Gospel: Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me.

The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations. You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these things come from within and make a man unclean.'

Celebrating the Word of God at Home

The Word of God is central to our lives. Here are some ideas of how we can celebrate and share God's Word in our homes.

1. Ensure that your home has at least one good Bible

Obtain a good Bible that is easy to read and don't let it gather dust on a shelf. Place it in a visible, accessible spot. Ideally have it open, with a relevant page displayed. Allow its very presence to speak: this is a home in which God's word dwells!

2. Read it often!

Meal times, bed time, special occasions . . . Create regular home rituals for reading from the Scriptures. Involve family members in taking their turn selecting and reading a passage, lighting the candle, etc.

3. Look for biblical connectors in everyday life

Does a long line of refugees making a perilous journey remind you of the Exodus story? Does the TV program about restorative justice in prisons resonate with Jesus' teachings on forgiveness and healing? Look for opportunities in the events of the world around you to bring Scripture themes into family discussions.

4. Let your family see you reading Scripture

Actions speak louder than words. Model the Bible's importance in your life. Perhaps you read Scripture regularly with your spouse, or with a Bible study group, or you like to discuss aloud at home a Scripture passage that you heard or read. This is a great witness to your children (even if your teenagers might roll their eyes!)

5. Encourage Bible storytelling in your home

Everyone loves a good story, and the Bible is full of them. Enjoy the storytelling. Encourage your children and grandchildren to enter the stories, with their imagination and questions. Use "I wonder" questions to open up the biblical stories and to encourage personal engagement.

6. Learn the tools for exploring Scripture

There are a variety of ways of exploring the sacred text – Lectio Divina and the Ignatian Imaginative Contemplation are just two traditional prayerful approaches. The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and Godly Play have particular expertise in reaching the hearts of children. Engage with a good education resource – a book, a leaflet, a podcast, an evening talk or a short course.

7. Read widely

Don't just keep rehashing your favourite Jesus stories. Read widely. Dig into the text and uncover the fascinating and delightful gems buried both Testaments. To take one example, do you know the dramatic story of Esther, the beautiful young Jewish woman who became Queen of Persia and risked her life to save her people from a murderous plot? (See the Book of Esther)

8. Short verses count

Reading the Bible doesn't have to be a lengthy exercise. Pondering a single word or phrase (e.g., "Listen" or "Do not be afraid") is a form of prayer with a time-honoured place in our Catholic tradition.

9. Decorate your house with Scripture

We decorate our homes in many wonderful and creative ways. Why not add illustrated Bible texts or paintings of biblical scenes to your walls – whether they be created by recognised artists or by your own children.

10. Play inspiring worship music at home

Another lovely way to share and absorb Scripture is through music. Enlist your family's favourite musical artists, fill your home with their beautiful worship melodies and Scriptural lyrics, and let the Holy Spirit do the rest.

11. Memorise Scripture

This is an important tip. Teach your children to memorise short Bible verses. Start slowly and gradually build up a repertoire over time. Memorised verses are one way of permanently having the Word of God with us, especially when we most need to hear it.

12. Make memories

Scripture is ancestral story-telling. In the Bible we find the stories of our faith family handed down from generation to generation. It is a bit like a family that tells stories of Great-Uncle Gino's famous hamburgers and Nanna Gray's love for music. In the same vein, a Catholic family can tell stories about Abraham and Sarah setting off into the unknown (Gen 12:1); or about the dramatic moment at the Red Sea just before it split (Exodus 14); or the courageous travels of St Paul (Acts) which saw him stoned, imprisoned, shipwrecked; and of course the stories about Jesus – many of which involve him living, ministering and dining among families.

13. Include a Scripture verse in a birthday card, lunch box, or on the fridge door

Affirming notes, birthday cards, reminder memos . . . on those occasions when we write a note to our child we might also include a short Bible quote as extra inspiration, motivation or to express how we feel. Some parents have been known to slip a Bible verse into their children's lunch bags, much to the amusement of their friends! Fridge doors are great for all kinds of messages, why not

God's Word too?

