GOSPEL REFLECTION Luke 6:17. 20-26

Blessed are you. (Luke 6:21)

Jesus' words to the crowd sounded innocent enough at first. Who wouldn't want the poor, the hungry, and the sorrowful to find blessing? Surely they've suffered enough!

But then Jesus went on: "Woe to you who are rich... Woe to you who are filled ... Woe to you who laugh" (Luke 6: 24,25)

Questions probably started swirling in the people's minds when they heard these words. Did Jesus really want people to be unhappy? Were the successful going to be judged harshly just because they had a good life? But Jesus wanted his hearers to ask a different question: Which group do I fit in? Why have I come here today?

The poor, the hungry, the sorrowful: these are the ones who know their need for Jesus. They know they have nothing on their own that can truly satisfy them. And so they come to Jesus so that he can fill the emptiness in their hearts.

The rich, the comfortable, the happy: these are the ones who don't feel much need for Jesus - at least not in the way the others do. Maybe they had come that day to see what all the fuss was about or to listen to an interesting speaker. They had not come to be filled - and certainly not to be challenged like this!

Of course, Jesus wasn't condemning out of hand anyone who fell into the 'rich' category. He was offering them a chance to change. He was asking them to make room in their hearts for him and his teaching.

You can ask yourself similar questions in Mass today: Why have I come here? Am I here to be fed and filled up? Are there areas of my life where I feel comfortable keeping Jesus at arm's length?

Jesus is waiting for you today. He wants to give you the riches of his mercy, the joy of his love, the Bread of eternal life. So come to Him hungry and empty. Come and let Him fill you.

Lord, help me to be humble before you. Let me hear you say to me, 'Blessed are you'.

A word on translation: Greek's exclamatory makarios, equivalent to Hebrew 'esher that is found mostly in Psalms (e.g., Ps 1:1 and Ps 40[39]:5), mostly translates as *happy* or *blessed*, and also be *fortunate*, *lucky*, and *glad*, but none is without shortcomings. Happy is awkward for the oxymoronic "Happy are those who weep", but neither does blessed indicated having been blessed. The expansion of the final one (the plus one) in both Luke and Matthew may point in the right direction, for they switch to the imperative *Rejoice*. If we re-read the beatitudes then as beginning "Let the poor or hungry or weeping rejoice, for you will..." we see that it is not being poor or hungry or sad that is being praised, but the salvation this is coming, and is now being announced in the mission of Jesus. In the same way in Luke's woes it is the coming correction and not currently being rich or well-fed or happy that is a woe. It does not suggest that the coming good fortune or correction is to be in the hereafter. Indeed Christianity should never be considered like opium for the suffering, impoverished masses, that is, a sop to make oppression bearable; it demands making things right now. Nor is this contradicted in our second reading with Paul telling us that "If our hope in Christ has been for this life only, we are the most unfortunate of all people." While he affirms the future orientation, that is with fulfilment after death, he also rejects that idea that following Christ is merely to make us feel better in this life. This point is then emphasised in the final beatitude and woe: true prophets do not tell people how nice things will be in the future, but rather they call people to correction here and now, and for that they suffer rejection in the here and now. The mission to set the downtrodden free is active, not merely the uttering of platitudes.

POPE FRANCIS ENCOURAGES EVERYONE TO PRAY FOR PEACE IN UKRAINE



Pray for the Ukraine . . .

As the situation escalates in Europe over fears of a Russian invasion of Ukraine, Pope Francis has issued an urgent plea to all people of goodwill to pray for peace. "Please, no more war!" Pope Francis addressed these words to all political leaders on the Catholic Church's day of prayer for peace (26 January 2022) and asked the world to pray that "this land may see fraternity flourish and overcome wounds, fears, and divisions." Prayer for Peace:

"Lord God of peace, hear our prayer! We have tried so many times and over so many years to resolve our conflicts by our own powers and by the force of our arms. How many moments of hostility and darkness have we experienced; how much blood has been shed; how many lives have been shattered; how many hopes have been buried... But our efforts have been in vain.

