



There is no need to book for the weekday Masses.

The bookings are now open. Further weekend Masses will be added each week, taking into consideration any changes in government restrictions.

Here are some pointers that might help:

- Once you have selected the Mass you would like to book for, you will need to enter the quantity of tickets at the bottom of the page. Then click NEXT.
- 2. Once you have read and agreed to the "Additional Information" you will need to select "YES" from the dropdown box that says "I Agree to the Terms Above"
- You will then need to enter the First Name and the Last Name of each of the Attendees. Then click NEXT.
- In the Checkout, you will need to complete all the fields, First Name, Last Name, Phone Number, Address, Suburb, Postcode and Email Address. Then click PURCHASE.
- 5. If you have completed the transaction successfully, you will see "Transaction Successful" on the following page and you will receive an email with the "ticket" to the Mass you have selected.
- 6. If you do not see "Transaction Successful" and you do not receive an email (please remember to check your junk email) then the items may still be in your cart and you may need to re-complete one of the steps.
- You do not need to print the ticket. We will have your name on the "Ticket Holder List" for each Mass.

It has been a busy time at the College.

Year 12 Music recently participated in an HSC Masterclass. This is an annual event by the Music Department in preparation for their trial practical exam. They rehearsed with piano accompanist Lindsay Gilroy to learn more about performance presentation and are now busily preparing for their four pieces for this week's exam. The college is very proud of their progress this year.

Our Year 8 Amiel 1 Class has just raised \$761.24 for Project Compassion. Mater Maria participates in the Project Compassion Appeal which is held annually during Lent. Our students initially donated their own money, then held a cake stall and finally sold chocolates to raise money for Caritas 2020. The money raised will be sent overseas to developing countries. We are blessed to have such caring students at our College.

Music Changes During Mass

Due to the ongoing spread of COVID-19 in Australia, you will notice some music changes being implemented for the time being. These will reduce the risk of any transmission occurring in our churches, while also enabling us to maintain music as an important part of the liturgy. Choirs in both churches and the use of woodwind instruments have already been suspended, and further measures include having fewer musicians leading the hymns and the parts of the mass (such as the Gloria), will be said.

Pope appoints new Bishop to the Diocese of Port Pirie, Australia

On Saturday 1st August, Pope Francis appointed Fr Karol Kulczycki SDS, the former head of the Salvatorians in Australia, as the new bishop of the Diocese of Port Pirie in regional South Australia.



Fr Kulczycki was born in Poland in 1966, ordained to the priesthood in Trzebinia in 1994 and is currently based in Poland. He spent 21 years serving the Church in Western Australia, including in parish ministry, as vocations director and as a college chaplain.

In February 2018, while still serving in Australia, Fr Kulczycki SDS was elected vice-provincial of the Polish province of the Society of the Divine Saviour — widely known as the Salvatorians. Two-and-a-half years on, Pope Francis has appointed him Bishop of Port Pirie.

"Just a few weeks ago I had an interview for our Salvatorian newsletter and was asked how and where I see myself in 10 or 20 years. I replied that I would be where God sent me. I did not expect that God would act so quickly in my life," Fr Kulczycki said.

"God is working in mysterious ways in my life. Firstly, calling me unexpectedly to religious and priestly life; secondly, directing my heart to serve him in Australia and now serving him and his people in Port Pirie Diocese."

Fr Kulczycki will become the 12th Bishop of Port Pirie — including the bishops who led what was from 1887 until 1951 the Diocese of Port Augusta.

He succeeds Bishop Greg O'Kelly SJ, who has been Bishop of Port Pirie since 2009. Bishop O'Kelly also served as apostolic administrator of the Archdiocese of Adelaide for almost two years.

"The Diocese welcomes Bishop-Elect Karol with open arms," Bishop O'Kelly said.

"We note his pastoral experience in country ministries, especially in Geraldton. Our people and clergy are loyal and committed, and all look forward to receiving Bishop-Elect Karol as our new chief pastor."

Port Pirie Diocese, stretching from Uluru to Port Lincoln and from the West Australian border to the River Murray, is one of Australia's largest dioceses. It is three times larger than Poland, by area.

"Serving in different ministries and places in Western Australia gave me a bit of understanding of the beauty and vastness of the Australian land. I love the Australian Outback. Of course, it will take a bit of time for me to know the land, people, parishes, schools and other ministries," Fr Kulczycki said.

"Trusting God, I ask for his blessing upon all people of the Port Pirie Diocese. I would humbly ask priests, religious and laity to pray for me and for each other, as I am praying for you."

