Social Justice

Mental Health for Older People

This year's Social Justice Statement next turns to our older people, quoting a study in 2006 which said that, "Older Australians have the best mental health across the lifespan. This study was done before the Global Financial Crisis, the prolonged drought, the recent bushfire crisis, and the current pandemic which have all impacted adversely on our older Australians.

The document says that "For those in declining health with few social supports, however, the experience of social isolation can cause depression and exacerbate preexisting mental health problems. Major changes increase distress – grief for deceased spouses and friends, limited finances, losing independence and moving into residential aged care".

A quotation from Beyond Blue: "Depression was like being in a black hole and not being able to climb out. A feeling of hopelessness. Unable to do anything, unable to drive, unable to think clearly. A terrible feeling of being alone which was different from being lonely".

It concludes, "People aged over 75 receive some of the lowest levels of mental health care. Because depression is regarded as common among frail-aged people in aged care, it may be seen as 'normal' and individuals and their carers are less likely to identify and treat the illness"



Gospel

Matthew 18:21-35

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother, if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times.

'And so the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with is wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At this, the servant threw himself down at his mater's feet, 'Give me time,' he said, 'and I will pay the whole sum.' And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. 'Pay what you owe me,' he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, 'Give me time and I will pay you.' But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they say what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow servant just as I had pit on you?' And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'
