
WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

What does it mean to discern a vocation?

Answer:

The word vocation comes from the Latin word vocare, meaning "to call." A vocation is a calling or invitation from God to serve in a particular way. For Catholics, that calling might be as a priest, sister, or married person. Vocation is the way we respond to the invitation to share in God's grace and witness to God's love in the world.

Discerning a vocation is the process in which we pray for God's guidance. We listen for God's message that is often quiet and unassuming in a world filled with noise and distractions. We look at our gifts and talents, seek the advice of others, examine our motives, and listen to see what God is asking of us. The goal of discernment is to follow what the Lord wills, not what we think is the best idea. Many men enter a seminary to discern if that is their vocation, only to discover that their calling is to marriage. Others have resisted the idea for long periods of time, until finally they could resist no more. Some great saints have described that dilemma. Vocation is a human process of divine origin, and each of us must strive constantly to hear the call of God in our lives.

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BRINGING HOME THE GOSPEL

Some people feel they can relate to the human Jesus best, while others relate to the divine Jesus best. Neither is better than the other, because our Christian tradition has come to teach that Jesus was both fully human and fully God. We'll never understand this with our rational minds because it's one of the mysteries of our faith—Jesus is both/and, human and God.

Plenty of Gospel stories show his human side: his delight in eating and drinking with friends new and old, his fatigue at the end of a long day of helping others, his impatience with others at times, his grief when his friend Lazarus died, etc. Knowing Jesus felt what we feel is helpful to many.

Then there is the story of the Transfiguration that points to Jesus' divinity and his relationship to God as God's son. Yet Jesus is still humble when seen in that light. He doesn't lord it over the apostles or try to coerce them into obedience. He doesn't brag

that he is on speaking terms with Moses and Elijah, two of the giants of their history. His concerns for them are only that they not be afraid after hearing the voice from the cloud, and that they not brag about their vision until after his resurrection. The story says a lot about the God we honour. Our God is all-powerful, yet chooses to be humble.



FAMILY RESPONSE:

Discuss whether you think of Jesus as more human or more divine (there's no wrong answer). Which is easier for you to relate to and why?

PERSONAL RESPONSE:

Spend some time this week imagining God saying to you what God proclaimed to Jesus, "You are my beloved child. With you I am well pleased."

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WEEKLY SOCIAL JUSTICE CHALLENGES

On August 7 and 9, we mark the bombings of Nagasaki and Hiroshima during World War II. Today we have nuclear weapons which are much more devastating than the atomic bombs dropped on Japan almost 70

years ago. The Church have written courageously about nuclear war. Applying the Catholic Church's teaching about just war, which has evolved over the past two thousand years, the Church have concluded that they cannot justify the use of nuclear weapons.

Your challenge this week is to look at how you can contribute to a peaceful world so that the threat of nuclear war is made remote and unimaginable. How are you a peacemaker in your home? At school or at work? In your community? In how you engage in civic life? What is one thing you can do this week to make our world safer for everyone?

CARE FOR CREATION TIPS

On this feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord, when we remember how Jesus' seemingly normal human body was transfigured into dazzling white, honour it by transforming what some might see as trash or waste into something life-giving. Repurpose something you

normally throw away into something useful in your home. Or start a compost bin, letting your fruit and vegetable scraps decompose into soilbuilding organic material. Search online for "how to start a compost bin" for hundreds of ideas of what can work for your home.

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In the spirit of integral ecology, hope for the Earth and the Poor.



If you / family or friends wish to give a gift to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation, it is traditional to give a keepsake with religious/ spiritual meaning.


