From Fr Paul

The third Sunday of Advent is known as **Gaudate (or Rejoicing) Sunday**. All three readings for today call us to rejoice. And all three readings were written in the midst of great suffering and difficulties. (see Readings p3)

Many of us, and indeed many throughout the world, have found **these past two years of the pandemic and lockdowns** a time of hardship and suffering. I am inspired by people in our parish community who live with a great sense of joy, in spite of difficulties, setbacks and sorrows. Many of you have shown great resilience and resourcefulness in getting through this time.

Yet Many of you will acknowledge that we in Holy Name Parish can count our blessings, when many in Australia have suffered more, and certainly millions throughout the world have been worse off.

This past week has struck me that we are coming out of lockdown, and our shared life as a parish and broader society is returning to normal.

This past week we have experienced the full gamut of life. We baptised Georgia Niland, daughter of Julie and Josh, and granddaughter of Ian and Hayley Edmunds. We also farewelled our beloved parishioner Denese O'Brien, mother of Marianne, Paul and Jenny, with a Requiem Mass, we celebrated the wedding of Muditha and Angali, celebrated the Graduations of the Year 12's from St Edmund's and the Year six boys and girls from St Lucy's, participated in the Prouille Christmas concert and many other things that make up the life of the parish community.

This Sunday, the Prouille Football Club gather with us at the 9:30am Mass to be followed by presentations. In the coming week we will have the Prouille Graduation for Year 6 and the whole school End of Year Mass.

In the midst of all this, we remember that as a faith community the Lord keeps calling us into a deeper relationship of trust and surrender. The Advent groups are proving very worthwhile for those who attended. On this Gaudate Sunday, we remember that joy, peace and humility are sure signs of the Holy Spirit. **How might we remain open to this great gift in our lives?**

Let us express praise and gratitude to God, even when life is tough; where possible, let us not to dwell on the pain and hurts of the past, or fear what is to come, but live with joy in the present. As St Augustine famously said: "leave the past to the mercy of God, the future to his providence and the present to his love."

Remember we celebrate the **Second Rite of Reconciliation on Thursday night, 16th December at 7.30 p.m.** Please take this opportunity (or a similar one) to go to this Sacrament as part of your preparation for Christmas.

What do the Readings say to us this Sunday?

All three readings today call us to rejoice! And all three readings were written in the midst of great difficulties or crises: **Zephaniah**, writing at a time (640-609 BC) of religious and moral corruption, warned that God would "destroy out of this place the remnant of Baal (an alien god), and the names of the idolatrous priests" (Zeph 1:4), a time before the Babylonian captivity that was to come (597-538 BC).

St Paul is writing amidst his chains as he awaited his execution in prison and **St John** amidst the Roman occupation of Israel.

In the **first reading**, the prophet Zephaniah bids Jerusalem to rejoice because salvation is near. God stands in her midst and will deliver her from her enemies. God is portrayed, not only as a king and warrior, but also as a loving bridegroom, who steadfastly loves his unworthy and unfaithful bride.

In the **second reading**, the theme of joy is even more emphatic. St Paul calls on the Philippians to rejoice because the Lord is near, so there is no need to worry. If they need anything, they are to pray for it, and the peace of God will be with them.

The theme of the nearness of the Lord is also at the heart of the **Gospel**. St John the Baptist tells the people what they must do in order to prepare for the Lord's coming and to escape his searching judgement. In all things, John points the way to Christ.





Saints we remember this week

St Lucy (283-310 AD) - Feast Day 13 December

Italian **Santa Lucia**, Lucia was born to an honourable family around the year 283.

- Lucia's father was a Roman. He died when she was five years old.
- The name Lucia means light (Lux, lucis).
- Saint Lucia is a Sicilian saint who endured death in Syracuse, Sicily around 310 A.D.
- Lucia sought help at the shrine of Saint Agnes for her mother's long-term disease. Lucia's mother was cured there and Lucia convinced her mother to donate a major portion of her wealth to the poor.
- Saint Lucy refused to compromise her virginity in marriage and was betrayed to the Roman authorities by the man she would have married. According to the legend, Lucy was threatened to be taken to a prostitute house if she did not abandon her Christian beliefs.
- One of the soldiers stabbed a spear through her throat. She was willing to suffer for what she believed.
- Saint Lucy died when she was given the Christian sacraments.



St John of the Cross (c. 1542-1591) - Feast Day 14 December



John's father was disowned by his wealthy Spanish family when he married a poor weaver rather than a woman of equal economic status. Living in poverty proved to be too much for him, and he died shortly after John was born. John spent much of his youth in an orphanage, where he was clothed, fed, and given an elementary education.

At the age of 17, he found a job in a hospital and was accepted into a Jesuit college. In 1563 he entered the Carmelite Order. Eventually he enrolled in another university, where he did so well that he was asked to teach a class and to help settle disputes.

When he met Teresa of Ávila and learned from her about the reform of the Carmelite Order, John decided to help with it. As part of this decision, he wore sandals instead of shoes and lived very simply in prayer and solitude. In 1577 the attitude toward the reform shifted. John was caught up in a misunderstanding and imprisoned at Toledo, Spain. He was locked in a cell six feet wide and ten feet long for nine months, with no light except that which filtered through a slit high up in the wall. During those months of darkness in that little cell, he had many beautiful experiences and encounters with God in prayer. He later forgave the men who had imprisoned him. How could he do that? He explained, "*Where there is no love, put love, and you will find love.*"

In 1578 John escaped to southern Spain to join the reformed Carmelites. There he held leadership positions and wrote reflections on his experiences, which showed his deep spirit of prayer. When he became ill, he chose to go to the city of Ubeda, where no one knew him. It was there that he died.
