

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

As Catholics, we talk a lot about "redemptive suffering" and "carrying your cross." What does that mean practically in daily life?

Answer:

When Jesus spoke these words, they would have sounded quite intense to his hearers. "Pick up your cross daily and follow me." At the time, Jesus hadn't yet been crucified. A cross was a Roman torture instrument. "Pick up the thing that tortures you the most," Jesus seemed to say. Unfortunately, most of us have no real shortage of these in our life. To take up the cross isn't to seek out new sufferings in our life. It's to accept the life we have.

Of course, unjust or unhealthy circumstances should be rectified when possible. But there are always circumstances that remain out of our immediate control. It could be pain management, the defiance of our teenage child, or an unhealthy work environment ... but you need the paycheck to pay the bills. In difficult circumstances, it can be easier to blame, complain, or daydream our way out of it. None of these are real solutions, since none of them accept the reality of the situation at hand. Those options only add to our suffering, since they damage relationships, fixate on the problem, or set up unrealistic expectations.

Instead, Jesus invites us to take up our cross — to look at the uncomfortable situation square in the eyes, take a deep breath, and do our best to be present to God's grace in the moment. To love those in our path. To take things one step at a time.

BRINGING HOME THE GOSPEL

The disciples were going out to preach on their own. Jesus knew the difficulties they would encounter, and so he sent them out in pairs. This is a really important point. It is so much easier to get things done, to manage difficult situations or to even celebrate our accomplishments with the help of others. We all need support and encouragement. One of the first things Jesus did when he began his public ministry was to gather a group of people whom we call *apostles* and *disciples*. Even Jesus needed a community to walk with.

This is why belonging to a church is so important: Not just to have a group of people with whom to worship, but also to have a community to nurture and support you and your family. The church community is asked to serve as a model for us and our children; sometimes even offering an alternate lifestyle to that of the culture in which we live. We need to surround our children with people who share the same values.

Church is a family, and like every other family, the church is not perfect. Every church makes mistakes, sometimes really big ones. As we do in our family, we try to forgive and move on. Every church community will have its characters, its misfits and its sinners. We are not expected to like every member, but if we make an effort to get involved in church activities, we

often meet people who can become surrogate family and lifelong friends.

WEEKLY SOCIAL JUSTICE CHALLENGES

This Sunday's Gospel tells of Jesus sending out the 72 disciples. The message they were to give people was one of peace: "Peace to this household!" Jesus embodied peace, and he challenged his disciples to be bearers of his peace. Yet in our world today, there are so many examples

of violence, tension, war, and conflict. Your challenge this week is to look at your own lives—as individuals and as families. How are you sowing peace at home, in your parish or school, in your neighbourhood and community? What is one action you can take this week—be it prayer, a kind gesture, asking forgiveness, seeking reconciliation, or building bridges between people—to bring peace into the hearts of individuals or a group in

conflict?

CARE FOR CREATION TIPS

"Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid." —Luke 10:7

Have you heard about Fair Trade products? Fair Trade allows farmers and farm workers to receive a fair salary—a

just salary—not just the minimum that consumers are willing to pay which often is not enough to live on. When they enjoy better living conditions, farmers and farmworkers may avail themselves of health services and send their children to school (rather than keeping them on the farm to work from a very young age). The leading Fair Trade products are coffee and chocolate, but there are also teas, rice, spices, and bananas. Look for the "Fair Trade" logo and encourage a fair business in the name of the God who loves justice.