14. Enjoy the Bible!

Teaching Scripture is serious business, but that doesn't mean it's all work and no play. As a family, create some fun and devise your own Bible Bee or Scripture Quiz. Play charades and act out Bible passages. Enjoy Bible-themed comics, songs, jokes and playful youtube clips, as appropriate.

Pour out your grief in prayer.

"Be merciful to me, Lord, for I am in distress; my eyes grow weak with sorrow, my soul and body with grief" (Psalm 31:9). My heart is broken, my mind exhausted. I cry out to you and hardly know what to ask. All I can do is tell you how I feel and ask you to "keep track of all my sorrows ... collect all my tears in your bottle ... and record each one in your book" as I pour them out to you (Psalm 56:8).



Cremation and the Catholic Church

The Apostles' Creed, the ancient summary of Christian belief, expressly states that Catholics believe in" the resurrection of the body." St Paul in his First Letter to the Corinthians emphasises this belief in the resurrection of the dead: "... for if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised either. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile."

For many centuries then the Church forbade cremation as contrary to Christian belief. Early Christians practised burial facing Jerusalem expecting their body to rise as the body of Christ rose. Yet the Church, like everyone, has always known that the body disintegrates if it is buried, and cremation is simply a faster means of disintegration. However, burial was seen as an expression of Christian belief and cremation as an expression of denial.

In 1963 Pope John XXIII commenced a process of reform in the Church by allowing Catholics to be cremated. Priests were permitted to officiate at cremation ceremonies if they took place after the funeral service. In 1997 this law was changed to allow the funeral service to take place after the cremation is completed. In these cases, the ashes are placed next to the altar.

Cremation is now widespread in Australia and it is estimated that approximately 70% of deceased people are cremated. Many Catholic cemeteries now provide columbarium niches for housing cremated remains and, in some cases, columbaria have been built within the church structure, for example the new Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles has niches in the crypt mausoleum.

In addition, many churches have columbaria attached. This is the case in our own area where St Patrick's, East Gosford and Our Lady of the Rosary, The Entrance have a columbarium in the church grounds. One problem which has concerned Church authorities in relation to columbaria being attached to churches is what happens if the church closes or decides to replace the current building.

This problem is not confined to the Catholic Church, of course. Many cemeteries are overcrowded and expensive, and many others need relocation because of urban development. Accordingly, in 2013 the New South Wales Parliament passed the *Cemeteries and Crematoria Act* which allows for relocation of both gravesites and niches providing this is done reverently and in an appropriate manner as laid down by the Act. The new law was supported by all religious groups including the Catholic Church.

In 2016 Pope Francis authorised new guidelines in respect of cremation and the disposal of ashes. The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued *Ad Resurgentum cum Christo* which emphasised that cremation of the body does not affect the person's soul, nor does it prevent God, in his omnipotence, from raising up the deceased body to new life. However, the ashes must be treated with the greatest of reverence and should be kept in a sacred place. For this reason, the church condemns the scattering of the ashes or keeping them in the domestic residence. Nor should they be divided among family members or used as in jewellery. The ashes should be retained in whole and either buried or placed in a niche.

Spiritual Corner: Feasts and saints of the week: (Our extended family in Heaven).

Monday 30 Richard Martin born in Yorkshire and was an English martyr—a layman who was charged with being "a receiver and maintainer of priests", because he provided food and shelter for priests. Richard was hung, drawn and quartered. He was beautified in 1929

Tuesday 31 St Aidan of Lindisfarne was an Irish monk and missionary credited with converting the Anglo-Saxons to Christianity in Northumbria. He was a bishop and was known throughout the kingdom for his knowledge of the Bible, his learning, his eloquent preaching, his holiness, his distaste for pomp, his kindness to the poor and the miracles attributed to him.

Wednesday 01 St Anna the Prophetess "She was very old; she had lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage and then was a widow until she was eighty-four" (Luke 2:36–37). Anna had been married only seven years when she became a widow, and she remained a widow for the rest of her life. Most translations indicate that Anna was eighty-four years old when she met Jesus. But it is also possible to translate the text to mean Anna had lived eighty-four years *after* her husband died. That would mean Anna was at least 104 years old—if she had married at the age of thirteen. Either way, she had spent the vast majority of her life without a husband and was ministering before the Lord in the temple.



