

Soibada Update

This year is the tenth anniversary of our Parish Friendship Agreement with the Parish of Soibada in Timor Leste. We had big plans for a celebration but due to Covid-19 this and all of our events for the year have been put on hold. However, progress on the projects in the village have continued even during lockdown. Construction is underway for the classrooms in the Arts, Craft and Cultural training Centre. Not only are we funding this new educational facility that will impact many in the community we are also paying the wages of the local builders and tradesmen. This in turn keeps their families fed.



The average family in Soibada has 8 children. It costs approximately \$25 a week to feed them. A builder earns just over \$40 a week.

Most Rev Anthony Randazzo Bishop of Broken Bay Message for BBNeighbourhoods 23 June 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

René Girard, the French historian, literary critic, and philosopher of social science, wrote that "There is an irresistible urge in human communities from time to time to purge themselves by choosing an innocent victim from among their ranks, on whom to blame all of their own faults and vileness" (The Scapegoat, 1989, p. 40). While he wrote these words towards the end of last century, I think that they are still relevant for us today, 20 years into the twenty-first century.

There seems to be an irresistible temptation in human nature to blame others. In the English language, we even have the verb "to scapegoat" which means to blame someone for something bad that has happened. Scapegoat has its origins in the Hebrew Scriptures, specifically the Book of Leviticus:

"Then Aaron shall lay both his hands on the head of the live goat, and confess over it all the iniquities of the people of Israel, and all their transgressions, all their sins, putting them on the head of the goat, and sending it away into the wilderness by means of someone designated for the task. The goat shall bear on itself all their iniquities to a barren region; and the goat shall be set free in the wilderness". (Leviticus 16:21-22)

The original concept was to confess one's transgressions or sins and then to be freed from them by ritually placing them on the head of the goat. Unfortunately, the true meaning of acknowledgement of failings, confession of sins, and liberation from past ways of living, has been lost in this context. The secular world simply defaults to blame. In our time, the blame is rarely self-blame. Rather, it is blame of others — the government, the police, the Pope, the bishop, the priests and deacons, the parish council, the youth, the schools... the list is endless.

As the community of the Church, our vocation is different. The "blame game" is nowhere to be found in the Good News of Jesus Christ. Instead, as brothers and sisters of the Lord, our calling is one of virtuous living. It includes genuine devotion to God and our Catholic tradition. Living virtuous lives by no means places us over or above others. It does however; allow the power of the Holy Spirit to work through us so that others might meet Christ in us and through this encounter, they will know the love and mercy of God. There is no room for blame in this way of living.

I would like to propose to you that this call, this vocation, is common to all the baptised. It is our commission to be evangelists of the Good News of Jesus Christ. Evangelists are called to share Christ with others. The next step is to acknowledge that we belong to an evangelising community. Pope Francis reminds us that an evangelising community gets involved in people's lives and stands by people every step of the way, no matter how difficult or lengthy the journey. (cf The Joy of the Gospel, 24) This is an essential part of our mission and will cause us to have a daily concern to spread the love and goodness of God. It can be challenging work; however, it is not without its rewards. The desire to share our Christian joy is itself a gift from God who has taken the initiative of loving us first.

This week, I encourage you to spend some quiet time in prayer and contemplation with the Lord. Discover and re-discover what God's saving love has done and is doing in your life. Then, go out and proclaim that love as a witness to the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ.

May the love, the joy, and the peace of Christ be with you.

As we celebrate the Year of Prayer in our parish... Pope Francis' Catechesis at the General Audience on 17th June 2020



Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

The Prayer of Moses

In our itinerary on the theme of prayer, we are realising that God never liked to have anything to do with those who prayed the "easy" way. And Moses was not a "weak" dialogue partner either, from the very first day of his vocation.

When God called him, Moses was in human terms a "failure". The Book of Exodus depicts him in the land of Midian as a fugitive. As a young man he had felt compassion for his people, and had aligned himself in defence of the oppressed. But he soon discovered that, despite his good intentions, it was not justice, but violence that came from his hands. His dreams of glory shattered, Moses was no longer a promising official, destined to rise rapidly in his career, but rather one who gambled away opportunities, and now grazed a flock that was not even his own. And it was precisely in the silence of the desert of Midian that God summoned Moses to the revelation of the burning bush: "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God" (Ex 3:6).

Moses opposes God who speaks, who invites him to take care of the people of Israel once more with his fears and his objections: he is not worthy of that mission, he does not know the name of God, he will not be believed by the Israelites, he has a stammering tongue... so many other objections. The word that appears most frequently on Moses's lips, in every prayer he addresses to God, is the question: "Why?" Why have you sent me? Why do you want to free this people? Why? There is even a dramatic passage in the Pentateuch, where God reproaches Moses for his lack of trust, a lack that will prevent him from entering the promised land (cf. Nm 20:12).

