Vaccination

A message from the Bishop



As the COVID-19 Delta variant continues to spread across the State, with increasing health and mortality consequences, I reiterate the importance of vaccination as a means to protect ourselves and our communities. It is a fact that the virus is spreading largely among the unvaccinated population. Being fully vaccinated is a crucial step in combatting the effects of the virus as well as keeping us safe and the broader community safe. Broad-scale vaccination is critical to enable us to return to some semblance of community normality.

While there is an anti-vaccination movement spreading misinformation via social media, information from health authorities, public health orders and the Premier's vaccination rate targets of 70% by the end of October, are in essence, what will relieve us of further extended lockdowns. An important message is that all vaccines that are recognised as clinically safe and effective, may be taken in good conscience. Pope Francis <u>recently urged Catholics to get vaccinated</u> and I myself, have been fully vaccinated since mid-July.

I strongly encourage you to consider being vaccinated and arrange to do so, as soon as possible in consultation appropriately with your GP as to which vaccine is best for you. While many people are trying to arrange appointments unsuccessfully, the message is to book an appointment now for when you can, even if it is several months away. The Australian Department of Health has developed a number of resources to help explain the vaccination plan. https://www.health.gov.au/initiatives-and-programs/covid-19-vaccines.

Let us do our part for the common good and work together through vaccination as a proactive way out of lockdown life and back to greater socialising and mission within our communities and beyond.

And from the Vicar General

Our vaccination is especially important given that the opening of our churches may now depend on the percentage of the population who are fully vaccinated. It may also be that, along with other social venues, full vaccination be a condition for admission to places of public worship come the end of October and during November. It could be quite problematic if our own churches could not open when other places of public worship were because the clergy of the parish had not been fully vaccinated.

Message from Pope Francis Aug 18 2021

Pope Francis delivered a call to action for the world: Get vaccinated.

"Being vaccinated is an act of love," he said in a public service announcement released Wednesday. "To ensure the majority of people are vaccinated is an act of love."

The pontiff and six other church officials from North, Central and South America called getting inoculated a moral obligation.

"Thanks to God and to the work of many, we now have vaccines to protect us from Covid-19," Francis said. "They grant us the hope of ending the pandemic, but only if they are available to all and if we work together."

Celebrating Sunday in a time of lockdown

For Christians Sunday is special. It is our 'weekly easter' when we take time to celebrate the resurrection and renew our belief in the salvation won for us by Christ. Traditionally, we Catholics celebrate by attending Sunday Mass. With COVID restrictions we can't gather to do this, but it is still the Day of the Lord. Below are a few ideas of how we can celebrate Sunday in a time of lockdown.

A diary date with the Lord

We plan many things in life: work, holidays, study. So, why not put some thought into the way you spend next Sunday? Bring your plans to prayer and see how the Lord leads you.

Take a break

Rest in God's love. Leave the housework, the homework, or the office catch-up for another day. Don't look at your emails. Give your mind a rest. Stop worrying. Place a major anxiety in God's hands.

Smell the roses

Take a deep breath. Take a moment to notice the gifts of creation. Go for a walk in the sunshine. Close your eyes and let the sun shine on your face. Feel the breeze. Plant a seedling. Listen to the rain.

Enjoy God's people

Write or phone a dear friend you haven't seen for a long while. Romance your husband / wife. Enjoy a simple treat with your family: have some ice cream, take a leisurely walk together, have a picnic in the back yard. Make family mealtimes special – they will deepen your sense of the eucharist.

Have some fun

Make pancakes for breakfast and involve the youngest chef of your household. Rumble the kids. Dance with your three year old. Ask a teenager to educate you in an aspect of youth culture. Share some laughs.

Add a touch of prayer

Light a candle together of Sundays. Google a shrine or place of pilgrimage and say a prayer together. Pray together around a 'sacred space' at home. If you are grieving a sorrow, bring your tears to the foot of the cross. Give thanks for a blessing you have received.

Celebrate the saints

Look on the picture of a loved one who has died. Tell your family the gifts you observe in them. Phone a family member who is absent and say 'I love you'. Recall the faith of your ancestors. Read about an inspiring saint. Pray with Mary – gaze upon a Marian icon, pray a decade of the rosary.

