By your endurance you will gain your lives.

Prophet Malachi gives a vivid description about the end of the world. Malachi severely warns the arrogant and those who disobey the Lord God. He gives a message of comfort and consolation to those who fear the Lord God and live upright lives. Hence for evil doers, it will be a day of judgement. But for the upright, it will be a day of salvation.

Today's Gospel also gives the clear description of the end of the world. Jesus speaks of the destruction of the city of Jerusalem and predicts disaster for the rest of the world. He gives us some warning and timelines about the events to come like wars and fighting, earthquakes, plagues and famines in various places and finally His followers will face many persecutions for their faith in Him. But Jesus assures us that we His followers need not worry because, "Not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your lives." We are invited to take these warnings of the Lord seriously in our lives so that we can face the end of the world when it happens.

We know that Jesus lived His life fully, celebrating each moment, each encounter, and each relationship with joy. He embraced human experience, drank deeply of human emotions, was nourished and comforted by human love. But He was always looking into the eyes of His Father. He was always conscious of the circle of His human existence, leading Him from God back to God.

Jesus never lost His sense of direction and purpose - and in that sense He was prepared for whatever came. His love of the Father was integrated into all that He said and did and all that He became. There was no event, no person, and no circumstance that ever separated Him from His Father.

This is how we are supposed to live our lives. Through all the trials and sufferings, we experience in our broken world, we are called to celebrate life with joy. We are to bear faithful witness to the Gospel by our lives of hope and unselfish love. We are pilgrims on a journey, and we are not always perfect. But we are filled with hope by our faith in the Jesus who lives and breathes among us.

Guidelines for Reverent Reception of the Holy Communion



The Ordinary Minister of Holy Communion is the Bishop, Priest or Deacon. Those who assist the Ordined are called "Extraordinary" Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC).

Immensae Caritatis provides clear criteria for the selection of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC). This includes: Persons whose good qualities of Christian life, faith, and morals recommend them. Persons who foster their own devotion to the Eucharist and show an example to the rest of the faithful by their own devotion and reverence toward the most Blessed Sacrament of the Altar. No one is to be chosen whose appointment the faithful might find disquieting Selection Criteria. In addition to this in the Diocese of Broken Bay it would be important to clarify that they are: A fully Initiated Catholic (Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist), A regular Communicant, and; At least 16 years of age.

Practical Instructions: The EMHC should arrive at church at least 15 minutes prior to Mass commencing so they may check themselves in for their ministry. The EMHC should consider how they present themselves for this ministry of service, and the representation of the parish. This includes ensuring that hands have been thoroughly cleaned prior to arrival and clothing has been appropriately considered. The EMHC should not approach the Altar until after the Priest has received Holy Communion. In line with local practice, it may be appropriate for the EMHC to discretely approach the Sanctuary during the Lamb of God.

It is strongly recommended that ALL Ministers of Holy Communion sanitise their hands at this time, ensuring the sanitiser has been fully rubbed in and is dry on their hands. The Ordained Minister, as the Ordinary Minister of Holy Communion, will distribute Holy Communion to the EMHCs. It is then the role of the Ordinary Minister to pass on the vessel containing the Eucharist to the EMHC - It should never be taken from the Altar by the EMHC. The Ministers of Holy Communion reverently and respectfully move to their place of distribution, ensuring they have a steady grip on the Ciborium or Chalice. The vessel should not be elevated by the Minister when walking to their place. Once in place, the Minister is encouraged to steady their stance by taking a breath before commencing distribution.

The Body of Christ If distributing the Body of Christ, as the Communicant comes forward and gently bows, the EMHC holds up the host to eye level and says the words, "The Body of Christ", allowing the Communicant to reply "Amen." This is a dialogue of faith, and a space of encounter that should not be rushed. No other words should be added to the dialogue, even if the EMHC happens to know the individual (i.e. "Lucy, the Body of Christ" or "The Body of Christ, John" should never be said). It is the Communicant's choice to receive on the hand or on the tongue, standing or kneeling. If receiving on the tongue, the EMHC gently places the host,

avoiding personal contact with the Communicant's tongue. The EMHC should remain present to the Communicant until they consume the host. This will allow for gentle instruction if the Communicant appears to be walking away with the host.

Blood of Christ the EMHC should ensure the purificator is opened up fully prior to beginning distribution. As the Communicant comes forward and gently bows, the EMHC holds the chalice up slightly to eye level and addresses them with the words "The Blood of Christ" and allowing for them to reply "Amen" prior to gently handing the chalice over to them. The EMHC then brings their hands back towards their body, so the Communicant is aware that they have control over the chalice in this moment. The Communicant raises the chalice to their mouth themselves. (GIRM #286) Importantly, the Communicant must remain standing. Holy Communion is always received from a Minister. It is never taken by the Communicant. For this reason, it is not permitted for a Communicant to dip the host into the chalice and to serve themselves by intinction. (GIRM #286-287) The EMHC, when gently receiving the chalice back, wipes the inside and outside of the rim of the chalice with the purificator, on the area that the Communicant just received from. Practically, the EMHC should grip the purificator between their thumb and index finger, rotating the chalice as they wipe. It is suggested that while the next Communicant is receiving from the chalice, the EMHC rotates the purificator.

