

Easing of COVID restrictions

As mentioned last week, Bishop Anthony has sent a letter applying the NSW Government roadmap out of COVID to the Diocese. A summary of how it affects us is:

From Monday 11 October the church will be open for private prayer from 9am to 5pm and Reconciliation will available, by appointment. A change with the new Premier is that funerals and weddings can have up to 100 people. (The limit is 10 people if an unvaccinated person is attending.) Schools will also begin returning on the 11th and all classes will be in attendance by 18th October.

The Monday after 80% vaccination is achieved, which will **possibly be 25**th **October**, Mass, Reconciliation and Baptisms will resume as usual and devotions such as Rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet and the St Michael Prayer Group may also resume.

COVID-safe practices will be required in the church and there will be limitations of what we can do in the celebration of Mass.

From 1 December there will be even less restrictions and we will be settling into the new normal with COVID-19 in the community.

We are still waiting for directions from the Diocese concerning the use of the Parish Office and other facilities.

Delta Variant

Last year when we came out of lock-down we were dealing with the original strain of COVID. Now we are dealing with the more contagious delta variant and not everyone returning to church is vaccinated, so caution is required by all of us. Most of the requirements are familiar to us.

When we arrive at the church we will need to register our attendance by using the QR code or manually. This is to ensure that if one person is infected, that the rest of us will be advised as soon as possible.

We need to sanitise our hands before entering the building and to wear a face mask through-out the Mass. Initially 217 and then 434 people will be permitted in the church. Where possible, we are to remain 1.5m from those belonging to other households. All this is to limit the possibility of spreading the virus.

The social distancing needs our special attention because sometimes we forget. Some hints to help with this. If you are the first to sit in a pew, take a position in the middle of the pew so later people arriving do not need to squeeze past you. Spread out in the communion line and do not come too close (less than 1.5 m) to the person in front of you.

Some people are reluctant to return to Mass because they fear contracting the virus. As an act of love and a sign of welcome, let's make our church as safe as possible for everyone. Please stay safe yourself and let's keep each other safe.

Some changes in our church and hall

From 11 October we can visit the church. Here are some things to note that have changed since we began the lockdown on 26 June.

The **carpet has been steam cleaned**. Hopefully you will notice its freshness and that there are no lines on the carpet from the adhesive tape marking the 1.5 metres required for social distancing. Some of the holes in vinyl covering of the pews have been repaired.

To the left and right of the main entrance you will see two *Tap 'n' Go* machines. These are set at \$5 and \$10. Place your credit or debit card near the screen and you will hear a beep which means you have just donated to the second collection. Thank-you! These are increasingly necessary to provide a means of cashless (and so safe) donations to the parish. It is also a way for visitors to our church to contribute.

Two plaques have been added to the base of the **Statue of St Michael**, recognizing the service of the Michaelites at in our parish from 2001 to 2021 and naming the priests who have been appointed to Our Lady Star of the Sea during these years.

A **TV** screen has been installed in the Mercy Chapel. Increasingly this has become a place where families with young children go to attend Mass so the children do not disturb other parishioners. The screen allows the parents to participate as fully as possible in the celebration of the Mass. Thanks to the parent who donated the screen. (Please note that it is the parents who are opting to go to the Mercy Chapel. Children of any age are always welcome anywhere in the church at all our Masses.)

The servers will notice that all the **albs have been washed and ironed**. This was necessary because they had become quite smelly! Thanks to the parishioner who did this for us. Your alb may not be in exactly the same place, but it will be near where you left it.

The hall has been cleaned. The remains of streamers and balloons have been removed from ceiling and the tiles have all been put in place. The ceiling in the boys' toilets have also been cleaned of toilet paper. Lights and speakers over the stage have been dusted. The black curtains have been removed and the windows have been cleaned. The masking tape has been removed from the floor and the floors have been mopped. Trestle tables have been collapsed and chairs stacked together to give more space. All little things, but together they make a big difference!





