From Fr Paul

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi, the body and blood of Christ, highlights one of the distinctive features of Catholic faith, among the world religions and philosophies.

Jesus refers to himself as "the living bread come down from heaven". We, his disciples, are to be fed and nourished by this "living bread come down from heaven" as we make our way to the freedom and joy and eternal salvation of our homeland in heaven, where we will remain in the love of the Trinity.

St John tells us at the beginning of his Gospel that Jesus is the Word of God made flesh. By his word, this sacrament of the body and blood of Christ is instituted:

He broke bread saying: "Take and eat if it, for this is my body, which will be given up for you." He took the chalice saying: "This is the chalice of my blood...which will be poured out for you."

Bread and wine is transformed, trans-substantiated by the power of Jesus' Word and the action of the Spirit. This is something not of our own making, but something instituted by Christ himself: we celebrate the Eucharist at his command:

"Do this in remembrance of me; do this in memory of me"



Our Vigil Mass this weekend is designated a special **Family Mass**; we welcome especially the Year 4 students of our parish, along with their families and teachers. (This Mass to be followed by a sausage sizzle). Thanks to Samantha Sheather (REC, Prouille) and Sally Oong (Sacramental Coordinator) for their assistance and organization.

The Word for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi - the Body and Blood of Christ

Introduction:

All of today's readings are set in the context of the Passover. **The First Reading** recalls the old covenant celebrated at Mt Sinai following the first Passover and the Exodus.

Quoting Moses' words in **today's Gospel**, Jesus elevates and transforms this covenant symbol to an extraordinary reality. In the "new and eternal covenant" made in the blood of Christ, we truly become one with His body and blood.

First Reading (Exodus 24:3-8). This reading describes the solemn recognition of the covenant God made with Moses and the people on Mount Sinai.

Second Reading (Hebrews 9:11-15). Through the redeeming work of Christ, God has entered into a new and eternal covenant with his people.

Gospel (Mark 14:12-16, 22-26). This describes the preparation and the celebration of the Passover meal Jesus ate with his disciples the night before he died.

Reflections and Quotes for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi (the Holy Body and Blood of Christ):

Listen to the Catholic faith of the early Church:

"No one may share the Eucharist with us unless he believes that what we teach is true, unless he is washed in the regenerating waters of baptism for the remission of his sins, and unless he lives in accordance with the principles given us by Christ.

We do not consume the eucharistic bread and wine as if it were ordinary food and drink, for we have been taught that as Jesus Christ our Saviour became a man by the power of the Word of God, so also the food that our flesh and blood assimilates for its nourishment becomes the flesh and blood of the incarnate Jesus by the power of his own words contained in the prayer of the Eucharist (ie: the prayer of thanksgiving)."

From the First Apology of St. Justin the Martyr, c. 155 AD


We receive Christ that we may become Christ. **St Augustine** (354 - 430 AD) taught that 'who is standing around the altar' cannot be separated from 'who is on the altar'. At every Mass it is the Body of Christ, the Church, which is gathered around the Body of Christ on the altar, the table of the Lord. The Eucharist helps the community of Christian faith to become who we truly are, the Body of Christ.

"The Eucharist is not a prize for the perfect but a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak". *Pope Francis*

This saying from Pope Francis is both a rebuke to the spiritually proud and an encouragement for those who acknowledge their unworthiness to receive Holy Communion.

"Receiving the Eucharist means adoring Him whom we receive. Only in this way do we become one with Him, and are given, as it were, a foretaste of the beauty of the heavenly liturgy. The act of adoration outside Mass prolongs and intensifies all that takes place during the liturgical celebration itself."

Parish Ministries - Further Request for Volunteers

I extend my thanks to all those engaged in the ministries, groups & works of the parish; I especially acknowledge those in the ministries related to the celebration of the Liturgy.



<u>Thank you to those who offered to volunteer for a ministry or work in the life of the parish.</u> We will be in touch over the coming weeks to finalise our new rosters.

We still have vacancies in these ministries. Sign up sheets are at the entrance to the Church.

Servers

For serving at the altar, which represents the sacrifice of Christ; and for assisting the priest who represents Christ (*in persona Christi*) and for assisting the assembly of the baptised, where Christ is also present. For ensuring that the Liturgy is conducted to give honour to God.

For all ages! We have both Senior and Junior Servers. Full training is given. This ministry is on a roster basis. Usually once a month or if required for special Masses etc.

Wardens

For helping us gather money and gifts given by God's people for the welfare of our parish and diocese, and for those who are poor and in need.

Our wardens hand out and collect the giving baskets during Mass. They are on a roster basis—approximately every 2-3 weeks.

Flower Arrangement and Altar Society

For making our Church a beautiful and worthy place to meet the Lord, showing outwardly our love and respect for the Lord and his house, which is to be "a house of prayer for all people". *No formal training required. If you love flowers and would like to beautify our Church, this is for you. Approximately 5-6 times a year (roster is for 2 consecutive Fridays or Saturdays – whichever suits you better). Usually done in pairs of helpers. Our Altar Society dust, clean and polish our Church at times convenient to them.*

Children's Liturgy and Catechists

For those who bring the joy of the Gospel to the young children and youth of our parish, helping them know that they are loved by God and that He has a message for them to live by.

