

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do Catholics call priests Father?

Answer:

Some evangelical Christians object to Catholics calling priests "Father," citing Matthew 23:9 where Jesus says, "Call no one on earth your father." Taken alone, this seems clear—but in context, Jesus is warning against religious leaders who misuse authority with pride and hypocrisy. He's not banning the use of titles, but urging humility and integrity. In fact, Jesus uses "father" in parables like the Prodigal Son and Lazarus and the Rich Man, showing the term itself isn't forbidden.

St. Paul also embraced spiritual fatherhood, writing to the Corinthians, "It was I who begot you in Christ Jesus through my preaching" (1 Cor 4:14-17). The Church has long used familial titles—like "abbot" and "pope" to reflect spiritual care. Calling a priest "Father" honours his role in guiding, nurturing, and protecting the faithful, much like our heavenly Father. It's a tradition rooted in Scripture and early Church practice, reminding us that spiritual leaders are called to serve with love, humility, and responsibility. **©LPi**

BRINGING HOME THE GOSPEL

If only we could shelter our children from all of the calamities and tragedies of life! But we can't. Our primary job is to get them ready for the real world—and calamities and tragedies are part of it. Besides, bad things happen even to the very young. Friends move away, parents separate, family members or beloved pets die, and those are just some of the possible tragedies. For us parents there is a great temptation to say, "Don't cry. Everything will be all right." It sounds like a very Christian response, rooted in faith and hope. In truth, the "Everything will be all right" part is fine. It's the "Don't cry" that needs to go.

Tears are cleansing. They are a gift of our human condition. They communicate our feelings, allow for the cohesive bond of compassion and open the door to healing. But sometimes tears get stifled. It takes faith and hope to trust that all will be well, just as it takes courage and humility to accept our own tears and those of others.

We parents often have almost a compulsive need to make things better, to solve problems, to fix things. And so we say things like, "Don't cry," or, "Look at it this way," when often what our children really need is just our quiet presence and our loving support. It helps, when we find a youngster in distress, to take a few moments for some quiet prayer of our own—to ask for the grace to experience and share God's comforting love.


If we take the time to suffer our children's pain with them, then perhaps later they will also be open to talking about and processing the experience. As parents, we need to allow our youngsters to show their grief, offering our comforting presence and gentle support as a testimony to our words, "Everything will be all right."

FAMILY RESPONSE:

Practice attentive listening again. Have someone talk about a problem he or she is having at work or school. Make sure no one interrupts until the speaker is done. Ask questions to better understand the situation. Suggest solutions— only if the person asks for them.

PERSONAL RESPONSE:

Try some spiritual reflection. Consider something difficult that happened to you last week. Think about the situation and consider what Jesus might have observed if he were present. How might he have reacted?



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WEEKLY SOCIAL JUSTICE CHALLENGES

The Sunday Gospel describes the end times, and has Jesus challenging the apostles to live faithfully and persevere through the turmoil. Throughout Luke's Gospel, Jesus paints a picture of his ultimate goal for the future—the realisation of his Father's Kingdom here on earth. The

Reign of God brings a kingdom of peace and equality, a world in which everyone has what he/she needs to live a life of dignity and hope. It is a world in which love rules over hate. Your challenge this week is to discuss as a family or household one step you can take to bring the reign of God one step closer to being realized. What act of love or kindness, of justice or equality, can you do to make Jesus' dream for humanity a reality?



As the days grow longer and the weather warms, consider your typical efforts to stay cool. In *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis reminds us: "A person who could afford to spend and consume more but regularly uses less... shows the kind of convictions and attitudes which help to protect the environment" (#211).



While he refers to heating, the same principle applies to cooling. We might reflect on how Mary, about eight months pregnant at this time of year, journeyed without the comfort of air conditioning or modern conveniences. If she managed in the heat, we too can make conscious choices—like using fans instead of air conditioning, dressing appropriately, and staying hydrated—while being mindful of our energy use. These small sacrifices not only help the environment but also connect us with the simplicity and resilience of the Holy Family. As we prepare for Christmas in the Australian summer, let's embrace a spirit of care for creation and thoughtful stewardship.

after, his 85th birthday.