Thursday 02 St Ingrid of Sweden of Skänninge was a Swedish abbess venerated as a saint in the Roman Catholic Church. She founded Skänninge Abbey, a nunnery belonging to the Dominicans, in 1272.



Friday 03 St Gregory the Great , pope and doctor , was the Pope of the Catholic Church between 590 and 604 AD. Gregory was well educated and excelled in all his studies. He also became an expert in law. He excelled so much that he became the Prefect of Rome, just as his father had been. Gregory was only 33 years old. After Gregory's father had died, Gregory had the family villa in Rome converted into a monastery. Today the monastery still stands as the San Gregorio Magno al Celio. This famous monastery fell into ruin in the following centuries but was restored during the 17th and 18th centuries. As a monk, Gregory was hard and strict. When a monk on his deathbed confessed to stealing three pieces of gold, Gregory ordered he be left to die alone and his body buried with the three coins. Then, in a turn of heart,

Gregory offered 30 Masses for the deceased monk. Some people today ask for Masses for 30 consectective days - (Gregorian Masses) !Pope Gregory was well known for his alms to the poor, and he gave quite generously of the riches donated to the Church by the wealthy people of Rome. Pope Gregory made many changes to the Mass, some of which remain today, The position of the Our Father in the Mass remains where Pope Gregory placed it. Pope Gregory may have also established "cantus planus," known in English as plainchant. Most today know this style of singing as Gregorian Chant. The melodious, monophonic music is known throughout the Church and closely associated with medieval monasteries. Gregorian chant gives us the oldest music we still have in the original form, some dating to the centuries just after the death of Gregory. Saturday 04 St Boniface 1 pope of Rome 418–422 whose reign was markedly disrupted by the antipope Eulalius. Boniface's reentry into Rome ended the 15-week schism. Thereafter his pontificate was noted for his peaceful, yet firm, diplomacy and for his zealous support of Bishop St. Augustine of Hippo, particularly in the fight against Pelagianism (*q.v.*), a heresy that denied original sin.

Plenary Council 2021

"If we want a different world then we must be different people." Pope Francis.

On Thursday 26 August a national webinar hosted what was termed the second convocation on the 'Future of Catholicism in Australia'. A report on the actual convocation will be published later. The theme of the webinar was to bring together perspectives on the current state and future prospects for our church in Australia. Pope Francis has repeatedly stressed the engagement of all Catholics, beginning with local communities, is integral to Plenary Councils and to the World Synod of Bishops on Synodality in 2023.

The purpose of the convocation was to set down markers for a Synodal way seeking fresh vision and new directions. When Pope John XXIII convened the Second Vatican Council in 1962 he called for aggiornamento — an updating of the Church. He said the purpose of the Council was the... "modernisation of the Church after twenty centuries of life."

The 2023 World Synod Bishops and the 2021 Plenary Council are instruments for the continual updating of the Church. Times constantly bring change and the church like all institutions and all humans must adapt and respond to them. Failure to do so is the path to extinction.

The stated aim of the convocation was to emphasise the importance of a successful Plenary Council for all Catholics in Australia. It sought to place a particular emphasis on church governance and the inclusion and engagement of all Catholics with special emphasis on the role of women and justice with regard to minority groups both racial and sexual, such as LGBTI people. To see the Church as Christ articulated in the parable of the lost sheep – God's instrument to call all and to seek the salvation of all. "If a man has 100 sheep and one of them gets lost what will he do? Won't he leave the 99 others in the wilderness and go to search for the one that is lost until he finds it? There is more joy in heaven over one lost sinner who repents and returns to God then over 99 others who are righteous and haven't strayed away." (Luke 15:3,7 and Matthew 18:12-14).

To become different people, to echo the parable of the lost sheep is easy to talk about but difficult to practice. The Pope is asking all of us to seek pathways, both as a church and as individuals, to progress reform, not as a criticism of the past but as a gateway to the future.

Constantly one hears people bemoaning the fact that their children, despite a Catholic upbringing, have given away the practice of the faith. They give it away because the church is simply no longer relevant to them. Updating the church is the only pathway to relevance.

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
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