Plenary Council Report

The Plenary Council commenced last Sunday. It is being conducted on zoom. The first session, which runs for 8 days, opened with Mass at St Mary's Cathedral, Perth presided over by the Archbishop of Perth, Timothy Costello; he is the President of the Plenary Council, appointed by the Holy Father, Pope Francis.

At this stage there are no reports of actual decisions. The Council is undertaking listening and discernment, hearing the views of many of the 282 participants. Lay participants are already speaking strongly on the need to address the role of women in the church, the problem of clericalism and the need to be inclusive of indigenous and LGBTI people.

This Plenary Council, the fifth in the church's history in Australia, once opened, covered a broad range of thoughts and topics in its first meetings from baptism being the fundamental basis for conversion to the need for the Church to tend to its past and current failures.

Members are divided into 10 groups and requested to reflect on the six themes: conversion, prayer, formation, structures, governance and institutions.

One group spoke of the differences between rural and metropolitan parishes and another pointed out that the council agenda needs to address the issue of ecumenical dialogue and cooperation. Another sought greater involvement for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

A lay delegate Selina Hasham, said that being a church on a "mission of contrition" might be shameful and humbling, but it can also be a "source of new life."

Another lay delegate said that within her group there was a sense of coming to the end of a particular way of being church in the world – a change of era requiring a" new paradigm" of church. The old church has gone. A new church must rise up to take its place. "We need new wineskins", she said.

Another group pointed out the experience of married deacons and priests in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, many of whom are in Australia, and said this had much to offer in terms of clerical formation, particularly the role that wives can play in formation.

During a discussion on clericalism one group asked how we could prevent a "bad culture" of clericalism. They pointed out that clericalism exists in some sections of the laity as well as among the clergy.

The group on governance questioned why women don't have a significant role in governance.

While many members expressed hope about the assembly, others expressed anxiety and emphasised a sense of urgency for change.

Francis Sullivan, the head of Catholic Social Services Australia, is also publishing his daily report at https://cssa.org.au/plenary-council/ Francis Sullivan is a delegate to the Council. He has drawn attention to the stigma surrounding LGBTI people. He states: "The church runs the risk of leaving LGBTI people at the margins. Rather than meeting them and bringing them into the fold they remain off the agenda, left in the too hard basket."

We pray for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit leading to the new Pentecost in Australia.

Spiritual Corner: Feasts and saints of the week: (Our extended family in Heaven).

Monday 11 St John XX111 The high point of his reign was the Second Vatican Council, nicknamed Vatican II, which opened on October 11, 1962. In calling the ecumenical council, he sought a "New Pentecost," a new outpouring of the Holy Spirit. He sought reconciliation for the world's divided Christianity and invited Eastern Orthodox, Anglican, and Protestant observers to attend the proceedings. This ecumenical council of the Roman Catholic Church—the first in 92 years, summoning the bishops of the church—the pope hoped to bring spiritual rebirth to Catholicism and cultivate greater unity with the other branches of Christianity.



Pope John reached the papacy from simple, peasant beginnings. Born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli in 1881, he was the son of an Italian tenant farmer. He was ordained a priest in 1904, and worked as a professor, part-time historian, biographer, and diplomat. As papal envoy to Turkey during World War II, he saved thousands of Jewish lives by helping arrange their escape to Palestine. Roncalli's first high-profile post came in 1944, when he was named papal nuncio to Charles de Gaulle's newly liberated France. It was a delicate post; He carried out the assignment with grace and in 1953 was made a cardinal.

After Pope Pius XII died in 1958, Roncalli was elected leader of the Roman Catholic Church on the 12th ballot. At 77 years of age, he was regarded as an "interim" pope by the Vatican Curia, someone who would follow the status quo for a few years while a younger prelate was bred to succeed him. However, Pope John XXIII soon surprised the Vatican's conservative leadership by taking steps to modernize the church. He met with political and religious leaders from around the world and was the first modern pope to travel freely in Rome, breaking with the tradition that made the pope a "prisoner of the Vatican." He had a warm personality, and spoke with peasants as freely as he did with the foreign dignitaries he invited to Rome. Adored by the Catholic masses, he gradually became a kind of father figure for Catholics around the world. Pope John XXIII died in June 1963, but the council continued under his successor, Paul VI, until 1965. In 2000, Pope John Paul II beatified John XXIII. On April 15 2014 Pope John XXIII and Pope John Paul II were made into saints an unprecedented double papal canonization.

