

SELF-REFLECTION: ETERNAL LIFE

This Sunday's Gospel, John 3:13-17:

This passage reminds me that Jesus came to save, not condemn. It challenges me to trust in His love and show that same grace to others.

I reflect:

- Do I truly believe that Jesus came to save me, not condemn me?
- How do I respond to God's love in my daily life?
- Am I quick to judge others, or quick to show grace?
- Do I live with the confidence of being saved through Christ?
- How can I share God's love more openly with those around me?



Loving Father, thank You for sending Your Son, not to condemn the world, but to bring salvation through Him. Help me to trust fully in Your love, to live with faith in Your promise of eternal life, and to reflect Your grace in how I treat others. May my words and actions point people to the hope I have in Christ. Amen

THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

First Reading: Numbers 21:4-9 (JB) A reading from the book of Numbers

When those that were afflicted looked upon it, they were healed.

On the way through the wilderness the people lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Responsorial Psalm: Do not forget the works of the Lord!

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11 (JB)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians He humbled himself, therefore God had exalted him.

The state of Jesus was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross.

But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens. on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of the Father.

Gospel Acclamation


Alleluia, alleluia! We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you, because by your cross you have redeemed the world. Alleluia!

GOSPEL John 3:13-17 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John The Son of Man must be lifted up.

Jesus said to Nicodemus: 'No one has gone up to heaven except the one who came down from heaven, the Son of Man who is in heaven: and the Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world. but so that through him the world might be saved.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

FEAST OF THE EXALTATION YEAR C

Num 21:4-9 / Phil 2:6-11 / John 3:13-17

Today's feast invites us to see the Cross not simply as a reminder of suffering, but as the very sign of God's love and victory. In the Book of Numbers, the people of Israel, punished by serpents, found healing when they looked upon the bronze serpent lifted up by Moses. This image points us to Christ, who in the Gospel says that He too must be lifted up on the Cross so that all who believe may have eternal life. St. Paul, in his letter to the Philippians, shows us the depth of Christ's humility: though He was in the form of God, He emptied Himself, became human, and accepted even death on a cross—because of this, God exalted Him. The psalm reminds us that despite human sin and forgetfulness, God remains compassionate and merciful.

Together, these readings reveal the paradox of the Cross: what once symbolized defeat now shines as the instrument of salvation.

Key Thought: The Cross is the meeting place of God's mercy and our hope—through it, suffering is transformed into life, and death into victory.

Take-Home Challenge: This week, when you see a cross, pause to remember not only Christ's suffering but also His love that brings healing, hope, and new life.





SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Hildegard of Bingen Virgin and Doctor of the Church

Feast Day: September 17

c. 1098 - 1179



Saint Hildegard of Bingen was born to parents of lower nobility in

Bermersheim vor der Höhe, in Franconia, modern-day Germany. Her father served Count Stephan II of Sponheim. Hildegard, her family's tenth child, was offered to the Church as a tithe by her parents when she was eight years old, as was the custom. She was given to the Benedictine monastery at Disibodenberg, twenty-five miles from her hometown, and cared for by Jutta von Sponheim, Count Stephan II's daughter.

Jutta, later abbess of the women's branch, taught Hildegard basic catechism and enough Latin to pray the Psalms and Divine Office. She formed Hildegard's faith, devotion, and asceticism. Hildegard learned to play the psaltery, a primitive form of the harp. Of noble descent, Jutta and Hildegarde inspired other noble girls to join them. After seven years, Hildegard took the Benedictine veil at age fifteen and became abbess in 1136 when Jutta died. By 1150, she had moved her growing community to Rupertsberg, near Bingen, and, in 1165, established a second monastery at Eibingen.

Despite Hildegard's limited education, she was highly intelligent. Her knowledge was infused by what she referred to as "the shadow of the living light." This "living light" came in the form of mystical visions and inspirations from an early age. Until she was in her forties, she mostly kept these mystical experiences to herself—absorbing, pondering, and allowing them to grow and deepen. Her Teacher was the Holy Spirit, giving her a divine infusion of Truth that led to a supernatural understanding of mysteries of the faith and revelation, along with insight into the natural sciences.

In 1142, Abbess Hildegard intensely sensed God commanding her to write her visions and share her divinely infused knowledge. She spent the rest of her life transcribing all that she understood by this infusion of the living light. Her first work, completed in 1151, described twenty-six visions with her commentary, known as *Scivias*—"Know the Ways." These visions and commentaries touch on every aspect of faith, from the creation of the world to the end of time.

Hildegard spent the next twenty-eight years writing, completing two more visionary works in which she dealt with virtue and vice, God's relationship with man, and God's activity in the world. She wrote in detail on natural sciences, medicine, and women's health, despite her lack of formal education. She also wrote on the saints and the Rule of Saint Benedict. She penned numerous letters to popes, emperors, abbots, and abbesses. As an artist and musician, she illustrated and composed beautiful hymns. Many, with their soaring melodies and beautiful harmonies, are still sung today.

The universal Church frequently called upon Abbess Hildegard for counsel. Unusual for women, she preached in public squares and cathedrals. Pope Eugene II and Saint Bernard of Clairvaux examined and approved her writings. Pope Benedict XVI declared Hildegard a saint and Doctor of the Church in 2012, even though she had informally been recognized as a saint since the time of her death.

Saint Hildegard of Bingen, in your humility and simplicity, God raised you up and gave you the gift of supernatural knowledge about Heaven and earth's deepest mysteries. Please pray that I will be open to the truths God reveals to me and will use that knowledge as the basis of all my choices. Saint Hildegard of Bingen, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.
