
First Reading: Amos 8:4-7 (JB) A reading from the prophet Amos

The Lord God spoke against those who buy the poor for money.

Listen to this, you who trample on the needy and try to suppress the poor people of the country, you who say, When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn, and sabbath, so that we can market our wheat? Then by lowering the bushel, raising the shekel, by swindling and tampering with the scales, we can buy up the poor for money, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and get a price even for the sweepings of the wheat.' The Lord swears it by the pride of Jacob, 'Never will I forget a single thing you have done.'

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Responsorial Psalm: Praise the Lord who lifts up the poor.



Second Reading: 1 Timothy 2:1-8 (JB)

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to Timothy

Let prayers be offered to God for everyone; he wants all people to be saved.

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone - petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving - and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and - I am telling the truth and no lie - a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

GOSPEL Luke 16:1-13 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke You cannot be slaves both of God and of money.

Jesus said to his disciples, 'There was a rich man and he had a steward who was denounced to him for being wasteful with his property. He called for the man and said, "What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your stewardship because you are not to be my steward any longer." Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes."


'Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Life often challenges us to consider what really matters and how we use what God has given us. This Sunday's readings invite us to reflect on faithfulness, justice, and wise stewardship.

Key Thought: Faithful with what God entrusts to us

- First Reading (Amos 8:4–7): God warns against exploiting others for personal gain and calls us to act justly and fairly.
- Psalm (113): God raises the lowly and fills the hungry—His justice and care are for all.
- Second Reading (1 Timothy 2:1–8): We are called to pray for everyone, showing God's love in action through intercession and care.
- Gospel (Luke 16:1–13): Jesus challenges us to be wise and faithful stewards, using our resources for what truly matters and serving God above all.

Take-Home Challenge:

This week, reflect on the gifts—time, money, talents—that God has given you. How can you use them to serve others and God faithfully, rather than seeking only personal gain?





SAINT OF THE WEEK Saints Cosmas & Damian, Martyrs

Feast Day: September 26

c. 287 or 303

Patron Saints of apothecaries, barbers, blind people, chemical industry, druggists, midwives, physicians, pharmacists, surgeons
Invoked against blindness, kidney stones, hernias, and pestilence

Today, the Church honors Saints Cosmas and Damian—twin brothers, physicians, and martyrs who have been widely venerated in the East and West since the time of their deaths. Legends relate the life stories of the brothers who might have been born in Cyrrhus, modern-day Syria, and later moved to Cilicia, modern-day Turkey, in the mid- to late-third century. Raised in the faith, they learned the science of healing and became physicians.

Rather than charging for their services, the brothers decided to evangelize their largely pagan community by offering healing for free. Their charitable work drew many to the faith and earned them the title "Anargyroi," meaning "without silver." Legends say that they were excellent physicians who healed many, perhaps more through their prayer than by science. One legend holds that they were the first to transplant a leg to an amputee, an event often depicted in art.

In 303, Roman Emperor Diocletian issued a series of edicts that led to an empire-wide persecution and the deaths of many Christians. Around 287 or 303 (records conflict, the Roman Prefect Lysias of Cilicia arrested Cosmas and Damian. Christians of prominence were often the first to be targeted.

The brothers were given the opportunity to publicly renounce their faith and honor the Roman gods to save their lives. They refused and were sentenced to death. Various legends report that during torture, they were miraculously preserved from suffering and injury. Attempts to kill them by drowning, fire, arrows, and stoning all failed. Finally, Cosmas and Damian, along with three of their brothers, were beheaded.

Cosmas and Damian were possibly buried in Cyrrhus, their likely birthplace. From then on, they have been widely venerated, with many miraculous healings attributed to their intercession. Soon after their martyrdom, churches were built in their honor in Jerusalem, Egypt, and Mesopotamia.

In the sixth century, Emperor Justinian I honored these saints by restoring the city of their burial. Shortly after, the emperor received a miraculous cure through their intercession. In gratitude, he brought their relics to Constantinople where he built a church in their honor that became a popular pilgrimage site. There, a custom began for the faithful to remain all night at their tomb in prayer, seeking miraculous cures to their ailments. Many miracles have been reported over the centuries.


Also in the sixth century, Pope Symmachus inserted the names of Cosmas and Damian into the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I) and Pope Felix IV repurposed a fourth-century pagan temple in Rome as the Basilica Santi Cosma e Damiano. Though it has gone through many renovations, the fifth-century mosaics depicting their story are among the most revered pieces of sacred art in Rome.

Saints Cosmas and Damian, touched by Christ, you shared your faith in Him through selfless and free service to all who needed your medical care. When persecuted, you remained strong in your faith, preferring death over sin. Please pray that I will follow your example of selfless service and will courageously witness to Christ, no matter the cost. I also entrust to you all who are ill and need your prayers. Saints Cosmas and Damian, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.
