What do the readings say to us this Sunday?

First Reading (Jeremiah 1:4-5, 17-19). This reading tells of the call and commission of the prophet Jeremiah.

Second Reading (1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13). Paul stresses the primacy of love in the life of a Christian. Without the capacity for true selfless love we are as nothing.

Gospel (Luke 4:21-30). Jesus shared the fate of every true prophet: rejection by his own people.

The **First Reading** tells of the call and commissioning of the prophet Jeremiah. Jeremiah never wanted to be a prophet and was overwhelmed by the sheer burden of it. He stands out as a lonely figure whose mission seemed to have failed. He is the supreme example, until Jesus, of the “triumph of failure”.


The **Gospel** is a continuation of last Sunday’s reading. We see the reaction to the message Jesus gave in the synagogue at Nazareth. The people can’t believe that the words of Isaiah could apply to him, the humble son of Joseph. On hearing that the benefits they have rejected will be offered to the Gentiles, the people rise up in fury and attempt to do away with Jesus. This foreshadows the ultimate fate of Jesus; but his hour has not yet come.

Quote/Reflection based on this Sunday’s readings

“Just as God called Jeremiah and Paul and told them to give His message even in the face of conflict, Jesus also experienced rejection and prepared the apostles to expect rejection. Today the Church experiences persecution, rejection and misunderstanding, yet continues to preach and teach and minister in the name of Jesus because the Church is called to continue the ministry of Jesus, welcome or unwelcome. If we realised this then hopefully we might understand that the Church’s teaching and preaching is to help build the reign of God in our lives, bringing every spiritual blessing destined for humanity.”

Vale—Fr Manoj Manuel

On Saturday, 5th February, the feast of St Agatha, we shall offer the 9:15am Mass for the repose of the soul of Fr Manoj and for his mother and members of the family.

Fr Manoj Manuel unexpectedly died of a cardiac arrest on 17 January 2022 in Aizawl, Mizoram, India where he was holidaying. The Requiem Mass and Christian Burial for Fr Manoj was conducted on 20 January in India. A Diocesan Memorial Mass was celebrated at Our Lady of Rosary Cathedral, Waitara on Friday 28 January.

Fr Manoj had been appointed to Holy Name Parish, Wahroonga, to take up duties at the beginning of April after three month extended leave in India.

Fr Manoj was born on 3 July 1976 and ordained for the Diocese of Kohima, Nagaland on 5 January 2005. He had been working in Australia for the past three years, initially on appointment in the Diocese of Wilcannia-Forbes at Warren, and then Narromine, Trangie and Peak Hill Parishes. Fr Manoj joined us in the Diocese of Broken Bay in January 2021 and served at the Cathedral Parish of Hornsby until his appointment to the Parish of Wahroonga in December 2021.

During his short time with us in Australia, Fr Manoj demonstrated great pastoral commitment. He is remembered for his gentle and gracious spirit and his compassion for others. He was greatly appreciated by the people of the Cathedral Parish, and had been looking forward to being part of the Parish of Wahroonga. His sudden passing has come as a great shock.





We remember this week

Saint John Bosco - 1815 to 1888 Feast Day 31 January

Born in Italy in 1815, John was educated in the faith and in living according to the Gospel message by his mother. He was just nine years old when he had a dream, which called him to dedicate himself to the education of young people. While still a boy, he began to entertain his peers with games alternated with work, prayer and religious education. On becoming a priest in 1841, he chose as his life's program: "Da mihi animas cetera tolle" ("Give me souls, take all the rest" Gen. 14: 21). He began his apostolate among poor youth whom he placed under the patronage of St. Francis de Sales.

He led young people to meet Christ by means of his educational style and pastoral practice, based on reason, religion and loving kindness. .



The source of his indefatigable activity and of the effectiveness of his work was his "constant union with God" and his unlimited confidence in Mary Our Help who he considered to be the inspiration and support of his whole work.

He left a form of religious life that was simple but founded on solid Christian virtue and on 'contemplation in action', which may be summed up in the words "work and temperance."

He sought his best collaborators among his young people establishing the Society of St. Francis de Sales (Salesians). Together with St. Maria Domenica Mazzarello, he founded the Institute of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians (Salesian Sisters).

Together with good and hard-working lay men and women, he created the Salesian Co-operators to work alongside him and sustain the education of young people. In the centenary of his death, which took place on January 31, 1888, Pope John Paul II proclaimed him "The Father and Teacher of Youth".

St. Agatha 231-251 Feast Day 5 February

Historically we know little about St Agatha. We do know that she was martyred in Sicily during the persecution of the Roman emperor Decius around 251. According to legend handed down through the Christian community, Agatha was a beautiful young woman from a distinguished family who, instead of marrying, chose to remain a virgin as a sign of her complete devotion to Jesus Christ. Such a lifestyle choice was clearly at odds with the culture of her times and made her a clear target in the state's persecution of Christians. Taunted by the cruel Senator Quintianus who tried to break her spirit and commitment, Agatha showed unswerving firmness in faith. At the hands of Quintianus she was then arrested, tortured, sent to a house of prostitution to be abused and later put to death. Agatha's story is no 'sweet tale'! It is a story of tragedy and brutality. Yet it is also deeply inspiring. It speaks of radical Christian fidelity, feminine strength, youthful courage.



St Agatha reminds us of the courage of so many of our young (and not so young) people today. In a society where virginity is scoffed at and sex before marriage is taken for granted, there are still those who stand firm in their Christian beliefs, even when they suffer ridicule or lack of support from their peers.

Agatha encourages us all to have confidence in the truth. If we try to hide our Christian faith so as to be accepted by others, what kind of witness is that? Stand up and declare yourself a Christian! This is what this young woman has said with her life. What will be our response today?

St Agatha could be a saint to turn to in praying for courage, standing up for what we believe, resisting pressure to conform to the status quo, in our commitment to our vocation, in growing in inner strength, healing victims of sexual abuse and praying for persecuted Christians

Pray with St Agatha:

It is said that, upon her arrest, Agatha prayed: ***'Jesus Christ, Lord of all things! You see my heart, you know my desires. Possess all that I am. Make me worthy to overcome the devil.'***

And in prison: ***'Lord, my creator, you have protected me since I was in the cradle. You have taken me from the love of the world and given me patience to suffer. Now receive my spirit.'***

Take up a phrase from Agatha's prayer and allow it to resonate in your mind and heart as you go about your day today.

IN CASE OF A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: Our Church is equipped with a defibrillator in the event of a cardiac arrest. It is located near the entrance to the church, next to the notice board.