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference president Archbishop Mark Coleridge said Fr Kulczycki clearly made a strong impression in his time in Australia.

"The bishops look forward to getting to know Bishop-Elect Karol and working with him at this time with all its complexities and challenges, especially in a vast rural diocese like Port Pirie," he said.

"He will clearly bring to the task all the gifts and experiences that have led to this appointment." It is not yet known when Fr Kulczycki will arrive in Australia, nor when he will be ordained bishop.

Congratulations Fr. Karol, his family, the confreres of the Polish Province. We wish him all the best and God's blessing for this important service for the Church.

Saint Mary MacKillop's Story

If Saint Mary MacKillop were alive today, she would be a household name. It's not that she sought the limelight. On the contrary, she simply wanted to serve the poor wherever she found them in her native Australia. But along the way, she managed to arouse the ire of some rather powerful churchmen. One even excommunicated her for a time.



Born in Melbourne in 1842, to parents who had emigrated from Scotland, Mary grew up in a family that faced constant financial struggles. As a young woman she was drawn to religious life but could not find an existing order of Sisters that met her needs. In 1860, she met Father Julian Woods, who became her spiritual director. Together they founded a new community of women-the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart, also known as the Josephite Sisters. Its members were to staff schools especially for poor children, as well as orphanages, and do other works of charity.

As the congregation grew, so did Mary MacKillop's problems. Her priest-friend proved unreliable in many ways and his responsibilities for direction of the Sisters were removed. Meanwhile, Mary had the support of some local bishops as she and her Sisters went about their work. But the bishop in South Australia, aging and relying on others for advice, briefly excommunicated Mary-charging her with disobedience-and dispensed 50 of her Sisters from their vows. In truth, the bishop's quarrel was about power and who had authority over whom. He ultimately rescinded his order of excommunication.

Mary insisted that her congregation should be governed by an elected mother general answerable to Rome, not to the local bishop. There also were disputes about whether or not the congregation could own property. In the end, Rome proved to be Mary's best source of support. After a long wait official approval of the congregation-and how it was to be governed-came from Pope Leo XIII.

Despite her struggles with Church authorities, Mary MacKillop and her Sisters were able to offer social services that few, if any, government agencies in Australia could. They served Protestants and Catholics alike. They worked among the Aborigines. They taught in schools and orphanages and served unmarried mothers.

Money, actually the lack of it, was a constant worry. But the Sisters who begged from door to door, were bolstered by faith and by the conviction that their struggles were opportunities to grow closer to God.

By the time Mary was approaching the end of her life, the congregation was thriving. She died in 1909 at the age of 67. Pope John Paul II beatified her in 1995. In 2010, when Pope Benedict XVI canonised her, she became Australia's first saint. **Her Liturgical Feast Day is August 8.**

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Although divine power is manifested in dramatic ways, it is also present in what is unassuming. Traces of God can be seen in the delicacy of a violet, in a cool summer breeze, in the blush of innocence, in the fiery eyes of justice. Every one of us lives in the midst of God, breathes the breath of God's life, and is constantly touched by the exquisite artistry of God's creativity. Life itself is a mountain experience of God. As wonderful as life may be, it can also be very frightening at times. There are misunderstandings and rancour, jealousy and vindictiveness, greed and a hunger for power. Our personal lives can come unravelled and we can feel that we are genuinely 'at sea'. Every human being is tossed about by the exigencies of life. It is at times like these that we need faith in Jesus. Even though we do not recognise him, he is there in the midst of our chaos. Having the power of God, he is the definitive champion of all chaos, and so he is able to allay our fears and calm the sea.

A true experience of God, whether it be within the ordinariness of life or one of life's tribulations, is both transformative and effusive. It is a reality that cannot be contained; it must be proclaimed. Disciples must be ready to do what they can in order that the good news of God's revelation be made known to others.

It is our responsibilty to protect others and ourselves and stop the spread of COVID-19 in Australia.

As we move towards living COVIDSafe, it is important that you **stay at home if you feel unwell.** If you have cold or flu like symptoms, such as a fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose or shortness of breath, you should seek medical advice and get tested for COVID-19. You should get tested even if your symptoms are mild.

If you have a coughing episode in Church, we advice you to step out to the courtyard, or the parish centre, away from others for the moment.

Continue to practise good hygiene.

provided, in both of our Churches.

Everyone must also stay 1.5 metres away from other people whenever possible.




