

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do Catholics eat fish on Friday?

Answer:

For centuries, meatless Fridays were the norm for Catholics throughout the world. Friday was chosen because that was the day on which Jesus died, and Christians wanted to find a way to honour that day with special prayers and acts of penance and self-denial. The practice of abstaining from meat on Fridays — under pain of sin — grew out of that desire, and it became an official part of Church teaching until the time of the Second Vatican Council.

In the 1960s, there was a shift in the Church's thinking, in large part because there was a recognition that differences in cultures and economic realities meant that eating or not eating meat had different meanings for different peoples. For example, in cultures that were largely dependent on seafood or a vegetarian diet, abstaining from meat was no sacrifice at all. While in other places, eating fish and other kinds of seafood was actually something rare and special and not a sacrifice.

Today, Catholics throughout the world are still instructed to abstain from meat on the Fridays of Lent.

Regardless of what we choose to do, the real value in all of this is to see a reflection of Good Friday in each Friday, to remember the self-giving love of Jesus, and to honour that love through some sort of sacrifice or act of mercy. ©LPi

BRINGING HOME THE GOSPEL

This story comes amidst a period when Jesus was creating quite a stir. Many of the common people were quite taken by his teachings and speaking favourably of him. They were touched and inspired by his healing acts and the way he preached of God's love and forgiveness. Some had even begun to wonder if he was the long-anticipated Messiah. The religious leaders, on the other hand, had turned against him. They wanted him arrested because his teachings of compassion and mercy conflicted with their way of keeping the people under their control.

When the Pharisees and scribes brought the woman caught in adultery to Jesus, they were openly humiliating her—but note, they didn't involve the man caught in the act. He was off the hook. They also used her to try to trap Jesus into contradicting Moses, the Jews' greatest religious teacher. However, rather than condemn her, Jesus chose that moment to impart a teaching about mercy rather than judgment and forgiveness rather than punishment. He did it gently, asking the crowd to search their own hearts for sins, rather than call them out publicly to shame them.

When the crowd left, Jesus spoke lovingly to the woman, telling her explicitly that he didn't condemn her. But he didn't ignore her trespass either— he asked her not to sin again as she went on her way. His response to her was probably much more effective in moving her to a change of heart than any other punishment would have been.

As parents, we are often in situations in which we need to balance mercy and justice for our own children. What might we learn from Jesus' approach?

FAMILY RESPONSE:

When have you wanted to see someone else punished for something they did wrong? Does it upset you to think of Jesus forgiving them? Why or why not?

PERSONAL RESPONSE:

What sin(s) of your own have you found it hard to accept God's forgiveness for? Pray to internalize Jesus' words, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again."

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WEEKLY SOCIAL JUSTICE CHALLENGES

What is the role of anger and rage in our lives? What purpose does it serve? We often think that when we feel anger, we need to express it... we need to get it out of our system. Perhaps anger has a different purpose as Jesus suggests to the angry crowd that is about to hurl stones at the guilty woman. Perhaps anger is a signal that there is something wrong inside of us, some pain that has surfaced because we have witnessed an injustice in the world and our consciences are feeling pricked. Anger can trick us into thinking that the injustice is outside of us or that we are above it. But Jesus suggests that when we seek justice with anger, rage, or revenge, we should use our anger to look within and hurl stones at our own sin. The challenge this week is to address the injustice that has root in our own souls.

CARE FOR CREATION TIPS

"Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." —Isaiah 43:18-19

If you sometimes feel overwhelmed by the direction the climate crisis is going, consider reading chapter 43 from Isaiah as an antidote. Or read chapter 3 of Pope Francis' *Laudato Si'* (you can find it online for free). He reminds us, "The Spirit of God has filled the universe with possibilities and
