they told all this to the Eleven and to all the others. The women were Mary of Magdala, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James. The other women with them also told the apostles, but this story of theirs seemed pure nonsense, and they did not believe them.

Peter, however, went running to the tomb. He bent down and saw the binding cloths, but nothings else; he then went back home, amazed at what had happened.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Sunday, April 20 The Resurrection of the Lord Acts 10:34, 37-43 Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23 Colossians 3:1-4 John 20:1-9/Luke 24:1-12

They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him. (John 20:2)

What a glorious day! It's Easter Sunday, the day of the resurrection. Only Jesus isn't showing up! In fact, today's Gospel reading focuses on an *absent* Jesus. Mary Magdalene, Peter, and John are confronted with an empty tomb, and they don't know where he is. So rather than rejoicing, they are disappointed, bewildered and scared.

These three disciples didn't know what happened to Jesus, but we do. In just a short time, he will greet Mary Magdalene and commission her as to proclaim the good news (John 20:16-18). Later that day, he will appear to Peter and the apostles and breathe the Holy Spirit on them (John 21:17). And he will appear to them again and again before ascending into heaven (Acts 1:3).

But we don't hear any of those stories today. Instead, we're waiting outside the empty tomb. We believe that Jesus is risen, but we don't see him. We have experienced our sin being washed away, but we still fall sometimes. We get occasional glimmers of the heavenly life that awaits us, but we also know times of darkness and fear. And so we live somewhat precariously, always at risk of falling to temptation.

So why bother rejoicing today? Because Jesus truly *is* risen, whether we see him or not! Because he truly *has* defeated death, and we truly *do* belong to him. Because we *will* see him one day. And until that day comes, we can experience his Spirit filling us with God's love and gradually transforming our hearts.

Today truly is a glorious day—not because we have come to the end of our journey, but because we know that the risen Christ is walking beside us. Step by step, he is leading us to the throne of God—to a glory that will far surpass our wildest dreams!

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint George, Martyr

Feast Day: April 23

Died c. 303



Patron Saint of agricultural workers, soldiers, archers, equestrians, chivalry, peacekeeping missions, sheep, shepherds, scouting, England and many other countries, cities, and dioceses Invoked against skin diseases and syphilis

Very little is known about Saint George, other than his martyrdom by the Roman Emperor Diocletian for refusing to renounce his faith and offer sacrifice to the Roman gods. Devotion to him spread from the Eastern Empire to the Western Roman Empire. Over the centuries, he became the patron saint of more than a dozen countries, as well as cities and dioceses. In the thirteenth century, his story appeared in the *Golden Legend*, a popular medieval devotional on the lives of the saints. During Black Death in the fourteenth century, many Europeans sought Saint George's intercession.

According to the eleventh-century Greek monk Symeon of Metaphrastes, Saint George and his mother moved from modern-day Turkey to Lydda, Palestine, near modern-day Tel Aviv, when George's father died. There, George joined Diocletian's army and advanced to the rank of colonel.

Around 299, when a pagan Roman religious ceremony failed to predict the future, Diocletian blamed the Christians. In 303, he issued an edict ordering the destruction of churches, burning of Scripture, and a ban on public worship. Christians, especially those in the military, who refused to offer sacrifice to the Roman gods faced imprisonment or death.

Hearing of the edict, George seized a copy, tore it up, and personally confronted the emperor, professing his faith and chastising Diocletian for his cruelty. George was immediately arrested and jailed, and the emperor attempted to convert him to the pagan Roman gods. When George refused, he was tortured. He miraculously survived having heavy blocks of stone placed upon his chest and being tied to a spinning wheel that sliced his flesh with knives. When Diocletian tried to entice George with promises of favors, George responded, "I despise your promises and do not fear your threats. The emperor's power is of short duration, and his reign will soon end. It is better for you, to acknowledge the true God and to seek His kingdom." The next day, George was led through the city and then beheaded. His powerful witness was said to convert many Roman pagans.

Saint George is the patron saint of soldiers, especially after visions of him inspired Christian armies during the first Crusade. In England, King Richard the Lionheart visited a church dedicated to Saint George on his way to battle. About 250 years later, King Edward III named Saint George as the patron saint of England.

A Golden Legend story left Saint George with the nickname "Saint George the Dragonslayer." A fierce dragon lived in the province of Libya, in the town of Silene. The villagers fed it two sheep every day, but when the sheep failed to suffice, they selected one villager each day, along with a sheep. One day, the lot fell on the king's own daughter. As she went out to give herself to the dragon, Saint George rode in on horseback, slew the dragon, and converted the entire town to the Catholic faith, with about 15,000 men receiving baptism. The legend can be seen as a parable with the devil symbolized by the dragon, meant to encourage Saint George's intercession when confronting the worst of evils.

Saint George, the blood you shed won for you the power to intercede before God on our behalf. I turn to you today and beg your intercession. Please slay the evil in my life and win for me victory in Christ. Saint George, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.
