
Psalm 33:2-3, 16-23 R. Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

Second Reading : **Ephesians 5:21-32** Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives submit to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body - and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church. The Word of the Lord.





The Domestic Church

We cannot gather for Mass in the church, but we can pray at home, either alone or with others in the house. When we eventually get back to Mass and Holy Communion let's make sure that we have grown in our prayer life and our relationship with the Lord. We could go back to some of the prayers we used to know well or learn some new ways of praying traditional prayers. Here are a few ideas. *Fr Vince*

Traditional Prayers

Many of us grew up learning prayers by heart. These are a safe place to go to when we do not know what else to say when we want to pray. Sometimes, after many years of not praying them we may have forgotten the whole prayer. Stations

Many of us are familiar with the **Stations of the Cross**, traditionally prayed during Lent and in Holy Week. They may also be appropriate for this time of pandemic. <u>Click here</u> for more.

Vinnies Community Sleepout is going virtual!

The human reality of homelessness is told through the many people the St Vincent de Paul Society assists each day.

In 2019, the NSW Government Department of Communities and Justice Engagement Week Program identified the statistics surrounding homelessness:

• Of those sleeping rough on our streets, 57% in Woy Woy and 71% in Gosford identified with a high vulnerability score and needed ongoing assistance with housing and support services.

• 70 years of age was the oldest respondent sleeping rough and 24 years of age was the youngest, with an average age of 49 years.

•The program identified that the average duration of time spent sleeping on the street was 5.16 years.

It is critical that we support those experiencing or ,at risk of homelessness , in rebuilding their lives and reconnecting with the community. We also strive to address the causes of homelessness and disadvantage.

On the NSW Central Coast, the St Vincent de Paul Society provides assistance through three Vinnies Support Centres in Wyong, Gosford and Woy Woy.

These Support Centres not only connect those in need with Vinnies provided services, but also facilitate other agencies in the fields of homelessness and poverty, to provide comprehensive support to those most vulnerable within our community.



Monday 23 St Rose of Lima Rose of Lima was a member of the Third Order of Saint Dominic in Lima, Peru, who became known for both her life of cultivation of beauty and her care of the poverty stricken of the city through her own private efforts.



Tuesday 24 St Barthlomew apostle Bartholomew was one of the twelve apostles of Jesus according to the New Testament. He is said to have been martyred for having converted Polymius, King of Armenia, to Christianity. Due to the nature of his martyrdom,

Wednesday 25 St Louis IX King of France Pope Boniface VIII proclaimed the canonisation of Louis in 1297; he is the only French king to be declared a saint. Louis IX is often considered the model of the ideal Christian monarch.





Thursday 26 Our Lady of Czestochowa (The Black Madonna) Saint Luke the Evangelist, according to tradition, is believed to be the original artist of this painting in which Mary is depicted holding the Christ Child. In 1656, a year after the failed invasion, King Kazimierz of Poland declared Our Lady of Częstochowa to be "Queen of Poland" and made **the city the spiritual capital of the nation**. Thus, she became a symbol of protection and created a specific national identity that impacted on the entire population of Poland.

Friday 27 St Monica known as The Mother's Saint, is also the patron of alcoholics, conversion and wives. Monica prayed for her son St. Augustine for **17 years** before his conversion.

Saturday 28 St Augustine of Hippo (son of St Monica) 13 November 354 – 430, was a theologian, philosopher, and the Bishop of Hippo Regius in Numidia, Roman North Africa. His writings influenced the development of Western philosophy and Western Christianity, and he is viewed as one of the most important Church

Safeguarding Message

Our Diocesan Commitment to Safeguarding is underscored by our faith in Jesus Christ who teaches the fundamental sanctity of each human person, and by our dedication to sustained education, practice and conversation about moral, legal and spiritual obligation to safeguard all those within our community.



Plenary Council 2021

The Plenary Council is about reform. It is about adapting the church to the new challenges of the 21st-century. Pope Francis is strongly committed to church reform and for that reason has called the World Synod of Bishops in Rome in 2023.

As an Argentinian he has seen the changes sweeping society. In his own country, despite strong opposition from the church, abortion was legalised in 2020 – the first in any major country in South America.

In 2004 89% of Argentinian's nominated as Catholics but this dropped in 2019 to 63%- a free fall of 26% in only 15 years. Less than 20% of Catholics attend Mass or engage in church activities. As in Brazil evangelical Protestantism has grown rapidly in recent years. So has the number of people claiming "no religion."

At 85 the Pope would be only too aware he has limited time. He has moved cautiously but determinedly.

More than his predecessors he realises such a large and widespread institution as the Catholic Church can no longer simply be governed from above. That is why more than anything else he has emphasised the principle of Synodality – local people making local decisions. He has also emphasised and continues to emphasise that every person baptised in the catholic faith is part of the People of God. It is the views of the people of God that he seeks to listen to at the World Synod.

The Pope does not claim to have all the solutions. He wants to hear the solutions proposed not just by bishops but by all the people of God.

Each diocese including our own has been instructed to start a listening process from 17 October 2021. Our parish awaits advice from the diocese how this is to be done. Possibly this will be even more significant in the long run than the Australian Plenary Council. This is because the agenda will not be set by the bishops locally but on instruction from Rome.

Our plenary council program has been amended yet again. Instead of meeting in Adelaide from 3 October the bishops have now decided that the October session will be entirely online. Members will now be participating from their homes/office; there will be no opportunity for comprehensive live streaming as there will be no general assembly. The bishops state: "Just as there was disappointment in needing to postpone the assembly and then move to regional hubs the likelihood that most members will now join the assembly from their home is not what we had planned and hoped for." Some parts will be live streamed but how this will be accomplished is not clear. Nor is it clear how effective a conference of 280 people on some form of Zoom can operate at all. The Bishops state: "we are receiving exceptional support from technical experts within and beyond the church to ensure that we can make the virtual assembly..."

Such a process does not advance the cause of Synodality as it will be extremely difficult for the lay participants to have an effective voice, or indeed any voice at all. For those interested a zoom convocation organised by Australian Coalition of Concerned Catholics on the Future of Catholicism in Australia will be held on 26 August at 7:30 pm.
