The virtue of Fidelity

Today we see two examples of both the blessings and responsibilities of marital fidelity: one from the book of Genesis and the other from the Gospel of Mark.

There are two creation stories in Genesis. The narrative of today's First Reading is the second account. In the first (Genesis 1: 1-2:4), the man and woman are created in one act - they are called 'Adam.' But in this second account, the man is created first. The woman is created from the man's own body. This is not a creation story of subordination by sequence and priority - the man first, then the "lesser" woman. Instead, this is a story of deep intimacy between the two. She is not created from his foot so that he would dominate over her, nor is she created from his head so that she would rule over him. She comes from where his heart is. They are "one flesh" which, in the original language, suggests a new personality. In marriage a new personality is being formed. To achieve this unity while still respecting the uniqueness and even the idiosyncrasies of each, is a feat of great love and labour.

In Jesus' world, marriage was a way of binding together two families. The Pharisees tell Jesus, Moses "allowed/permitted" a decree of divorce. Jesus disagrees and tells them Moses "commanded it." Here Jesus is adding his own teaching. A woman cannot be cast aside so easily as if she were a commodity, once used to bear offspring, now no longer useful. He says their relationship is much more sacred. "The two become one flesh" and no one can separate them because God has joined them.

Jesus presents the ideal today of a permanent loving relationship that reflects God's intentions for humans from the beginning. As it says in our Genesis reading, "the two become one flesh." They are inseparable. The Gospel presents the vision of a whole new way of acting and being. Whether we are married, divorced, single or celibate, we all know how far we are from fully embracing that vision of new life. We struggle to live the Gospel ideal in all walks of life, including marriage, but we fall short. Yet, the Lord comforts us with the realization of how much we are loved by our God and the assurance that this love is unbreakable.

Catechist Q & A with Peter Huby Why did I become a Catechist?

It was the hand of the Holy Spirit. I have no recollection of making the active decision to become a catechist. I was at Mass at Castle Hill and the Catechists were having an information morning in the parish centre next to the main door of the church. I felt a need to go in and hear



what they had to say. I was working full-time at this time and didn't even think about the how or when of being involved. When I returned to work on Monday I asked my manager could I take time off to fulfil my ministry, she said yes, with both of us not knowing what my commitment would be. It turned out to be every Thursday morning for the next three years, she even allowed me to work remotely on Thursdays. I also think that it had a positive effect on my work colleagues. Now I've retired I still feel the conviction of the Holy Spirit to continue.

Why do I continue to be a catechist?

The ongoing feeling that I make a difference in the lives of the students and the school and their teachers. By being a witness to the good news of Jesus, I in my humble way fulfil His great commission. This work also has given my family something to hinge their belief on. I also get to be around people of a like mind, our parish coordinator, our priests, the other catechists and the CCD office who all hold me account and steady me. Even on the worst day in the classroom I come away knowing, it's about God and not me. I feel an immense sense of love for my students, which makes my day, and it's what I come back for again and again. I have also said many times "if people knew how good being a catechist is they'd be queuing at the presbytery". I teach at Gorokan Public School, and these are the most respectful and well behaved children I have met, both in my class and around the school, they are far better behaved than the Castle Hill children.

How have I grown by being in this ministry?

I have completed much training, both in the Parramatta Diocese and in Broken Bay Diocese. In that training I gained the skills and knowledge required to be a catechist, but more over I got knowledge that I needed as a Christian. My faith is my own, God gave some faith and they have no questions, but I needed more knowledge to support my faith. I needed to know, for myself, what the Catechism says, related bible texts and teachings of the church on certain matters. Since being a catechist, I now have a better grasp of nature of God's love, who Jesus is and the power of the Holy Spirit. More over I know how to express it, through, words, action and my attitude. I have become less inhibited about my faith, openly singing, dancing and relating Gods love as a joy that cannot be quenched.


