### **SELF REFLECTION**

Luke 13:22–30 is a powerful passage where Jesus talks about the narrow door and the urgency of truly following Him. He warns that many will try to enter but won't be able to because they waited too long or assumed they were safe just by association with Him.

This passage challenges me to examine the sincerity of my faith. Am I truly walking with Jesus, or just going through the motions? It's easy to assume I'm on the right path, but Jesus reminds me that knowing about Him isn't the same as knowing Him. I'm reminded to live out my faith with humility, urgency, and authenticity—not just relying on religious habits or past experiences. I want to be among those who enter through the narrow door, not just standing outside wishing I had taken Him more seriously.

Lord Jesus, You call me to enter through the narrow door—to follow You with all my heart, not just in words but in how I live. Help me not to assume I'm close to You just because I've been near religious things. Search my heart, God, and show me where I've grown complacent or proud. Give me the humility to repent, the courage to obey, and the grace to keep walking in Your truth.

May I not be found outside knocking, but inside - because I knew You, trusted You, and followed You.

First Reading: Isaiah 66:18-21
A reading from the prophet Isaiah

They will gather all of your people from all nations

The Lord says this: I am coming to gather the nations of every language. They shall come to witness my glory. I will give them a sign and send some of their survivors to the nations: to Tarshish, Put, Lud, Moshech, Rosh, Tubal, and Javan, to the distant islands that have never heard of me or seen my glory. They will proclaim my glory to the nations. As an offering to the Lord they will bring all your brothers, on horses, in chariots, in litters, on mules, on dromedaries, from all the nations to my holy mountain in Jerusalem, says the Lord, like Israelites bringing oblations in clean vessels to the Temple of the Lord. And of some of them I will make priests and Levites, says the Lord.

**Second Reading:** Heb 12:5-7, 11-13 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews The Lord disciplines those he loves

Have you forgotten that encouraging text in which you are addressed as sons? My son, when the Lord corrects you, do not treat it lightly; but do not get discouraged when he reprimands you. For the Lord trains the ones that he loves and he punishes all those that he acknowledges as his sons. Suffering is part of your training; God is treating you as his sons. Has there ever been any son whose father did not train him? Of course, any punishment is most painful at the time, and far from pleasant; but later, in those on whom it has been used, it bears fruit in peace and goodness. So hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth out the path you tread; then the injured limb will not be wrenched, it will grow strong again.

**GOSPEL** Luke 13:22-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

From East and West they will come to take their place in the kingdom of God

Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' He said to them, 'Try your best to enter by the narrow door, because, I tell you, many will try to enter and will not succeed.

'Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying, "Lord, open to us" but he will answer, "I do not know where you come from." Then you will find yourself saying, "We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets" but he will reply, "I do not know where you come from. Away from me, all you wicked men!"

'Then there will be weeping and grinding of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves turned outside. And men from the east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God.

'Yes, there are those now last who will be first, and those now first who will be last.'

### GOSPEL REFLECTION 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time Is 66:18-21/Ps 116/ Heb 12:5-7, 11-13/ Lk 13:22-30

God's love is boundless and for people of all walks of life. Following him calls us to enter through the narrow door of faith. Today's readings remind us that salvation comes not from status or entitlement, but from a heart fully committed to Christ. Let us examine our hearts and ask, 'Have I made efforts to be Christ's face to others, or have I clung to pride and division? With contrite hearts, let us seek His mercy.

Jesus urges us to strive through the narrow door, for true faith, not status, leads to God's eternal feast.

This demands total commitment—not mere admiration but becoming Christ's face to others. Those claiming, "We ate and drank in your presence, and you taught in our streets" (Luke 13:26), hear, "I do not know where you come from" (Luke 13:25). Like Pharisees boasting Abraham's lineage (John 8:39), they presume salvation through status, but Jesus seeks a transformed heart. "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father in heaven" (Matt 7:21). The reversal stuns: "People will come from east and west, and from north and south, and will eat in the kingdom of God" (Luke 13:29), while some "heirs" are cast out (Matt 8:11-12). Jesus repeats, "The last will be first, and the first last" (Luke 13:30, Matt 19:30; Mark 10:31).

His reversals - "the last will be first" (Luke 13:30; Matt 20:16) - demand humility. Release your "rights"; invite the newcomer to your seat, let the quiet parishioner proclaim the Word, serve silently. Heal divides - pray with those of other tongues, share with the poor, see all as equal. Hebrews urges us to "lift your drooping hands" (Heb 12:12), supporting the marginalized. Work your salvation "with fear and trembling" (Phil 2:12), embodying Christ's love.

### SAINT OF THE WEEK

# Saint Augustine of Hippo Bishop and Doctor of the Church

Feast Day: August 28 354 - 430



Patron Saint of brewers, printers, and theologians
Invoked against sore eyes and vermin
Pre-Congregation canonisation
Declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Boniface VIII in 1298
Referred to as "Doctor of Grace" by popular acclaim

Despite her challenging life, Monica's prayers and compelling virtues led her husband, mother-in-law, and her three children to convert. Augustine, the oldest, was born Aurelius Augustinus Hipponensis in Tagaste, present-day Souk Ahras, Algeria, North Africa. His father, Patricius (Patrick), was a pagan, known for his violent temper and immoral lifestyle. Monica lived out her Catholic faith as a model of charity in the face of her husband's temper and adultery.

Augustine's father would not permit his children to be baptized, but Monica's faith instilled within Augustine an awareness of his Savior. Still, he became a troublemaker. After Patricius' death, Augustine went to Carthage to continue his education where he became intoxicated by his literary successes and moved in with a young woman with whom he fathered a child. He became a follower of Manichaeism, which looked at reality as a struggle between light (good) and dark (evil).

When Augustine finished his studies around age nineteen, he returned to Tagaste with his girlfriend and son. He taught there and in Carthage before accepting an invitation to Rome. Monica told Augustine that she was going with him, but he tricked her and left without her. After a few years, he accepted a position in Milan where his mother caught up with him and witnessed his conversion.

Still searching for truth, Augustine met the future saint, Bishop Ambrose of Milan. Ambrose taught Augustine how to properly read the Bible. While sitting in a garden one day, Augustine heard a child's voice say, "Take and read." He picked up the Bible next to him and randomly opened to Romans 13:13–14 which advised proper conduct, "not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and licentiousness, not in rivalry and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh." He hastily began his conversion.

Time talking with Catholic friends, Monica's wisdom and insight, and her tearful prayers led to Augustine's baptism by Bishop Ambrose during the Easter Vigil in 387, along with his son. As Augustine returned to Tagaste with his mother, son, and friends, Monica fell ill just outside Rome and died. Augustine beautifully depicted their love and recounted her passing in the Confessions.

Upon returning home, Augustine formed a religious community with his friends. By the people's acclamation, he became a priest in 391 and was consecrated as bishop of the nearby town of Hippo in 396. One of the greatest theologians in Church history, Augustine's pastoral work, sermons, and attentiveness to people's needs changed their lives. His autobiographical Confessions traces his conversion, interspersed with theological insights. In City of God, he defends the faith and points society to the ideals to which it is called. Over five million words written by Augustine have survived until today, numbering over 1,000 documents.

Saint Augustine, you were a sinner redeemed by Christ.
You then devoted your whole life to the glory of God
and the salvation of souls.
Please pray that I will discover what you discovered
and imitate your radical conversion,
holding nothing back from our merciful God.
