

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear friends,

Julian of Norwich wrote,
"I look at God; I look at you; I keep looking at God."

I look at God: Begin by fixing your attention on the Lord. You can use your imagination to picture him enthroned in Heaven—glorious, radiant, and filled with love for his people. You may feel praise or gratitude begin to well up in your heart.

I look at you: In this posture of worship, try to visualise the person you want to pray for. Instead of immediately offering a prayer, take a moment to be still. Try to recognise any words or prayers that seem to be "bubbling up" within you. That may be the Spirit giving you a heavenly perspective on the person or situation you are praying for. But don't worry, even if you don't sense anything, you're still interceding. You're still being present to God on their behalf. And you can still pray God's blessing upon them and mention any specific needs.

I keep looking at God: Take a moment to thank the Lord for what he has already done in that person's life—and what he's going to do. Remember that he hears your prayers.

Mark 7:31-37 (JB)


A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.

HOMILY STORY

STARTER: THE WORLD STANDS IN NEED OF LIBERATION

There is an old popular hymn, which begins with the chorus, "The world stands in need of liberation, my Lord, it still has to feel your power. The blind and the deaf, the dumb and the lame, all need to feel your healing touch.' The lyrics of this hymn was written to make the people conscious of their Christian and social responsibility. The hymn says, there are those who have eyes but refuse to see the inhumanity to men.

People have ears, but refuse to pay heed to the cries of those in agony. Perhaps, more than ever, these descriptions suit us and our times today. We live in a wounded world, we encounter people with broken hearts, in communities with a graveyard of our hopes. We wonder where is God and what he is doing, or why he is not doing anything to protect at least his innocent devotees.

The Gospel of today speaks about Jesus miraculously healing a deaf and dumb person. This even can help us to reflect about what God is doing, as well as what he is expecting of us to do to heal our wounded world.

GOSPEL REFLECTION Mark 7:31-37

He has done all things well. He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak. So said the bystanders after they saw Jesus' healing of the deaf man with a speech impediment. We are meant to share their amazement in the measure that Jesus continues to heal us, deaf to the Word of God and hence unable to speak it clearly.

Sadly, secularism continues to assert itself in our once strongly religious culture. Around twenty-six per cent of our countrymen say that they practice no religion, and among those thirty years of age and younger, that number climbs to forty per cent. The secular person, by definition, is one who hears only the voices that echo around the public square, in social media. These are voices that, almost exclusively, trumpet the importance of wealth, of power, of pleasure, of fame, of worldly success. So powerful and insistent are these voices that they drown out, easily enough, the tiny whispering voice of God.

How crucially relevant for our time that Saint John referred to Jesus as the Incarnation of the Word of God. In his voice, we are able to hear the voice of God; through his ministrations, our deafness to God is overcome. Now those who are deaf indeed find it difficult to speak clearly, and this principle holds in the spiritual order as well. Precisely because the secularized person cannot hear God's word, he or she cannot convey it persuasively and beautifully to the wider culture. Once again, attunement to the voice of Jesus is the key to becoming an articulate evangelizer. Thus, the Lord continues, even now, to do all things well: he cures our deafness to the divine word and causes us to speak it with confidence.



Because of her importance in salvation history, Mary's birthday is celebrated as well as those of her son Jesus the Lord, and of Saint John the Baptist (24 June).


Kindness and charity spreads throughout our communities much faster than this virus.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Nicholas of Tolentino

c. 1245—1305

Feast Day: September 10

Patron Saint of Holy Souls



Nicholas of Tolentine was a simple priest and Augustinian friar who touched the lives of many.

His sprit of prayer, penance, austerity of life and devotion to the Holy Souls were notable. His preaching brought many to Christ.

Nicholas Gurutti was born in 1245 in Sant'Angelo, Pontano, Macerata, Italy. His family was rather poor.

He joined the Augustinian Order while a young man, after hearing the inspired preaching of Reginaldo da Monterubbiano, Prior (local superior) of the Augustinian monastery in Sant'Angelo.

As a priest and religious, he was full of charity towards his brother Augustinians as well as towards the people to whom he ministered. He visited the sick and cared for the needy. He was a noted preacher of the Gospel. He gave special attention to those who had fallen away from the Church. People considered him a miracle worker.

He often fasted and performed other works of penance. He spent long hours in prayer.

The story is told that, one day, having fasted for a long time, Nicholas was physically weak. While at prayer, Jesus told him to eat some bread marked with a cross and soaked in water in order to regain his strength. Thus arose the Augustinian custom of blessing and distributing Saint Nicholas Bread in his memory.

Another story relates that Nicholas, while asleep in bed, heard the voice of a deceased friar he had known. This friar told Nicholas that he was in Purgatory, and urged him to celebrate the Eucharist for him and other souls there, so that they would be set free by the power of Christ. Nicholas did so for seven days. The friar again spoke to Nicholas, thanking him and assuring him that a large number of souls were now with God. Because of this Nicholas was proclaimed patron of the souls in Purgatory.

He is also considered the patron saint against epidemic disease and against fires.

During most of his adult life, Nicholas lived in Tolentine, Italy. There he died September 10, 1305. Canonized in 1446 by Pope Eugene IV, Nicholas is the first Augustinian friar to be canonized after the Grand Union of the Order of St. Augustine in 1256.

The remains of St. Nicholas are preserved at the Shrine of Saint Nicholas in the city of Tolentine.

Lord, you worked miracles of healing and comfort at the hands of St Nicholas: hear all who cry to you in distress, in sickness and in every danger of soul and body, and save them in your mercy. Amen.
