Vox Populi (Voice of the People)

The approaching month of August is an extremely busy one. It will provide everyone with many opportunities for prayer and good works!

We know good works are our actions or deeds and that both good works and faith are necessary for salvation. And that means works of love or charity.

Next week, from 1-7 August, the Diocese of Broken Bay will join with people from around Australia in highlighting the growing problem in our society of homelessness. We know homelessness has increased by nearly 14% in the past four years; that 2 out of 5 people in this situation are under 25, and there has been a 28% increase in our 55+ men and women experiencing homelessness. People from our communities right across the Diocese are represented in those figures.

Catholic Care is the social care agency of our Catholic Church in the Diocese of Broken Bay. Their services are as diverse as the people they serve but their common commitment is to provide assistance where it is most needed. In the coming weeks Catholic Care and Catholic Schools Broken Bay will work together to support our homelessness services, and Bishop Anthony Randazzo is encouraging us all to help with their fundraising where we can, and to keep the homeless or transient always in our prayers.

This is also a very special time of year when we pray for Vocations. The word "vocation" simply means "to be called". Every member of the Church is called to holiness but responding to that call is unique and particular for each one of us. It is not about becoming someone we are not. It is about living out our baptismal call to follow and imitate Jesus, and by doing so we are able to discover what this specific call is. For some it may mean marriage, or for others a call to the priesthood or religious life or to live as a single person. For our young men or women who are discerning a religious life, pray for them to be generous, and courageous.

There are also many memorials and feast days during the month of August, including the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord on 6 August, and one of our most important feast days and Day of Obligation, the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary on Sunday 15 August.

Many opportunities to pray. And how to pray? Pope St John Paull II had a fairly straightforward reply when asked this question.

"This is a simple matter. I would say;

Pray any way you like, as long as you pray."





A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Colossians

Seek the things that are above where Christ is.

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

That is why you must kill everything in you that belongs only to earthly life:

fornication, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god; and never tell each other lies. You have stripped off your old behaviour with your old self, and you have put on a new self which will progress towards true knowledge the more it is renewed in the image of its creator; and in that image there is no room for distinction between Greek and Jew, between the circumcised or the uncircumcised, or between barbarian and Scythian, slave and free man. There is only Christ: he is everything and he is in everything.


REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Both the first reading and the psalm response speak about the transitoriness of life. Life is all we have and it is so fragile, so fleeting. When we realise this, we may fear that in the end we will have nothing to show for our lives. Such thoughts show that we have not learned the most basic lesson of life – life is to be lived!

The goods of the earth are both good and essential for survival and advancement. However, they do not satisfy the deepest longings of the human spirit. They provide us with pleasure and challenge, but they cannot shield us from the transitoriness of life itself. In the face of such impermanence, they are ultimately worthless. Life itself is the far greater good; goods only enhance life. Recognising the transitoriness of life and the vanity of goods, we come to see that the only reality worthy of our total commitment is our relationship with God in Christ. Though made of dust and thus subject to perishability, we are joined with Christ and are promised imperishability. Having died to the vanities of this world, having taken off our old selves with their evil desires, we can now live as a new self, in generosity rather than greed, with openness to others rather than religious or gender or social biases. In our commitment to Christ we will discover that we can transform what is transitory in life by giving it away in love. If we can live in this way, life is anything but vanity!