In this time of plenary Council may these great Popes and Saints pray for us.



Tuesday 12 Our Lady of the Pillar is the name given to the Blessed Virgin Mary in the context of the traditional belief that Mary, while living in Jerusalem, supernaturally appeared to the Apostle James the Greater in AD 40 while he was preaching in what is now Spain. Those who adhere to this belief consider this appearance to be the only recorded instance of Mary exhibiting the mystical phenomenon of bilocation. Among Catholics, it is also considered the first Marian apparition, and unique because it happened while Mary was still living on Earth.

Wednesday 13 St Edward the Confessor Edward the Confessor was one of the last Anglo-Saxon kings of England. Usually considered the last king of the House of Wessex, he ruled from 1042 to 1066. Edward was known for his religious faith (he is known as 'the Confessor' because his life was characterised by piety and religious belief). Edward was canonised in 1161 and is considered a saint by the Roman Catholic Church, which regards Edward the Confessor as the patron saint of kings, difficult marriages, and separated spouses.





Thursday 14 St Callistus 1, Pope & martyr Callistus was proclaimed pope in 219 over the protests of his rival candidate Hippolytus. Callistus came to power during a crucial time of the Church. Was it going to hang on to the rigid rules of previous years




and limit itself to those who were already saints or was it going to embrace sinners as Christ commanded? Was its mission only to a few holy ones or to the whole world, to the healthy or to the sick? We can understand Hippolytus' fear -- that hypocritical penitents would use the Church and weaken it in the time when they faced persecution. But Callistus chose to trust God's mercy and love and opened the doors. By choosing Christ's mission, he chose to spread the Gospel to all. Pope Callistus is listed as a martyr but we have no record of how he was martyred or by whom. There were no official persecutions at the time, but he may well have been killed in riots against Christians.

Friday 15 St Teresa of Avila, born Teresa Sánchez de Cepeda y Ahumada, also known as Saint Teresa of Jesus 28 March 1515 – 4 or 15 October 1582, was a Spanish noblewoman who felt called to convent life in the Catholic Church. A Carmelite nun, prominent Spanish mystic, religious reformer, author, theologian of the contemplative life and of mental prayer, she earned the rare distinction of being declared a Doctor of the Church, but not until over four centuries after her death. Active during the Catholic Reformation, she reformed the Carmelite Orders of both women and men. The movement she initiated was later joined by the younger Spanish Carmelite friar and mystic John of the Cross. It led eventually to the establishment of the Discalced Carmelites. A formal papal decree adopting the split from the old order was issued in 1580.





Saturday 16 St Gerard Majella known as the mother's saint



St. Gerard the patron of expectant mothers. He was born in 1726 in Muro, Italy to a family of seven. Majella grew up in poverty with a great respect for the poor. When he was just 12 his father passed away and he was forced to grow up quickly. Shortly after his father's death, his mother sent him away to live with his uncle and learn to become a tailor, like his father. After a few years of working as a sewing apprentice, Majella took on a job with the local Bishop of Lacedonia as a servant.

Once Majella began earning money as a journeyman at the age of 21, he split his earnings with his mother and, the poor of Muro, and the rest in offerings for the poor souls. As the days passed, Majella began to grow pale and thin, often fasting and in prayer at a nearby Cathedral.

He applied to the Capuchin monastery at Muro twice, but was turned down both times. Majella was told his health was not well enough for such a strenuous life. However, Majella did not give up. In 1749, at the age of 23, he joined the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer and just three years later became a professed lay brother.



Saturday 16 St Margaret Mary Alacoque Margaret Mary Alacoque, (July 22, 1647 – October 17, 1690) was a French Roman Catholic Visitation nun and mystic, Margaret Mary was chosen by Christ to arouse the Church to a realization of the love of God symbolized by the heart of Jesus.
