What does the Word of God say to us this Sunday, celebrating the Solemnity of the Ascension?

First Reading (Acts 1:1-11). We hear of the ascension of Jesus into heaven, and of his promise to send the Holy Spirit to his disciples.

Second Reading (Ephesians 1:17-23). Paul sets out the meaning of the ascension: God raised Jesus above all earthly powers, and made him head of the Church and Lord of creation.

Gospel (Luke 24:46-53). Before ascending to heaven, Jesus promises to send the Holy Spirit to his disciples.

The reading from Acts speaks of the Ascension of Jesus. It also shows how Jesus, now in the glorious presence of his Father, continues to act through the Holy Spirit and through his followers.


The theological meaning of the feast is expressed in the Second Reading: God has glorified Jesus, raising him above all earthly powers, and making him head of the Church and Lord of creation.

The Gospel Reading contains Luke's first account of the Ascension, which is here presented as occurring immediately after the Resurrection. The risen Lord shows the apostles how the Scriptures had foretold that the Christ would suffer and rise again. Jesus also gives them a mission - the proclamation of repentance and forgiveness of sins - and promises to send the Holy Spirit to them. They return in joy to Jerusalem to await the Spirit. The word of salvation will go forth from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth.



We are reminded that May is the month dedicated to Mary, whom we honour as the first disciple, Mother of God and Mother of the Church. We recognise Mary as the one who listened and responded to the call of God.

How will you honour Mary during this month of May?

On **24th May we celebrated the Feast Day of Mary, Help of Christians, Patron Saint of Austr**alia. This feast day was instituted by Pope Pius VII in 1815, in thanksgiving for the deliverance of the Holy See from the tyranny of Napoleon.

In the same way, we pray for Mary's intercession that God would continue to bless and protect our parish, our families and our nation.

God entrusted his Son to a woman, a mother. Jesus could have come into the world in any number of ways. However, God placed his Son into the arms of a mother. He knew that Mary would be devoted to Jesus as a mother always is to her child. And from the Cross, Jesus gives his mother to be our mother, the mother of the Church, mother of the faithful.



Memorare

The Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary—31st May

History of the Feast



The feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary celebrates the visit of Mary, the Mother of God, with the child Jesus in her womb, to her cousin Elizabeth. The visit took place when Elizabeth was herself six months' pregnant with the forerunner of Christ, Saint John the Baptist.

The Visitation is mentioned only in Luke's Gospel, and Luke tells us that Mary stayed with her cousin about three months, returning home just before Elizabeth gave birth. The angel Gabriel told Mary at the Annunciation that Elizabeth was six months pregnant, and Luke seems to indicate that the Blessed Virgin departed for her cousin's home very soon after the Annunciation. We celebrate the Annunciation on March 25 and the Birth of Saint John the Baptist on June 24, about three months apart. Yet we celebrate the Visitation on May 31—a date that doesn't make sense according to the biblical narrative. Why is the Visitation celebrated on May 31?

While many Marian feasts are among the first feasts to have been celebrated universally by the Church, East and West, the celebration of the Visitation, even though it is found in Luke's Gospel, is a relatively late development.

It was supported by Saint Bonaventure and adopted by the Franciscans in 1263. When it was extended to the universal Church by Pope Urban VI in 1389, the date of the feast was set as July 2, the day after the octave (eighth) day of the feast of the Birth of Saint John the Baptist. The idea was to tie the celebration of the Visitation to the celebration of his birth, even though the placement of the feast in the liturgical calendar was out of sync with the account given by Luke. In other words, symbolism, rather than chronology, was the deciding factor in choosing when to commemorate this important event.



For close to six centuries, the Visitation was celebrated on July 2, but with his revision of the Roman calendar in 1969 (at the time of the promulgation of the <u>Novus Ordo</u>, the new form of the Mass), Pope Paul VI moved the celebration of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary to the last day of the Marian month of May so that it would fall between the feasts of the Annunciation and the Birth of Saint John the Baptist—a time when Luke tells us that Mary would certainly have been with Elizabeth, taking care of her cousin in her time of need.

In the Visitation, we celebrate the meeting of two great women in Salvation History: Mary, mother of Jesus and Elizabeth, mother of John the Baptist. There Mary prays her great prayer of praise, the Magnificat.

Saints We Remember This Week

St Justin, martyr(100-165 AD) —Feast Day 1 June



Justin was born in Palestine at the start of the second century. Searching for truth, he travelled to big cities, where he talked and studied with wise teachers. One day, a stranger told Justin to read the Old Testament prophets, who had foretold the coming of Christ. He did this, and it led him to see that the Christian religion taught the truth. He was baptised.

Justin began to speak and write in defence of Christianity. His books give us insight into the early Church. In one of them he described the ceremony of Baptism around the year 160. It was similar to the ceremony today. In another place, he wrote that the Sunday meetings of the Christian community included readings from Scripture, a homily, offering of bread and wine, and giving Holy Communion.

In about 165, Justin was arrested for being a Christian but refused to give up his faith. The judge asked him, "Do you have an idea that you will go to heaven and receive some suitable rewards?" Justin answered, "It is not an idea that I have; it is something that I know well and hold to be most certain." The judge ordered him killed.

Charles Lwanga (1860–1886) Feast Day 3 June

Charles was born in Uganda in 1860. He first learned of Christ's teachings in the court of Chief Mawulugungu. While a catechumen, he entered the royal household as assistant to Joseph Mukaso, head of the court pages.

Charles was wholly dedicated to the Christian instruction of the younger boys. He protected his fellow pages, aged 13 to 30, from the homosexual demands of the Bagandan ruler, Mwanga, and encouraged and instructed them in the Catholic faith during their imprisonment for refusing the ruler's demands.

Led by Charles Lwanga and Joseph Mukasa, the young men were killed because of their Christian Faith and their refusal to obey the immoral and abusive orders of the king. Also killed with the Catholic martyrs honored today, are a group of Anglican martyrs. All shared the same fate, regardless of their faith tradition. For his own unwillingness to submit to the immoral acts and his efforts to safeguard the faith of his friends, Charles was burned to death at Namugongo on June 3, 1886, by Mwanga's order.



Although King Mwanga believed the murders would bring an end to Christianity, the number of catechumens only grew from 800 to 3000 in the year after St. Charles Lwanga and other martyrs' deaths.

Pope Paul VI canonised St. Charles and his companions on October 18, 1964, during the Third Session of the Second Vatican Council.