Celebrate the Word

Read the Sunday readings. Reflect on the message. If you were the homilist, what would you say? Share it with someone. Pray the Prayers of the Faithful. Write your own prayers.

Eucharist

Remember your First Holy Communion; or a special time when you received communion. Give thanks. Allow yourself to miss receiving communion today.

Mass

Watch "Mass for You at Home". Live-stream Mass from our cathedral. Use the internet to attend a 'virtual' Mass anywhere in the world.

Feed your Faith

It's the Day of the Lord, so give the Lord some thought. Read and inspiring article that turns your mind to God. Play some Christian music. Write in your prayer journal.

Expand your circle of love

Check on an elderly neighbour. Ring someone who lives alone. Ask a work-mate if he / she is OK?

Keep on trying

Sometimes our well-intended plans will not work. It's OK! Don't give up! It takes creativity to celebrate Sunday without Mass; and persistence to keep Sundays holy. Even the 'trying' helps to orientate our lives towards God. Our family will *know* that we are trying. Whatever happens, planned or otherwise, approach it in a spirit of faith and love.

Spiritual Corner: Feasts and saints of the week: (Our extended family in Heaven).

Monday 6 St Donation

Tuesday 7 St Regina was a martyr at Autun, France. Legend has her being the daughter of a pagan, Clement, who was tortured and beheaded during the second century when she refused to marry the proconsul Olybrius.

Wednesday 8 September Our Lady's Birthday Why Catholic's celebrate Mary's birthday? This is because their birthdays are **so intimately associated with Jesus' birth**. St. John the Baptist, was born to announce the coming of our Lord, while our Lady was born to bear God in Her womb and give birth to Him. If John the Baptizer was born to market the Good News, Mary was born to deliver the Good News!

Thursday 9 St Peter Claver Peter Claver was a Spanish Jesuit priest and missionary born in Verdú who, due to his life and work, became the patron saint of slaves, the patron saint of the Republic of Colombia, and the ministry to African Americans.

Friday 10 St Finian Finnian (sometimes called Finbarr "the white head", a reference to his fair hair), was a Christian missionary in medieval Ireland.

Saturday 11 St Jean Gabriel was born in Puech, France, 1802, to a pious family of eight children. Accompanying his younger brother Louis while he was entering the seminary, Jean-Gabriel was ordained at age 23 and taught theology at the seminary before being appointed rector, and later master of novices in Paris - on account of the sanctity his superiors saw in him. I discovered his calling and entered the Congregation of the Mission, founded by St. Vincent de Paul, at the age of 16. His younger brother, Louis, died on his way to preach in China and Jean-Gabriel asked to carry out the mission that had been entrusted to his brother. He arrived on the island of Macao in 1835 and set out for the mainland later that year. He carried out his evangelical labors and his missions bore much fruit in the short time he spent there.

On September 11, 1839 Jean-Gabriel became one of the first victims of the persecutions against Christians, dying in a manner which had a striking resemblance to the passion of our Lord. He was betrayed for a sum of silver, stripped of his garments and dragged from tribunal to tribunal, beaten and tortured continuously until he was sentenced to death with seven criminals. He was crucified and died on a cross. Canonized on June 2, 1996 by Pope John Paul II, St. Jean Gabriel Perboyre was the first saint of China.

We pray to St Jean Gabriel for his intercession for good relations with China.

Synodality



Pope Francis has determined that this will be the hallmark of his pontificate and it is now underway. Over the years to come it will change much of the church as we know it now. It is already happening though like most reforms in the Catholic Church it moves slowly.

^aMany of you will recall that prior to the Vatican Council the Church on earth was called the Church Militant. It was seen like an army – the clergy as the officers, the Pope as commander-in-chief and the laity as the foot soldiers – committed "to pray and obey."

The Vatican Council changed this. It renamed the Church as the People of God. Just like the Jews, as God's people, were led as one by Moses in the desert so the Catholics, led by the Pope moved as one. To become a Jew male circumcision was practised. To become a Catholic both males and females were baptised.

The term Synodality comes from two Greek words meaning "a common road". The Jewish people were on a journey seeking the Promised Land, which lay across the river Jordan. Catholics too are on a common journey, in our case, seeking Heaven.