When the EMHC has completed their task of distributing Holy Communion, they should return to the Sanctuary. Vessels with the Body of Christ should be returned to the Altar and placed on top of the corporal. The empty chalice may be returned to the credence table in the Sanctuary area, once again on top of the corporal. Any remaining Precious Blood should be discretely consumed in the Sanctuary area by an Ordained Minister. (GIRM #163/284) The Ordained Minister can delegate this to another Minister. EMHC should return to their seat according to the local custom, without disrupting the reverence of the post communion reflection.

Prayer over people not receiving A person may come forward in the Communion procession with arms folded across their chest to indicate their desire for a blessing, rather than receiving Holy Communion. This is particularly common for children in the Communion procession with their family. While not recognised as part of the Communion Rite, this has become common practice. In Broken Bay it is suggested that a Minister of Holy Communion, either Ordinary OR Extraordinary could extend their hand over the head of the person, and say one of the following or similar;

"May God be with you."

"May God be in your heart."

"May God protect you."

"May Jesus be in your heart and keep you in God's love."



MESSAGE OF THE HOLY FATHER FOR THE 9th WORLD DAY OF THE POOR

33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time 16 November 2025

AR - DE - EN - ES - FR - HR - IT - PL - PT

You are my hope (cf. Ps 71:5)

"You, O Lord, are my hope" (Px 715). These words well up from a heart burdened by grave hardship: "You have made me see many troubles
and calamities" (v. 20), the Psalmist exclaims. At the same time, his heart remains open and confident; steadfast in faith, he acknowledges the
support of God, whom he calls "a rock of refuge, a strong fortress" (v. 3). Hence, his abiding trust that hope in God never disappoints: "In you,
Lord, I take refuge; i shall never be put to shame" (v. 1).

Amid life's trials, our hope is inspired by the firm and reassuring certainty of God's love, poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit. That hope does not disappoint (cf. Rom 5:5). Thus Saint Paul could write to Timothy: "To this end we toil and struggle, because we have our hope set on the living God" (1 Tim 4:10). The living God is in fact "the God of hope" (Rom 15:13), and Christ, by his death and resurrection, has himself become "our hope" (1 Tim 1:1). We must never forget that we were seved in this hope, and need to remain firmly rooted therein.

2. The poor can be witnesses to a strong and steadfast hope, precisely because they embody it in the midst of uncertainty, poverty, instability and marginalization. They cannot rely on the security of power and possessions; on the contrary, they are at their mercy and often victims of them. Their hope must necessarily be sought elsewhere. By recognizing that God is our first and only hope, we too pass from fleetling hopes to a lasting hope. Once we desire that God accompany us on the journey of life, material wealth becomes relativized, for we discover the real treasure that we need. The words that the Lord Jesus spoke to his disciples remain forceful and clear: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consume and where thieves do not break in and steal" (Mt 6:10-20).

3. The gravest form of poverty is not to know God. As Pope Francis wrote in <u>Evangelii Goudlum</u>: "The worst discrimination which the poor suffer is the lack of spiritual care. The great majority of the poor have a special openness to the faith; they need God and we must not fall to offer them his friendship, his blessing, his word, the celebration of the sacraments and a journey of growth and maturity in the faith" (No. 2000). Here we see a basic and essential awareness of how we can find our treasure in God. As the Apostle John Insists: "If anyone says, "I love God," but hates his brother, he is a liar: for whoever does not love his brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen" (1 Jn 4:20).

This is a rule of faith and the secret of hope: all this earth's goods, material realities, worldly pleasures, economic prosperity, however important cannot bring happiness to our hearts. Wealth often disappoints and can lead to tragic situations of poverty — above all the poverty born of the failure to recognize our need for God and of the attempt to live without him. A saying of Saint Augustine comes to mind: "Let all your hope be in God: feel your need for him, and let him fill that need. Without him, whatever you possess will only make you all the more empty" (Enarr. in Ps., 85-3).

4. The word of God tells us that Christian hope is certainty at every step of life's journey, since it does not depend not on our human strength but upon the promise of God, who is always faithful. For this reason, from the beginning, Christians have identified hope with the symbol of the anchor, which provides stability and security. Christian hope is like an anchor that grounds our hearts in the promise of the Lord Jesus, who saved us by his death and resurrection and will come again among us. This hope continues to point us toward the "new heavens" and the "new earth" (2 Per 3:13) as the true horizon of our existence, where every life will find its authentic meaning, for our real homeland is in heaven (cf. Phill 3:20).

