2018 Easter Message from Bishop Peter Comensoli



We proclaim a crucified Christ

1Cor 1,23

Tuesday 27 March 2018

Greetings to you all in the Risen Lord!

The passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, God's Son, and our Lord and Brother, is the greatest story of human history. It is the story of the journey of one man, for the sake of all women and men.

Jesus made this journey so that his story might become ours. He did this that we might choose to walk with him. At his crucifixion, Jesus' mortal body stopped in death. But this was not his end. He conquered death and walked out of the tomb, the First Born from the dead. The Risen Lord then entered into his resurrected life at quite a pace. He walked up to Mary Magdalene and called her by name. He walked into the upper room where the disciples were and show them his glorified wounds.

He walked with his two downcast friends on the road to Emmaus, teaching them hope. And he walked along the shore of Lake Galilee one last time, to forgive Peter of his betrayal and to give Peter his apostolic mission.

There was no stopping the resurrected Jesus; and at each footstep along the way, he invited others to walk with him. Each one of us has been created to make a journey of our lives. The question is: Who will we choose as our companion along the way? And toward whom do we walk? In his death and resurrection, Jesus created a way for us to walk with him and towards him. Shall we take the journey with him?

Perhaps you would agree with me that there are aspects of our beloved Church in Australia today that have stopped us dead in our tracks; it can feel like we are not walking with Jesus. Yet, as the great Apologist G.K. Chesterton once put it, "Christianity has died many times and risen again; for it had a God who knew the way out of the grave."

At a time when the Church seems veiled in the darkness of the tomb, the light of Easter opens for us the discovery of a renewed path along which Jesus walks, and wants us to take. May we find the courage to walk into this future with healing grace, truthful hope and humble love, energised and guided by the presence of the crucified and risen Lord.

In the year ahead, I want to invite you to join with me on this journey with the Lord, one that might reveal to us where and how our local Church of Broken Bay is to walk with him. This local journey is being initiated this year as our local part of a shared journey for the entire Church in Australia, leading to a national assembly in 2020 – called a Plenary Council. By the grace of God, and through our listening to God and one another, we might come to see the path ahead, a way into our future that follows the Lord's desire for his people.

Friends, walk with Christ! Walk in his presence, and by his guiding light. He is our path from death to life, from the darkness of our tombs to a new light of grace. Walk with Christ! Happy Easter to you all!

Our Vinnies Team: A Message from Mark and Louise Boffa

About 20 years ago, our conference was entrusted with the care of the residents of Whalan. Whalan is near Mount Druitt area along the M2 and M7 less than 40 minutes from here but quite some distance from our relatively comfortable way of life. Many of you have contributed to our work there via the Christmas hampers and of course donations – both material and financial. However we have a steadily reducing number of volunteers undertaking home visitations at Whalan. Every Tuesday and Saturday, we aim to have a team of two volunteers available to respond to calls for help from Whalan which are relayed to the Hornsby regional office, of which we are part.

People seek help from us for a variety of reasons, mainly:

Assistance with energy bills

Domestic difficulties

Hunger and lack of food

Sometimes while one of the above might be cited, it is actually loneliness that is behind the call.

We used to get some very long lists – my first visit to Whalan had 27 households on the list to visit that day. More recently however, our lists range from 5 to 15 households. These disadvantaged households often appear to be from another world:

Our clients are impacted by poverty, unemployment, ill health, poor education, drugs and alcoholism, criminal past – occasionally all of these within the one household. The situations that we encounter are very real but to us can appear made up. On one of my earliest visits I remember being greeted at the door by a young woman whose mother I thought we were visiting. It turned out that the young woman herself was actually the client - a 25 year old mother of eight children to five different fathers.

For some years, Louise and I have also been responding to local calls for help, which are much less frequent and somewhat less regular than the Whalan calls. While the reasons for local calls may differ slightly, despair does not discriminate - such as our recent experience of meeting late on a weeknight at the fountain in hornsby with a young mother and her six children who had just escaped a violent domestic situation without identification, money or any other belongings and they needed our help to set up home locally.

Our visits to Whalan have at times been confronting and moving. We aim not to judge the people we assist, even though sometimes we know that they take advantage of our generosity. We are reminded constantly of the line "I was hungry and you fed me..." and we hang on to the thought that perhaps we have managed to bring positive change to at least one person over the years.

Today we would like you to consider volunteering for the Wahroonga conference. It will cost you just a bit of your time. Louise and I commit to the third Saturday of each month. Our work starts around 7.30am at the Church and we are normally back home around lunchtime.

At present we have 11 regular visitors trying to fill a roster that requires at least 20 people. We are also in need of volunteers to assist with local visits, bread collections and possibly administration. We always work in couples when visiting homes, and as I mentioned last week, that could be two members from the one family such as teenagers with their parents or even grandparents.

Might you be interested to join our Vinnies Team?