All training and resources are provided. Children's Liturgy is held during Term time and we are looking forward to restarting this ministry in the very near future. We hope to have a roster for once every month (this is totally dependent on how many volunteers we can get).

Our Catechists are given full training and all resources are provided. They visit two local state schools on a weekly basis (during Term time). Usually the time in each classroom is approximately 40 minutes per week. Wednesdays and Thursdays are the current days we visit the schools.

Hospitality

For those who extend hospitality through preparing and serving refreshments. St Paul reminds us *"make hospitality your special care"*.

This involves setting up tables prior to Mass commencing, with disposable cups, sugar, milk and stirrers; to ensure the coffee and tea pots are prepared and ready to fill with hot water. Place morning tea food (provided) on plates/trays and have ready to serve as people leave the Church after Mass. A very social and enjoyable experience (even when cleaning up afterwards, which is also part of this ministry. This involves packing the tables away, washing any pots and plates and putting any rubbish out).

Piety Store

We have a variety of cards, books, Sacramental gifts, Holy Cards, medals, rosaries and gifts. Our team of volunteers open the store after some of the weekend Masses, or you can contact the Parish Office if you need something during the week. *We are always in need of more volunteers*.

I also acknowledge the prayer and faith-sharing groups in our parish and those who reach out to meet the practical and spiritual needs of many in our local community and beyond.

A special word of thanks to all those who coordinate the rosters for each ministry.

Since February this year, Holy Name Parish has begun the practice of celebrating a morning "holy hour" before Masses on Tuesday through to Friday from 8-9am.

8:00-8:30	30 minutes of silent adoration with the Lord
8:30-8:45	Celebration of "Lauds" – the official Morning Prayer of the Church
8:45-9:00	Recitation of the Holy Rosary
9:05am	Short benediction and reposition of the Blessed Sacrament
9:15am	Mass begins

The morning holy hour is open to everyone, and you are most welcome to join us at any time throughout the hour. Our hope is that parishioners would join the clergy in the praying of Morning Prayer. To make this possible, we have now **started displaying the prayers on the big screen each morning** for parishioners to follow along and pray aloud. (see picture provided)

Morning Prayer is one part of the "Liturgy of the Hours," which is considered alongside the Mass as the official public prayer of the Church. Its structure is based around the reading of the Psalms as Jesus would have prayed daily, and is supplemented with a hymn, several antiphons, a short reading and some intercessions. It is led by two cantors in the front pews of the Church (usually Fr Paul and Deacon Sam), and the congregation on each side of the Church take turns with them reciting each paragraph of the Psalms and responses. The whole prayer takes about 15 minutes and is very easy to learn and follow along.

Days to Remember this Week

Solemnity of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus—11 June

Sacred Heart, also called **Sacred Heart of Jesus**, in Catholicism, the mysticalphysical **heart of Jesus** as an object of devotion. In addition to a feast, now celebrated on the Friday of the third week after Pentecost, devotion includes acts of consecration and honour given to the image of the **Sacred Heart**.

Jesus exhibits to the world His Sacred Heart as the symbol of God's infinite love - the symbol of His own generous self-sacrificing love. Jesus shows His Divine Heart as a furnace whose burning rays of love are able to reanimate faith and rekindle love in hearts grown cold and ungrateful.

But why His Heart? Because in every language, in every age, the heart is regarded as the natural symbol of love and affection. What more natural and expressive symbol is there, then, of the excessive love of Jesus than His Sacred Heart? The direct and material object of devotion to the Sacred Heart is the real, physical Heart of Jesus - the Heart of flesh, the living and loving Heart of our Blessed Lord; the Heart that beat in His Divine breast at the moment of the Incarnation; the Heart that loved us during the life of Jesus on earth, that poured forth its blood to the last drop on Mount Calvary; the beatified Heart now glorious in Heaven and still dwelling among us in the Blessed Sacrament; the Heart ever united to the Person of the Divine Word, to whom is due supreme homage and adoration.

The Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary—12 June



The main difference between the devotions to the hearts of Jesus and Mary is that the one concerned with Jesus emphasises his divine heart as being full of love for mankind, but with this love for the most part being ignored or rejected, while devotion to Mary's heart is essentially concerned with the love that her heart has for Jesus, for God.

The love of her heart is meant to be a model for the way we should love God. The fact that her heart is immaculate, that is sinless, means that she is the only fully human person who is able to really love God in the way that he should be loved.

Honouring Mary's Immaculate Heart is really just another way of honoring Mary as the person who was chosen to be the Mother of God, recognising her extraordinary holiness and the immense love she bestowed on Jesus as his mother, the person who was called to share in and co-operate in his redemptive sufferings.

The aim of the devotion is to unite mankind to God through Mary's heart, and this process involves the ideas of consecration and reparation. A person is consecrated to Mary's Immaculate Heart as a way of being completely devoted to God. This involves a total gift of self, something only ultimately possible with reference to God; but Mary is our intermediary in this process of consecration.