At the time there was a lot of confusion as to why the church was renamed because nothing seemed to flow from it. Now 60 years later Pope Francis has taken the concept forward. He aims to reformulate the Church so that there is ongoing consultation between clerics and laypeople that leads to a consensus – the "sensus fidelium" or, in English, the sense of the faithful. It is a dialogue designed to ensure that the laity fully participate in the life of the church. It does not mean elections or majority votes like in parliament and in most Protestant denominations. The Pope, as Vicar of Christ on earth, retains the supreme and complete authority. "I will give to you the keys of the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 16:19). What it does mean is an end to the church's top-down leadership. This may take a long while to permeate through the church but permeate it will. Through baptism the Holy Spirit is with every Catholic and guides the faithful as much as He guides the bishops.

"Synodality means ending the church's age-old tradition of top-down leadership and holding open discussions at all levels to decide the future. Autocratic clerics would have to be more cooperative and laypeople would assume more responsibility."

In late May, the Pope outlined a two-year consultation period on Synodality itself starting at the level of dioceses proceeding to the national and regional levels culminating with a **worldwide Synod** at the Vatican in October 2023. In each case, clerics and laypeople will draw up resolutions on what they want the church to do and pass them up to the next level.

Critics have pointed out that the risk of holding the worldwide Synod is that it may create expectations which the Church is incapable of fulfilling.

The Pope has certainly posed a huge challenge for himself and for the Church. Catholics in Africa may have very different ideas to Catholics in the United States and especially to Catholics in countries like Germany. How this is balanced out and how he determines what is the "sense of the faithful" is certainly not going to be easy. Top-down leadership has its advantages but as the massive and ongoing decline in church membership shows it also has huge disadvantages.

The Pope's determination to hold the Synod coupled with his ongoing elevation of Third World Bishops to the College of Cardinals will ensure this reform continues even if at 85 he is not here to complete it.

Social Justice Statement 2021

CRY OF THE EARTH; CRY OF THE POOR

This is a beautiful, optimistic and practical effort on the part of our bishops to help us in this time of climate *crisis* in the world. The statement draws on scripture throughout and is encouraging us to find a deeper relationship with each other and with the wondrous planet on which we live.

Specifically it asks us to relate more closely with our indigenous brothers and sisters, by listening to them and learning from their accumulated wisdom on respect for God's creation. This is a listening with the heart.

The statement looks at human activities resulting in an increase of environmental disasters, and encourages us to find solutions in a changing lifestyle. It notes that this climate *crisis* is affecting to a greater degree the marginalised and people of underdeveloped countries of the world.

The statement offers a number of ways to reduce the effects of the climate *crisis*. A simple example is planting more trees, especially in the overheated concrete and asphalt cities of our world. This solution has already been developed in some parts of the world.

The statement is partly inspired by Pope Francis' encyclical, "Laudato Si" (Praised Be You) and calls us to a conversion of heart and mind. We have been entrusted with the wondrous world of God's creation, which we are asked to nurture and love. Pope Francis urges us to "use" and not "abuse" the gift of our natural world.

The statement recognises the need to for the Church to come together in dialogue with the world. It also recognises that our liturgies reinforce the focus on caring for creation.

The Church has introduced a World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation on 1st September and continuing until the 4th October, the feast of St Francis of Assisi, patron saint of Ecology.

The Grace of Saint Joseph

Pope Francis 31/08/2021 We know that Joseph was a lowly carpenter betrothed to Mary. He was a "just man", ever ready to carry out God's will as revealed to him in the Law and through four dreams. After a long and tiring journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, he beheld the birth of the Messiah in a stable, was no place for them" elsewhere

since "there was no place for them" elsewhere.

He witnessed the adoration of the shepherds and the Magi, who represented respectively the people of Israel and the pagan peoples. Joseph had the courage to become the legal father of Jesus, to whom he gave the name revealed by the angel: "You shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

In the Temple, forty days after Jesus' birth, Joseph and Mary offered their child to the Lord and listened with amazement to Simeon's prophecy concerning Jesus and his Mother. To protect Jesus from Herod, Joseph dwelt as a foreigner in Egypt. After returning to his own country, he led a hidden life in the tiny and obscure village of Nazareth in Galilee, far from Bethlehem, his ancestral town, and from Jerusalem and the Temple.

After Mary, the Mother of God, no saint is mentioned more frequently in the papal magisterium than Joseph, her spouse. Each of us can discover in Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support and a guide in
