This Sunday marks the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time. **In today's Gospel,** Jesus encourages us to live a life worthy of being his disciples, and worthy to enter the kingdom of heaven. He asks us to consider: what is it in your life that causes you most to sin? Are you willing to pray for the grace and to take the action to change your life, so as to live a life worthy of your calling?

Jesus especially encourages us **not to mislead the young**, the "little ones". We have a special responsibility as parents, teachers, grandparents, adults, leaders and priests to love, respect, nourish and guide those entrusted to our care. There can be no greater privilege and responsibility.

We are now halfway through the school holidays!

Fr Anselam, Deacon Sam and I prepared and circulated a short video to wish the school students and their families well for the holiday time. What does the Word say to us this Sunday?

First Reading (Numbers 11:25-29). Joshua resents the fact that the gift of prophecy is now given to many others besides Moses, but Moses himself welcomes it.

Second Reading (James 5:1-6). We hear a strong condemnation of wealth, especially when it is obtained through exploitation of the weak.

Gospel (Mark 9:38-43,45,47-48). This contains a lesson in tolerance, the avoidance of scandal and occasions of sin.

The First Reading tells of the institution of seventy elders who were to assist Moses in ruling the people of Israel. They were endowed with the spirit of leadership and prophecy which was given to Moses. The main point of the reading is that God's choice is not a personal privilege, but a call to serve his people.

This leads into **the Gospel** because the apostles had to be reminded of this truth. Jesus utters a grim warning against anyone who would hurt the 'little ones' who have faith in him. He talks about hell (a state of deliberate rejection of the love and mercy of God) and compares it to Gehenna, a ravine near Jerusalem, which was a dump where rubbish of the city burnt continually.

Very many people admire and envy the rich. Yet St James makes a scathing attack on them **(Second Reading)**. However, it is not riches in themselves that are being condemned. Basically he makes two points. Wealth does not lead to happiness. Do not be unjust and exploit the weak in acquiring wealth.

Videos to Inspire You



Last week we celebrated the feast of Saint Padre Pio – a saint beloved by many. He was born in the small village of Pietrelcina in southern Italy, and joined the Capuchin friars at the age of 16. He became a priest seven years later, and spent fifty years at the monastery of San Giovanni Rotondo, where he was very much sought after as a spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor. Many miracles were popularly ascribed to him during his lifetime. He died a few days after the fiftieth anniversary of his receiving the stigmata, and over 100,000 people attended his funeral.



We remember this week



Feast Day 27 September - St Vincent de Paul 1581-1660

St. Vincent was born in Ranquine, France. He became a priest in 1600. When travelling by sea, pirates captured him; he survived two hard years as a slave, but escaped to Rome and later, Paris. It was there that he met Cardinal Pierre de Berulle, who influenced Vincent to devote his life to charitable works. He established organisations of men and women to provide aid to the poor and sick. He depended on the donations of the wealthy, who made it possible for him to found hospitals and an orphanage.

In 1625, in Paris, Vincent founded the Congregation of the Missions, called the Lazarites or Vincentians, a society of priests charged with missionary efforts, the training of clergy, and preaching among the country people. In 1633, with St. Louise de Marillac he founded the Sisters of Charity, the first congregation of women to care for the sick and poor outside of the convent. During Vincent's life, the Vincentians increased in number and spread across the world. He was canonised by Pope Clement XII in 1737.

Feast Day 29 Wednesday Sts Michael, Gabriel, Raphael, archangels

Angels are messengers from God. Three of the special messengers mentioned in the Bible are the archangels Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael. The names of each of these archangels tell us about the work God gave them to do.

Michael's name means "who is like God." God gave Michael the responsibility of protecting us as God protects us.

Gabriel's name means "hero of God." Gabriel is God's hero because he communicates God's message to people. We remember Gabriel best for being the angel who announced to Mary that she would be the mother of God's only Son.

Raphael's name means "God has healed." In the Bible, Raphael heals a blind man and is said to have stirred the water in a pool where Jesus healed a paralysed man.

On the feast day of the archangels, we remember that God's messengers guide us in our journey to everlasting life with our Father. We can pray to Michael to protect us when we face temptation. We can ask to Gabriel to help us say "yes" to God as



Mary did so many years ago. We can pray to Raphael when we are ill or know someone who is in need of healing.

We honour the archangels as we do saints. They remind us that God is always with us and he gives us special helpers to light and guide us.



Feast Day 30 September - St Jerome 345 - 420

Most of the saints are remembered for some outstanding virtue or devotion which they practiced, but Jerome is frequently remembered for his bad temper! It is true of him and he could use a vitriolic pen, but his love for God and his son Jesus Christ was extraordinarily intense; anyone who taught error was an enemy of God and truth, and Saint Jerome went after them with his mighty and sometimes sarcastic pen.

He was above all a Scripture scholar, translating most of the Old Testament from the Hebrew into Latin. He was an avid student, a thorough scholar, a prodigious letter-writer and a consultant to monk, bishop, and pope. Saint Augustine said of him, "What Jerome is ignorant of, no mortal has ever known."

He travelled extensively in Palestine, marking each spot of Christ's life with an outpouring of devotion. Finally, he settled in Bethlehem, where he lived in the cave believed to have been the birthplace of Christ. Jerome died in Bethlehem, and the remains of his body now lie buried in the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome.

We remember this week

Feast Day 1 October - St Therese of the Child Jesus 1873 - 1897

Thérèse Martin was born in France in 1873. After losing her mother at the age of four and under the loving guidance of her father and family, she grew in holiness and wisdom far beyond her years.

By May 1887, Thérèse was determined to enter the Carmelite community at Lisieux. After overcoming objections from Church officials over her young age, the fifteenyear-old Thérèse entered the convent where she would live for the rest of her life.

Over the remaining nine years of her life there, Thérèse blossomed in strength and holiness. In 1895, she was ordered to write a memoir of her childhood; this, together with some of her other writings, was published after her death as "Story of a Soul." She died of tuberculosis in 1897 at the age of twenty-four.

She was known as the "Little Flower" because she did not see herself as elegant as a rose or a lily, but rather as a small wildflower.

She was also called "St. Therese of The Child Jesus" because she had a great devotion to the child Jesus.


On her death bed, she said "After my death, I will let fall a shower of roses. I will spend my heaven doing good upon earth. I will raise up a mighty host of little saints. My mission is to make God loved..."

Feast Day 2 October The Holy Guardian Angels

Perhaps no aspect of Catholic piety is as comforting to parents as the belief that an angel protects their little ones from dangers real and imagined. Yet guardian angels are not only for children. Their role is to represent individuals before God, to watch over them always, to aid their prayer, and to present their souls to God at death.

The concept of an angel assigned to guide and nurture each human being is a part of Catholic doctrine and piety based on Scripture but not directly drawn from it. Jesus' words in Matthew 18:10 best support the belief: "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father."

Devotion to the angels began to develop with the birth of the monastic tradition. A feast in honour of the guardian angels was first observed in the 16th century. In 1615, Pope Paul V added it to the Roman calendar.
