

From Pope Francis

A fundamental element of Pentecost Our God is a God is astonishment. of astonishment, this we know. No one expected anything more from the disciples: after Jesus' death they were a small, insignificant group of defeated orphans of their Master. There occurred instead an unexpected event that astounded: the people were astonished because each of them heard the disciples speaking in their own tongues, telling of the great works of God (cf. Acts 2:6-7, 11). Thus the Church is called into being forever: capable of astounding while proclaiming to all that Jesus Christ has conquered death, that God's arms are always open, that his patience is always there awaiting us in order to heal us, to forgive us. The risen Jesus bestowed his Spirit on the Church for this very mission.

We are in a period of unprecedented global crisis because of a virus that has confined a large part of the world's population to their homes, that has damaged the economies of many countries, that has closed churches, that has terrible consequences for the poor and the most destitute and that prevents us from meeting physically to pray together.

But this virus does not prevent us from praying!

On the contrary, it has prompted many prayer initiatives, including ecumenical prayers, around the world. The Holy Spirit brings harmony within us and among us.

Social Justice

Australian police deal with 5,000 domestic violence matters on average every week. That's one every two minutes.

These figures are based on data provided by police services around the country.

The murder of Hannah Clarke and her three children are such deviations from the norm that we desperately try to rationalise the event. We blame the monster, rather than the man and the society that allowed these murders to unfold.

The truth is that Hannah had left her former husband late last year, which for many victims of family violence, is the time when the risk of violence escalates. The violence helpline is 1800 RESPECT.

"The monster myth perpetuates a comforting lack of self-awareness ... we can only move past violence when we recognise how it is enabled; by attributing it to the mental illness of a singular human being, we ignore its prevalence, its root causes in society and the self-examination required to end the cycle".

Readings at Mass

First Reading Acts 2:1-11

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

In the one Spirit we were all baptised

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit. There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.
