Second Reading

Ephesians 5:21-32 (JB)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians

This is the great mystery, it applies to Christ and the Church.

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives submit to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body - and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Gospel

John 6:60-69 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Lord, whom shall we go to? You have the words of everlasting life.

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before?

'It is the spirit that gives life,

the flesh has nothing to offer.

The words I have spoken to you are spirit

and they are life.

'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him.

Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'

HOMILY - story:

There is a story often repeated about the Christian Community during the height of persecution of all Christians in Russia. A group of Christians were gathered for a secret prayer meeting. Suddenly the door was broken down by the boot of a soldier, who entered the room, and faced the group with a machine gun in his hand. They all feared the worst. He spoke up, "If there is any one of you who does not really believe in Jesus, then, get out now while you have a chance." There was a rush to the door as most of the group left. A small group remained, fearing for their lives, trembling and in trepidation of the expectant doom that awaited them. This was a group that chose to commit themselves to Jesus no matter what lay in store for them. The soldier closed the door after the others, and once again, he stood in front of the small group of people who remained, machine gun poised. Finally, after quite a few tense moments and looking at each one in the eye, a smile appeared on his lips as he turned to leave the room. He whispered to the group. "you can go on praying. Actually, I believe in Jesus too and am a silent follower of Jesus. You are much better off without those others!"

My dear Brothers and Sister, I often reflect on this incident and wonder if that should ever occur and play out again today and I was present in the group would I rush for the exit and save my life or would I stay on in terror but in commitment to Jesus? This is a question that we must ask and face realistically and honestly.



Gospel Reflection

John 6:60-69 (JB)

The disciples could be slow on the uptake; they could be dull and passive, and they often misunderstood and missed the point. Today, however, they are spot on and show that they have indeed understood what Jesus was teaching. In fact, so clear and crisp is their grasp of Jesus' teaching on the Eucharist that many turned back and no longer followed him. In fact, as if in unison they declared in protest, 'This is a hard teaching; who can listen to it?'.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church sheds light on this reaction: 'The first announcement of the Eucharist divided the disciples, just as the announcement of the Passion scandalized them: 'This is a hard saying; who can listen to it?' The Eucharist and the Cross are stumbling blocks. It is the same mystery and it never ceases to be an occasion of division. 'Will you also go away?' The Lord's question echoes through the ages, as a loving invitation to discover that only He has the words of eternal life and that to receive in faith the gift of the Eucharist is to receive the Lord himself' (CCC. 1336).

The Holy Spirit helps us comprehend the miracle of the Eucharist. Perhaps we receive the Eucharist week after week without pondering and reflecting on the awesome privilege it is to receive Christ in this way? What is truly shocking and scandalous about the Eucharist is that the gift held out to us is that of the whole Christ. The body and blood, soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ and therefore, the whole Christ, is truly, really and substantially made present to us. In other words, Jesus is made real and present in the most full and complete sense. Jesus' presence in the Eucharist is substantial in that he himself is wholly and entirely present. What a gift! What a blessing! What a grace!

'In the most holy sacrament of the Eucharist, in this sacrament of love, we have true life, a blessed life, and true happiness. Because in it we receive not only those graces that perfect us but the very author of these graces.' (St Pio of Pietrelcino).

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Rose of Lima, Virgin

c. 1586 - 1617

Feast Day: August 23

Patron Saint of Peru, florists, and gardeners

Born at Lima (Peru) in 1586. Died there on 24 August 1617. Chose not to marry, joined the Dominican Third Order and modelled herself on Saint Catherine of Siena (29 April). A recluse and mystic. Remembered for her radiant love of God and for the severe penance and hardships she endured during serious illness.

Rose died in the perfume of holiness at the age of thirty-one. Her funeral was held in Lima's Cathedral with all local dignitaries in attendance. She was beatified in 1667 and canonized in 1671. She is interred in the same church as Saint Martin de Porres in central Lima. Her pre-Vatican II feast day of August 30 is a national holiday in Peru and her image graces that country's highest denomination currency. She is known as a powerful miracle worker credited with numerous physical healings unto today.

Saint Rose of Lima, you were young and holy. You dedicated your body and soul to God while still a child. Through your example and through your heavenly intercession, help all Catholics, especially the young, to dedicate their lives to God from the very start. AMEN.