Now, Lord, come to our aid! Grant us peace, teach us peace; guide our steps in the way of peace. Open our eyes and our hearts, and give us the courage to say: "Never again war!"; "With war everything is lost". Instil in our hearts the courage to take concrete steps to achieve peace.

Lord, God of Abraham, God of the Prophets, God of Love, you created us and you call us to live as brothers and sisters. Give us the strength daily to be instruments of peace; enable us to see everyone who crosses our path as our brother or sister. Make us sensitive to the plea of our citizens who entreat us to turn our weapons of war into implements of peace, our trepidation into confident trust, and our quarrelling into forgiveness.

Keep alive within us the flame of hope, so that with patience and perseverance we may opt for dialogue and reconciliation. In this way may peace triumph at last, and may the words "division", "hatred" and "war" be banished from the heart of every man and woman. Lord, defuse the violence of our tongues and our hands. Renew our hearts and minds, so that the word which always brings us together will be "brother", and our way of life will always be that of: Shalom, Peace, Salaam! Amen.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order Thirteenth Century

Feast Day: February 17



Invoked to aid in the imitation of the charity and patience of Our Lady of Sorrows

Group dynamics encourage fidelity to individual good intentions

There are many reasons to join a group. To quilt, play soccer, learn chess, travel, or meet new friends. We accomplish personal goals in a group that we would never accomplish alone. Groups create positive peer pressure for their members to show up on time, read the book, do the exercise, or complete the task assigned. When we join a group we are freely creating obligations for ourselves, because we know, deep down, that accountability to others encourages fidelity to our own obligations.

The groups of the medieval world were called guilds. Craftsmen of similar skills and professions organized in guilds to learn, promote, and protect their trade. Guilds offered mutual assistance to their members that no individual could replicate. There was power in numbers. Today's feast commemorates seven young men who belonged to a merchant guild in Florence, Italy, in the 1200s. These seven men were serious Christians. They loved God and the Church. And in addition to protecting their commercial interests by joining a guild, they also protected their souls by joining a local spiritual guild called the Confraternity of the Blessed Virgin, where their spiritual exercises were guided by a wise and educated priest who encouraged their devotion.

After the members of the Confraternity experienced mystical visions of the Virgin Mary, there was nothing left to do except abandon their worldly concerns, set aside money for their families to live without their help, and flee the busy city for a solitary life in the nearby mountains. The Seven fasted, prayed, and lived lives of such extreme austerity that a visiting cardinal admonished them to stop living like dogs. Over time they adopted a rule, accepted new recruits, elected leaders, and spread throughout Italy and beyond. They eventually took the name of the Order of Servants of the Blessed Virgin Mary, also known as the Servants of Mary, or Servites.

The Seven Holy Founders were especially devoted to the Seven Sorrows of Mary, and the Servites were instrumental in the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows becoming part of the Church's calendar on September 15. The Sorrows of Mary, the sword that pierced her heart, the tears she shed when witnessing Our Lord's passion and death, motivated the Seven Holy Founders to promote devotion to Mary under this title. Mary was strong and stood at the foot of the cross. But she was also a mom who loved her boy. So she had a heavy heart that continually pondered what His suffering meant. We unite in joy at Christ's resurrection on Easter and join with Mary's sorrow just days before. The emotions of Scripture become the emotions of those who read it and those who live it in the liturgy and devotions of the Church.

The names of the Seven Holy Founders are known. But the Church celebrates them as a group, with their individuality ceding to their group identity. Together they accomplished more than seven men working separately could ever have accomplished. Their confraternity became an Order, and that Order still exists for the mutual spiritual benefit of all, a theological guild holding its members to high standards of spiritual perfection. Servite priests and brothers are still active in various countries around the world, hundreds of years after the Order's founding. This is a testament to the immovable, rock solid, foundation on which its Seven Holy Founders constructed their spiritual and theological home.

On your feast day, our thoughts and prayers turn to you, the Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order. Help us to find mutual support and assistance in loving God and Mary through a holy alliance with like-minded Christians. Through your intercession and example of group love of God, may our love for Him burn hotter and longer than a single flame.