The city of God, therefore, impels us to improve the cities of men and women. Our own cities must begin to resemble his. Hope, sustained by God's love poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit (cf. Rom 5:5), turns human hearts into fertile soil where charity for the life of the world can blossom. The Church's tradition has constantly insisted on the circular relationship between the three theological virtues of faith, hope and charity. Hope is born of faith, which nourishes and sustains it on the foundation of charity, the mother of all virtues. All of us need charity, here and now. Charity is not just a promise; it is a present reality to be embraced with joy and responsibility. Charity engages us and guides our decisions towards the common good. Conversely, those who lack charity not only lack faith and hope; they also not their neighbors of hope.

5. The biblical summons to hope thus entails the duty to shoulder our responsibilities in history, without hesitation. Charity, in fact, "is the greatest social commandment" (Catechism of the Catechism of the meantime, each of us is called to offer new signs of hope that will bear witness to Christian charity, just as many saints have done over the centuries. Hospitals and schools, for instance, were institutions established to reach out to the most vulnerable and marginalized. These institutions should be a part of every country's public policy, yet wars and inequalities often prevent this from happening. Today, signs of hope are increasingly found in care homes, communities for minors, centers for listening and acceptance, soup kitchens, homeless shelters and low-income schools. How many of these quiet signs of hope often go unnoticed and yet are so important for setting aside our indifference and inspiring others to become involved in various forms of volunteer work!

The poor are not a distraction for the Church, but our beloved brothers and sisters, for by their lives, their words and their wisdom, they put us in contact with the truth of the Gospel. The celebration of the World Day of the Poor is meant to remind our communities that the poor are at the heart of all our pastoral activity. This is true not only of the Church's charitable work, but also of the message that she celebrates and proclaims. God took on their powerty in order to enrich us through their voices, their stories and their faces. Every form of poverty, without exception; calls us to experience the Gospel concretely and to offer effective signs of hope.

6. This, then, is the invitation extended to us by this Jubilee celebration. It is no coincidence that the World Day of the Poor is celebrated towards the end of this year of grace. Once the Holy Door is closed, we are to cherish and share with others the divine gifts granted us throughout this entire year of prayer, conversion and witness. The poor are not recipients of our pastoral care, but creative subjects who challenge us to find novel ways of living out the Cospel today. In the face of new forms of impoverishment, we can risk becoming hardened and resigned. Each day we encounter poor or impoverished people. We too may have less than before and are losing what once seemed secure: a home, sufficient food for each day, access to healthcare and a good education, information, religious freedom and freedom of expression.

In this promotion of the common good, our social responsibility is grounded in God's creative act, which gives everyone a share in the goods of the earth. Like those goods, the fruits of human labor should be equally accessible to all. Helping the poor is a matter of justice before a question of charity. As Saint Augustine observed: "You give bread to a hungry person; but it would be better if none were hungry, so that you would have no need to give it away. You clothe the naked, but would that all were clothed and that there be no need for supply this lack" (In i loon, 8:5).

It is my hope, then, that this <u>Jubilee Year</u> will encourage the development of policies aimed at combatting forms of poverty both old and new, as well as implementing new initiatives to support and assist the poorest of the poor. Labor, education, housing and health are the foundations of a security that will never be attained by the use of arms. I express my appreciation for those initiatives that already exist, and for the efforts demonstrated daily on the international level by great numbers of men and women of good will.

Let us entrust ourselves to Mary Most Holy, Comforter of the Afflicted and, with her, let us raise a song of hope as we make our own the words of the Te Deum: "In you, O Lord, is our hope, and we shall never hope in vain."

Social Media and Online Safety for Children & Vulnerable Persons

Social Media Changes Are Coming - 1 Month to Go

Safeguarding today also means helping children, young people, and vulnerable adults stay safe in the digital world. From 10 December 2025, new Australian laws will restrict social-media platforms from allowing children under 16 to create or maintain an account. These reforms follow the Online Safety Amendment (Social Media Minimum Age) Bill 2024 and are overseen by the eSafety Commissioner, Australia's independent regulator for online safety.

Major platforms such as Instagram, Facebook, TikTok, Snapchat, X (Twitter), YouTube, and Reddit are expected to be included. Apps designed specifically for children or communication, such as Messenger Kids, WhatsApp, and YouTube Kids, are not currently affected. Social-media companies could face fines of up to \$50 million if they fail to take reasonable steps to prevent under-age use.

The eSafety Commissioner will assess and authorise platforms that comply with the new legal standards, ensuring that online environments for children and families are safer, more transparent, and more responsible.

Things to Try

- Share eSafety Commissioner updates through your parish bulletin or social channels, reminding families that the new laws take effect in December 2025.
- Encourage parents and carers to join a free eSafety webinar and download the latest information flyers.
- Talk with children and teens about digital wellbeing, privacy, and respectful behaviour online.
- Review parish social-media and communication practices to ensure they reflect diocesan safeguarding principles.
- Direct parishioners to the eSafety Kids and eSafety Young People pages for age-appropriate learning.