With these fears, with this heart that often falters, how can Moses pray? Rather, Moses appears human like us. And this happens to us too: when we have doubts, how can we pray? It is not easy for us to pray. And it is because of his weakness, as well as his strength, that we are impressed. Entrusted by God to transmit the Law to his people, founder of divine worship, mediator

of the highest mysteries, he will not for this reason cease to maintain close bonds of solidarity with his people, especially in the hour of temptation and sin. He was always attached to his people. Moses never forgets his people. And this is the greatness of pastors: not forgetting the people, not forgetting one's roots. And just as Paul says to his beloved young Bishop Timothy: "Remember your mother and your grandmother, your roots, your people". Moses is so friendly with God that he can speak with Him face to face (see Ex 33:11); and he will remain so friendly with other people that he feels mercy for their sins, for their temptations, for the sudden nostalgia that the exiles feel for the past, recalling when they were in Egypt.

Moses does not reject God, but nor does he reject his people. He is faithful to his flesh and blood, he is faithful to God's voice. Moses is not therefore an authoritarian and despotic leader; the Book of Numbers defines him rather as "a very humble man, more humble than anyone else on the face of the earth" (Nm 12:3). Despite his privileged status, Moses never ceased to belong to the numbers of the poor in spirit who live by trusting in God as the viaticum of their journey. He is a man of his people.

Thus, the way of praying most proper to Moses is through intercession (see Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2574). His faith in God is completely at one with his sense of fatherhood towards his people. Scripture habitually depicts him with his hands outstretched towards God, as if to form a bridge between heaven and earth with his own person. Even in the most difficult moments, even on the day when the people repudiate God and him as a guide and make themselves a golden calf, Moses does not feel like putting his people aside. They are my people. They are your people. They are my people. He does not reject either God or his people. And he says to God: "Ah, this people has committed a grave sin in making a god of gold for themselves! Now if you would only forgive their sin! But if you will not" - if you do not forgive this sin - "then blot me out of the book that you have written" (Ex 32:31-32). Moses does not barter his people. He is the bridge, the one intercessor. Both of them, the people and God, and he is in the middle. He does not sell out his people to advance his career. He does not climb the ladder, he is an intercessor: for his

people, for his flesh and blood, for his history, for his people and for the God who called him. He is the bridge. What a beautiful example for all pastors who must be "bridges." This is why they are called pontifex, bridges. Pastors are the bridges between the people, to whom they belong, and God, to whom they belong by vocation. This is what Moses is. "If you would only forgive their sin! But if you will not, then blot me out of the book that you have written. I do not want to get ahead at the expense of my people".

And this is the prayer that true believers cultivate in their spiritual life. Even if they experience the shortcomings of people and their distance from God, in prayer they do not condemn them, they do not reject them. The intercessory attitude is proper to the saints who, in imitation of Jesus, are "bridges" between God and His people. Moses, in this sense, was the first great prophet of Jesus, our advocate and intercessor (see Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2577). And today, too, Jesus is the pontifex, He is the bridge between us and the Father. And Jesus intercedes for us, He shows the Father the wounds that are the price of our salvation, and He intercedes. And Moses is the figure of Jesus who today prays for us, intercedes for us.

Moses urges us to pray with the same ardour as Jesus, to intercede for the world, to remember that despite all its frailties, it still belongs to God. Everyone belongs to God. The worst sinners, the wickedest people, the most corrupt leaders, they are children of God, and Jesus feels this and intercedes for everyone. And the world lives and thrives thanks to the blessing of the righteous, to the prayer for mercy, this prayer for mercy that the saint, the righteous, the intercessor, the priest, the bishop, the Pope, the layperson, any baptised person incessantly raises up for humanity, in every place and time in history. Let us think of Moses, the intercessor. And when we want to condemn someone and we become angry inside... to get angry is good it can be healthy - while to condemn does no good, let us intercede for him or her; this will help us a lot.

Five people are a step closer to sainthood



Pope Francis on Friday took 3 men and 2 women a step closer to sainthood. The Holy Father received in audience Cardinal Angelo Becciu, Prefect of the Congregation of Causes of Saints, and authorized the promulgation of 5 decrees. The candidates are from Argentina, Germany, Venezuela. Italy and Mexico. The decrees concern 3 miracles, a

martyrdom and another on heroic virtues.

