25 - 12 - 18THE SOLEMNITY OF THE BIRTH OF THE LORD CHRISTMAS DAY

Why is Christmas usually regarded as the principal Christian feast, whereas in fact that honour of course belongs to Easter?

Perhaps it's because we have 'tinsellised' Christmas and made it 'nice': a feast that seems to say nothing about suffering and death, a feast that we in fact can't bear to be associated with suffering and death.

But in fact Christmas is **all** about what it is to be human: 'The Word became flesh':

> the mystery of the Incarnation, the becoming-flesh, of God says that God is to be found in all the struggles of human life:

the searching, the failing, the sinfulness, the suffering, the sickness, the dying:

not to take those things away, but to be present within them, and ultimately, as Easter proclaims, to transform them into life.

Christmas isn't a 'nice' feast, but we make it so.

But it is a joyful feast: the joyful feast that God became all that we are.

Christmas!

He was born in a stranger's stable and buried in another man's tomb. Born no later than 4 BC, and lived in an obscure village with an unsavoury reputation (John: 1:46). His birth was as much noticed in the mighty Roman Empire as a baby born today on the outskirts of Nyngan would be in any of our teeming cities. He had no influential patrons, an unimpressive group of friends, mixed with the destitute and morally lapsed, and at times slept under the stars, having "nowhere to lay his head" (Matt: 8:20). He had no income and women supported him "out of their own resources" (Luke 8:3).

No other founder of a worldwide religion taught so short a time. Jesus was active in public life perhaps one year or, at the most three. (The three synoptic gospels indicate one, John's gospel three). None moved in so restricted an area. None died so young. According to tradition Moses died at 120 years in the midst of his people, Buddha peacefully at 80, his disciples around him. Confucius spent his old age training a group of mainly nobles in his philosophy before dying peacefully at 72 years. Muhammad was poisoned in his sixties and died in his harem in the arms of his favourite wife. Jesus was crucified in his early thirties, disgraced as a blasphemer, a criminal not fit to live among righteous people. Betrayed by a disciple, deserted by all he called friends. He was tortured and humiliated and died in agony on a cross before his heart broken mother, a group of faithful women and the disciple he loved (John 19:26).

Yet, through this itinerant lay preacher's teachings, life, death and living spirit, there erupted into the world an unprecedented upsurge of spirituality that opened minds and hearts to a new awareness of the Divine and the Light and Love of God. A spiritual power that coursed into people of all cultures, callings and times and continues its influence everywhere for good. Influencing the formation of our Western civilisation and remaining intertwined through its culture and ethics. From that preacher's life, death and living spirit we know darkness can never overcome light, death obliterate life, evil extinguish good. God always has the last word. That suffering has meaning extending into the infinite and dying we emerge into the wonder of the limitless Light and Love of the Divine. We live forever.

Only two gospel authors tell of Jesus' Nativity, Matthew and Luke, Matthew of Joseph's experiences and Luke of Mary's, and they are difficult to correlate in part because both evangelists used symbols to make theological statements, many we've interpreted literally. Not that that has deterred us. For our cribs we've taken what we've wanted from each account, developed some and added more. We've slushed the dirt floor of the stable of rats, animal manure and urine and arranged neatly clean straw in the baby Jesus' manger. Put the exultant but exhausted and dishevelled Mary into designer dripdries, made her Anglo-Saxon rather than Jewish and, for some extraordinary reason, in some churches have the new born babe a smiling six month year old, half clothed and inadequately clothed for what we have concluded was winter. Exegetes say that it probably was not winter for if it were, shepherds would not be, "living out, watching their flocks by night", but that they and their sheep would be under shelter. Those "wise men from the east" – symbolising Truth seekers of all places and beliefs - we've decided were three, lifted them to royal status, given them names and to show our inclusiveness, darkened the skin of one.

What have we done with our busyness? We've obscured an illumined message from that dirty, comfortless stable, its two weary occupants and newborn baby. In a place





New Year's Day: Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God



One of the special feast days of this Christmas Season is the greatest & the most ancient of the feasts of Mary -1st January, New Year's Day: (the solemnity of Mary as Mother of God).

New Year's Day is the Octave Day of Christmas and celebrates Mary's role in our salvation: that it was through her acceptance of God's call and placing herself at the service of God that the Word was made flesh in and through her. 
GLORIA:

A Christmas Reflection...

CHRISTMAS is a strange season. When you're a child it is a season of presents. When you're young, it's a season of parties. When you get your own home, it's a season of preparations. But when you get older Christmas changes colour dramatically. Suddenly out from behind the advertisements and big dinners, through the haze of old carols and sumptuous crib scenes, we begin to see what Christmas is really all about. Christmas is about finding life where we did not expect life to be.

Every year life waxes and wanes. Every stage of life comes and goes. Every facet of life is born and then dies. Every good moment is doomed to become only a memory. Every period of living slips through our fingers and disappears. Every hope dims and every possibility turns eventually to dry clay. Until Christmas comes again and we are called at the deepest, most subconscious, least cognizant level to begin to live again.

Christmas brings us all back to the crib of life to start over, aware of what has gone before, conscious that nothing can last, but full of hope that this time, finally, we can learn what it takes to live well, grow to full stature of soul and spirit, get it right.

There is a child in each of us waiting to be born again. It is those looking for life that the figure of Christ, a child, beckons. Christmas is not for children. It is for those who refuse to give up and grow old, for those to whom life comes newly and with purpose each and every day, for those who can let yesterday go so that life can be full of new possibility and ways, for those who are agitated with newness whatever their age. 

(continued from page 3...): that would have any gynaecologist or mid wife blanch with horror, and in our ignorance would say too inappropriate for anything holy, the greatest spiritual event of all time took place. Far from her parents and female friends, her only companion the gospel tells us, a man with whom she had no physical relationship, the little child mother Mary, gave birth to the Christ child- Jesus Light to the world. A baby who grew not only to teach, but exude God, and who gave his life that others might find the Divine in life and that deep-down peace when living in union with that in-dwelling Presence. Of having a new, higher purpose in living and meaning in dying.

What comes to us from Bethlehem is that there is no place or situation so unwanted, so destitute and devoid of comfort, that God is not in the midst of it. That during the harshest and most crushing times in life, one is never alone. God is there, deepening, intensifying the soul, for mystical wonderment beyond imagining if it will allow it ~ enlightenment.. (1 Co: 2~9) Not in spite of what is happening, but because of it.

We live within the effulgent light of the Divine, too intense, too brilliant for our poor myopic spiritual sight, but we're not sealed off from it. Glimmers of it can break into human lives at any time as it did for the shepherds in their ordinary workaday lives. That Star is not out and away from us but within, believer and unbeliever alike, beckoning all who would follow to where it leads, not overland, but into the inner self; where in the stable of the heart is the answer to all human yearning ~ the Light and Love of the in~dwelling Creator Spirit, awaiting the traveller's arrival.
