

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained

Question:

I volunteer every once in a while. How can I incorporate serving the poor in my everyday life?

Answer:

In the Gospels, Jesus is very clear about emphasizing outreach to vulnerable persons on the margins of society. These may be the materially poor, the disabled, the lonely, or any others whose circumstances drive them from mainstream society. We can all respond to Christ's call to love by incorporating direct service into our regular life routine. Here are some ideas to find your niche: Consider your life. Before you look for direct service opportunities, consider your schedule, commitment levels, and personal gifts. When can you help out and how regularly? Where have you volunteered in the past that has felt like a good fit? Do you have any particular skills or personality traits that lend you to particular work?

Do some research. There are a lot of structured ways you can get involved in your community. Your parish might have a social concerns outreach program. If not, ask friends and family. A simple online search for local nonprofits can also expose you to new opportunities.

Be open to God's invitation. The chance to serve may be closer than you think. Befriending an elderly neighbor, widowed and far from children, is an act of serving the poor. Keep your eyes and heart open!

BRINGING HOME THE GOSPEL

Prayer is much more than the rote words we learn when we are children, or even the spontaneous prayers from our hearts. Prayer is more than just talking to God. There are three ways of praying: vocal prayer (praying with words or actions), meditation (putting our own thoughts into our spiritual reading), and contemplation (sitting with God in silence). All three forms of prayer have been a part of our Christian tradition for centuries, but the prayer of silence is probably the one of which people are least aware.

In the last twenty years or so, young people have forgotten what silence is. Those traditional times of quiet (taking a walk, riding a bike, playing outside) are gone. Youngsters are plugged into sound constantly. Even we adults can't seem to walk into a room or ride in the car without turning on a radio, a podcast, or streaming music. Yet we know that God often speaks to us in the quiet. Remember Elijah on that mountaintop? It wasn't in the wind, fire or earthquake that he heard the Lord. It was in the silence (1 Kings 19:12).

There is a tradition of prayer in our church called lectio divina (holy reading) that includes practiced silence. It involves four steps: reading (usually from Scripture), meditating (thinking about or placing yourself in the story), contemplation (sitting in silence with a word or passage) and prayer (telling God what the reading meant to you). Small groups and individuals practice this ancient prayer form in monasteries and homes.

It can be a great way to pray together as a family. Lifestyles change with every generation. There are losses and gains. This generation seems to have an ever-growing access to information and a dwindling amount of quiet time. Helping our children appreciate silence is giving them a gift they can use all their lives.

FAMILY RESPONSE:

Gather the family and read a story from Jesus' life. Meditate on the story by asking youngsters how they might feel if they were one of the people involved. (Make sure you talk about how you would have felt too.) Then sit together quietly for a minute. Finally, ask everyone to say a short prayer out loud.

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WEEKLY SOCIAL JUSTICE CHALLENGES

On October 18, we celebrate the feast of Saint Luke, one of the four evangelists. The Gospel of Luke is sometimes nicknamed the "Justice Gospel" because Luke has so many stories of Jesus reaching out to those who were victims of injustice in their society. Perhaps this was partially due to Luke's own experience as a healer. Luke wrote his Gospel to help u

due to Luke's own experience as a healer. Luke wrote his Gospel to help us understand that Jesus was and is a universal saviour—for everyone, everywhere. Your challenge this week is to spend time each day with Luke's Gospel. Find a chapter (or at least a story or teaching in a chapter) which deals with justice, then reflect on and discuss as a family how you can apply the message which the passage teaches in your life today.

CARE FOR CREATION TIPS

Australia wastes approximately 7.6 million tonnes of food each year, which is enough to fill the Melbourne Cricket Ground ten times over. Shockingly, around 70% of this food is perfectly edible. Fruit from trees often goes to waste either because there is too much of it in a short space of time to be used or because the tree's owner doesn't have the ability or the time to harvest it. An established fruit tree can often produce 100+ pounds of fruit, far more than one family can consume. If you have a fruit tree, why not donate



the excess to your local food bank? When you notice laden fruit trees in your neighbourhood, knock on the door and ask if you can help harvest it to donate. Finally, you can look up local gleaning groups and offer your services to help pick or deliver the excess fruit to an organization that will get it into the mouths of hungry people.




SUNDAY, 9 NOVEMBER, 2:30PM at the Parish Centre




