15th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A 2020 12th July 2020 Parable of the Sower



Today's Gospel tells us the parable of the sower. In the parable, Jesus compares the Word of God to the seeds that are sown in a field. The point of the parable of the seeds is obviously "good ground." We have to be receptive to the Gospel in order for it to produce the good fruit of holiness and happiness that God intends. Listening to the Word of God can and should be paramount for us. That means that we are "listening in faith" - ...preparing "good ground." But it is not just a matter of hearing sounds or reading words. It is not just a matter of human wisdom and understanding - we must allow the Spirit within us to take what the living God is saying and put it into action. So, being "good ground" really means being open to and aware of the presence of God around us. It means being able to tune out the distractions. It means letting go of so many of the thoughts and cares that seem so important - and it means making room for the "seed" which is the power and love of God. Once we have received this seed, we must protect it, nourish it and cultivate it.

The reopening of our churches for Sunday Mass can be a turning point for us. And it should help us to understand more fully that "becoming Eucharist for others" is just as important as "receiving the Eucharist." Church buildings may have been closed, but "church" has always remained alive. "Seed" and "good ground" are powerful images of what freedom looks like to Jesus. For Matthew, being "good ground" is a gift that builds faith; but there is no genuine faith unless it is translated into decisive action. It is worth noting that many great works had very humble beginning like tiny seeds that fell on the ground.

Understanding COVID-19 Restrictions – Places of Worship Diocese of Broken Bay Fact Sheet What's new from 1 July 2020?

Under the Public Health Order (No 4) 2020, effective from 1 July 2020 the following restrictions have been revised:

- The number of people allowed inside indoor venues (including places of worship) will be determined by the 'one person per 4 square metre' rule, with no upper limit. All activity must be seated only.
- Occupiers of the premises must develop and comply with a COVID-19 Safety Plan. A copy of the plan must be kept on the premises and made available for inspection by an authorised officer as requested.

All other restrictions including 20 guests inside the home and 20 for outside gatherings remain the same.

Parish Priests are required to allow employees to work from home if reasonably practicable in the context of the operational needs of the Parish.

What does this mean for places of worship?

- The number of people in a public place of worship must not exceed one person per 4 square metres.
- When calculating the number of people permissible in the church for a religious service, the Celebrant, concelebrants, Deacon, server and other essential ministers are excluded from the head count. All members of the congregation should be counted, including children. The calculation must be made by measuring the floor space of the areas open to the public. For our Churches, this means the sanctuary, sacristy, or other areas where people would not congregate are not included in the calculations. The maximum number of people allowed in the church should be displayed on all entry points to the church.

People attending a religious service will be required to provide their name and contact details (phone or email) when they enter so that they can be used for contact tracing. The details of one adult member per household is sufficient. Parishioners are requested to receive Holy Communion in hand. More details are available on the notice board.


