A reading from the book of Wisdom


In comparison to wisdom, I held riches as nothing.

And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Mark 10:17

GOSPEL REFLECTION Wisdom 7:7-11, Psalm 90:12-17, Hebrews 4:12-13, Mark 10:17-30

They were exceedingly astonished. (Mark 10:26)

Of course the disciples were astonished! Jesus had just told them that the rich would find it especially hard to enter the kingdom of heaven. This went against everything they believed. There was a strong strain in ancient Judaism that said that material wealth was a sign of God's blessing. But here was Jesus telling the rich young man to join the ranks of the poor. What is he doing?

First, notice that Jesus wasn't condemning the man for his wealth. On the contrary, Mark tells us that Jesus "loved him" (10:21). Jesus no doubt valued this man's observance and his sincere desire to be pleasing to God. Surely that's how Jesus looks upon everyone who tries to do his will, regardless of how wealthy they may or may not be.

Second, it wasn't Jesus who rejected the man; it was the other way around. Granted, Jesus had set a high bar for him, but there's every indication that Jesus would have helped him make the tough decision to sell all and follow him. But the man walked away too quickly. And he went away "sad" (Mark 10:22).

Finally, Jesus saw that this man's attachment to his possessions could get in the way of his ability to follow Jesus. Just as he had called Matthew and Peter and the others leave their jobs, Jesus wanted this man to break free from the one thing that was hindering him from living as a wholehearted disciple. He wanted all his disciples to find freedom through detachment so they could focus on loving him and one another.

Today, Jesus is looking at you with love. He has a high calling for you and is ready to help you fulfill it. And he is asking you to let go of anything that distracts you from that calling. What might that be? Take him up on the offer. Don't walk away sad.

"Lord, help me give up whatever is keeping me from you."



Heavenly and Blessed Father, we welcome the new month of October with great expectation and hope.


Lord, it's difficult to find the words to express my gratitude for all the ways You have blessed my life.

12 WAYS TO GET CLOSER TO GOD



- Get quiet. Turn off the radio and TV, step away from your computer, put away your phone, and find a quiet spot
 to simply rest in God's presence.
- 2. **Read your bible.** Underline, highlight, or write out passages, verses, phrases or words that speak to you. These are the gifts that keep on giving when you need encouragement down the road.
- 3. Write out your prayers in a dedicated notebook; these can be for others or yourself. Then spend time in prayer.
- 4. **Go for a walk and talk with God**. Share your heart: what is troubling you, what you are thankful for, and your hopes and dreams. He listens.
- 5. **Meditate on Scripture.** Choose a verse or short passage, read it several times, and invite the Holy Spirit to speak to you about what you have learned in the context of what's happening in your life right now.
- Put on some worship music and immerse yourself in the melody and lyrics. Sing along, dance...or just listen. Let the Holy Spirit minister to you.
- 7. **Marvel at the world God has created**. Walk in the forest, sit by a bubbling stream, watch a mother bird feed her young, or drive out in the country for a picnic. Let the experience soak in.
- 8. **Journal** what God has been speaking to you about today.
- 9. **Share what God has done for you** with a friend or family member. Witnessing is a powerful tool for our own spiritual growth, and pleases the Lord.
- 10. **Do something for someone else** without expecting anything in return.
- 11. **Use the gifts God has given you.** If He has called you to create, then create. If He has called you to administer, then administer. If He has called you to shepherd, then shepherd.
- Fast. Fasting brings clarity of mind and combined with any of the above, gives you the potential for a remarkable encounter with God.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, Virgin c. 1647—1690



Feast Day: October 16

Patron Saint of patients with polio, devotees of the Sacred Heart, loss of parents

A cloistered 17th century nun's Sacred Heart visions impact the church like a meteor

Today's saint, in the eyes of the world, was nothing special. She grew up in a medium-sized town, never traveled, received a standard education, was not wealthy, had normal intelligence, and died at the age of forty-three. But she had visions. Powerful, thought-provoking, descriptive visions. If she were not a nun, people would probably have whispered that Margaret was eccentric and politely ignored her. But Margaret's austere life as a cloistered nun buttressed her credibility. And when a holy Jesuit priest, Saint Claude de la Colombière, disseminated the content of her visions, it sparked broader interest which eventually spread like wildfire around the globe. The innumerable cells in the body of Christ carried Margaret Mary's visions one to the other, until devotion to the Sacred Heart became so common as to be prototypically Catholic. But it was not always so. It was today's saint who made devotion to the Sacred Heart commonplace.

Saint Margaret Mary grew up in a large, pious, middle-class family in France in the middle of its great century of Catholic revival. She was a daughter, so to speak, of Saints Francis de Sales and Jane Frances de Chantal. The latter founded the Order of the Visitation after being inspired by the life and writings of Francis de Sales. Margaret joined her local Visitandine convent in 1671 in Paray-le-Monial, just ten years after Jane had died. Margaret suffered from serious physical ailments and so was not outstanding for her practical service to the convent. But she was especially devout and dedicated to mental prayer. From her childhood she had experienced a closeness to Jesus Christ so unique that she thought everyone experienced it. In the convent Jesus visited her often, speaking to her as if they were old friends. And like an old friend, He opened His heart to her and told her things He told no one else. He said He was sad. He said He was disappointed in the laxity of so many of the faithful, especially those consecrated to Him. And then one day He did something extraordinary – He showed Margaret His human, red as a ruby, heart.

These were not visions of the exalted, seated Christ as King of the Universe, nor of Jesus the High Priest consecrating the world to the Father surrounded by saints and angels. This was the humble, slightly sad and discouraged Jesus wondering where all his friends had gone: "I receive from the greater part only ingratitude, by their irreverence and sacrileges, and by the coldness and contempt they have for me in this sacrament of love...." It was all about the Blessed Sacrament. Jesus wanted more devotion to Him in the tabernacle, and He wanted it at specific times. He asked Margaret to come before Him for one hour at 11 p.m. every first Thursday of the month. He made promises to those who received Holy Communion on nine consecutive First Fridays. This was the seventeenth century version of the twentieth century Divine Mercy devotion.

Saint Margaret Mary was not the first person, nor the first saint, to talk about the Sacred Heart. But she was the first dedicated ambassador of this message of mercy. And God used her effectively. As part of her canonization process her tomb was opened in 1830 and she worked a miracle of healing. Images of the Sacred Heart were commonly enthroned in Catholic homes with its promises described in detail. In 1919 in Paris an enormous Basilica on Montmartre was dedicated to the Sacred Heart. Saint Margaret Mary was canonized in 1920. Her body can be seen under an altar in the chapel dedicated to the Sacred Heart at Paray-le-Monial.

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, your life of prayer and devotion to Jesus was that of a prolonged discussion with an intimate friend. Help us to dialogue with Jesus like you, knowing Him and loving Him in the hiddenness of the tabernacle.


