Our Economy

The enormous changes to the world economy wrought by the pandemic crisis can give us a chance to reassess the world economic situation and its social justice implications for us as Catholics.

For the past thirty years, approximately, we have accepted the economic philosophy of neoliberalism. We are now able to see, during this period of economic pause, that there is enormous inequality in the developed world. This is an issue that has been addressed by the Australian Bishops in a Social Justice Statement a few years ago. It has also been examined by thinkers including Piketty in France.

Until the Covid-19 pandemic intervened Pope Francis had planned to bring together a gathering of young economists, entrepreneurs, and change-makers who can work out a plan to create a more just and inclusive economy that will serve people rather than narrow self-interest. Hopefully this meeting can still go ahead after the crisis.

We, as Catholics in Australia, can play our part by holding our political leaders to account to ensure that, in reducing the large national debt, the poor and disadvantaged will not be suffering more by an even lower income.

Readings at Mass for Easter

Sunday 12 April 2020

First reading

Acts 10:34, 37-43

'We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection'

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead – and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

Responsorial Psalm

Response: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love has no end.

Let the sons of Israel say:

Second reading

Colossians 3:1-4

Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

Gospel John 20:1-9

He must rise from the dead

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

Easter Reflection from Fr Vince

Recently I saw a sign, "I didn't intend to give up this much for Lent". I think most of us understand the sentiments immediately. This Lent started like most others but who could have foreseen the deprivations we have taken on in recent weeks. The forty days of Lent are over, Jesus is risen and is victorious over death; but the distancing and isolation and the real threats of the coronavirus continue. How do we hold the two together?

The resurrection happened early in the morning on the first Easter Sunday, but the disciples continued to be afraid, locking themselves in a room, leaving the city, or going to the tomb to grieve. The gospel accounts of the resurrection are not about immediate celebration and rejoicing. They tell us how disciples *slowly* came to the realisation that Jesus was alive. They are all stories of emerging life from death, hope from despair, coming slowly and sometimes reluctantly to faith. At the ascension some were still hesitant to believe. Only at Pentecost was their faith strong enough to finally leave the upper room.

Read some of the resurrection stories yourself - they are at the end of each of the gospels - and let these accounts of the disciples coming to faith feed our hope that Jesus is the Risen Lord, victorious over death and glorious, even in a world weighed down under the coronavirus pandemic.