Miracles

With the decrees, 3 miracles through the intercession of the following 3 candidates have been recognized:

- Venerable Servant of God Mamerto Esquiú, of the Order of Friars Minor, Bishop of Córdoba (Argentina). He was born on 11 May 1826 in San Josè de Piedra Blanca (Argentina) and died on 10 January 1883 in La Posta de El Suncho (Argentina).
- Venerable Servant of God Franziskus Maria of the Cross (nee Johann Baptist Jordan), priest and founder of the Society of the Divine Saviour (Salvatorians) and of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Divine Saviour. He was born on 16 June 1848 in

Gurtweil, Waldshut-Tiengen (Germany) and died on 08 September 1918 in Tafers, Fribourg (Switzerland).

- Venerable Servant of God José Gregorio Hernández Cisneros, a lay man, who was born on October 26, 1864 in Isnotú (Venezuela) and died on June 29, 1919, in Caracas (Venezuela).

A decree recognized the martyrdom of the Servant of God Maria Laura Mainetti (nee Teresina Elsa). A professed nun of the Congregation of the Daughters of the Cross, Sisters of Saint Andrew, she was born in Colico (Italy) on 20 August 1939 and killed Chiavenna (Italy), in hatred of the Faith, on 6 June 2000.

The candidates whose miracles and martyrdom have been recognized have been cleared for beatification, which is a step away from canonization or final sainthood. Another miracle would be needed to clear their way for sainthood.

Heroic virtues

Another decree recognized the heroic virtues of the Servant of God Gloria Maria of Jesus Elizondo García (nee Speranza).

The superior general of the Congregation of the Missionary Catechists of the Poor was born August 26, 1908 in Durango (Mexico) and died in Monterrey (Mexico) on December 8, 1966. With this decree, she has been conferred the title Venerable Servant of God. The next step is beatification, for which a miracle is needed.

RECOGNITION OF THE MIRACLE ATTRIBUTED TO FR. FRANCIS JORDAN

The Holy Father, Pope Francis, has authorised the promulgation of the decree regarding the miracle attributed to the intercession of Father Francis Mary of the Cross (in secular life John Baptist) JORDAN, Founder of the Salvatorians.

Biographical data



Father Francis Jordan was born on 16 June 1848 in Gurtweil, a small town in the archdiocese of Freiburg (Germany). After ordination to the priesthood on 21 July 1878, he was sent to Rome, where he spent most part of his life. Motivated by the apostolic zeal and desire to make Jesus Christ, Saviour of the world, known and loved by all people, everywhere, he founded the Society of the Divine Savior (Salvatorians) in 1881 and the Congregation of the Sisters of the Divine Savior (Salvatorian Sisters) in 1888. He also organized groups of lay people to take part in the Church's mission of evangelization using all ways and means. He died on 8 September 1918 in Tafers in Switzerland.

The miracle

A young couple that was expecting a baby in 2014 in Jundiai (Brazil), was informed by several medical doctors and specialists that their unborn child was suffering an uncurable bone disease (skeletal dysplasia). Being members of a group of Lay Salvatorians, the parents began to pray through the intercession of the Venerable Servant of God, Fr. Francis Jordan, inviting other members of the Salvatorian Family to join them. The child was born in a complete healthy condition on 8 September 2014, the day of Fr. Francis Jordan´s death anniversary. After the required canonical procedures had been successfuly completed, the Holy Father, Pope Francis declared that this miraculous healing was worked by God through the intercession of Fr. Francis Jordan.



Towards the beatification

The declaration of the Pope on 19 June 2020 finishes the process on the miracle and opens definitely the way towards the beatification of Fr. Francis Jordan. As soon as the date and place of the beatification ceremony will be determined by the Holy See, we will announce it.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Today we are faced with the cost of discipleship, but we are also comforted by the promise of the providence of God. Baptism is for us both death and life. Through it we enter into Christ's death and we die to lives of selfishness and sin. Through it we rise with Christ to a new life freed from everything that previously held us down. As glorious as this new life might be, it requires death to our old ways of living, and this is always difficult.

The cost of discipleship cuts right to the core of our beings, it lays bare the very structures of kinship. Baptism recreates us as children of God; through it we are given a new life and born into a new family. The bonds of discipleship are now even stronger than the bonds of blood. Discipleship requires our very lives. As disciples we can no longer put ourselves first. We must be willing to spend ourselves and to be spent, to serve others in the day to day unfolding of life. We may find such commitment very demanding, but that is part of the cost of discipleship. God promises that if we lose our lives in this way, we will really gain them. If we are unselfish in the way we share ourselves with others, we will be enriched through our generosity. If we spend ourselves and are spent in our service of others we will be filled with blessings unimaginable.

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
