trybooking

To ensure that we fulfil the requirements of the 80 (Mona Vale) and 100 (Avalon) people limit, we would like you to use the Trybooking website to book for our **weekend Masses**.

There is no need to book for the weekday Masses.

The bookings are now open. Further weekend Masses will be added each week, taking into consideration any changes in government restrictions.

Here are some pointers that might help:

1. Once you have selected the Mass you would like to book for, you will need to enter the quantity of tickets at the bottom of the page. Then click NEXT.
2. Once you have read and agreed to the "Additional Information" you will need to select "YES" from the dropdown box that says "I Agree to the Terms Above"
3. You will then need to enter the First Name and the Last Name of each of the Attendees. Then click NEXT.
4. In the Checkout, you will need to complete all the fields, First Name, Last Name, Phone Number, Address, Suburb, Postcode and Email Address. Then click PURCHASE.
5. If you have completed the transaction successfully, you will see "Transaction Successful" on the following page and you will receive an email with the "ticket" to the Mass you have selected.
6. If you do not see "Transaction Successful" and you do not receive an email (please remember to check your junk email) then the items may still be in your cart and you may need to re-complete one of the steps.
7. You do not need to print the ticket. We will have your name on the "Ticket Holder List" for each Mass.

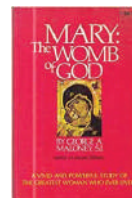

Finding God in Our Desires *By Vinita Hampton Wright*



In the world I have known, the American Midwest, the word desire has been used too often in the context of lust and sex. And yet, desire is such a sweet spiritual word, if we receive it as such. It is used in the Bible in a variety of ways, most of them referring to God's desires for us, such as when Jesus quoted from the Old Testament, **"I desire mercy, not sacrifice"** (Matthew 9:13) to describe God's true heart.

And we who are made in God's image can claim desire for our spiritual benefit. St. Ignatius believed - and this belief lies at the heart of Ignatian spirituality - that our truest desires reflect God's desires in us and for us.

One problem is our tendency to cover up our true desires with shallow wants and fashionable whims. I think I desire to look 25 again. Do I really? Or do I want to feel beautiful as I am right now? Certainly, God wants me to see my true beauty regardless of age. Does a young husband and father truly want to work ridiculously long hours to impress his boss? Or is his true desire to provide a stable living to support his family - and he's become convinced that working himself to death is the only way to do it?

Do we desire to win the argument - or to achieve peace? To avoid prayer because it brings up fears and guilt - or to

encounter God in a way that banishes these ills and heals us?

In fact, are my desires determined by my fears? If so, then they are probably false or incomplete desires. God's perfect love casts out fear, leaving us free to desire what is best, not what is expedient or merely safe.

The only way to discover our truest desires is to bring ourselves to prayer and spend time with our questions, our hurts and fears, and our dreams. In prayer and over time, we can allow the Holy Spirit to sift through all of it until what remains is what we really long for.

I can admit that I desire money, as long as I wrestle with how that desire is connected to something deeper, such as security, freedom from fear about what might happen to me in the future. Eventually, I can pray, not for more money, but for greater faith in God's care for me. I can admit that I desire to beat cancer but let that desire take me further to a desire for peace in God's presence whether here or in the life after this.

It's healthy to ask often, What do I desire? Ignatius posed this question to retreatants many times. He prayed that God's desires would be formed in them as they named what they needed and wanted.

We can find God in our longing and our desiring, because God is the ultimate end of all human desire. Thus, we need not fear desire but stay in conversation with it, as we remain in conversation with God.

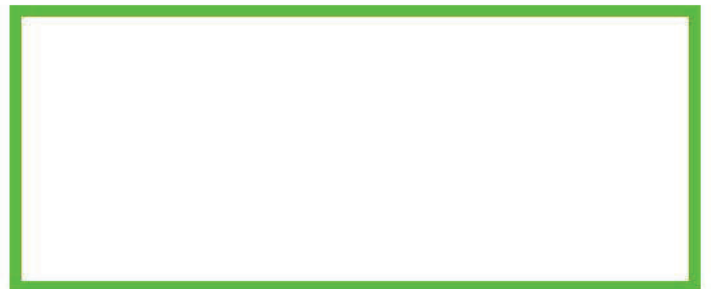

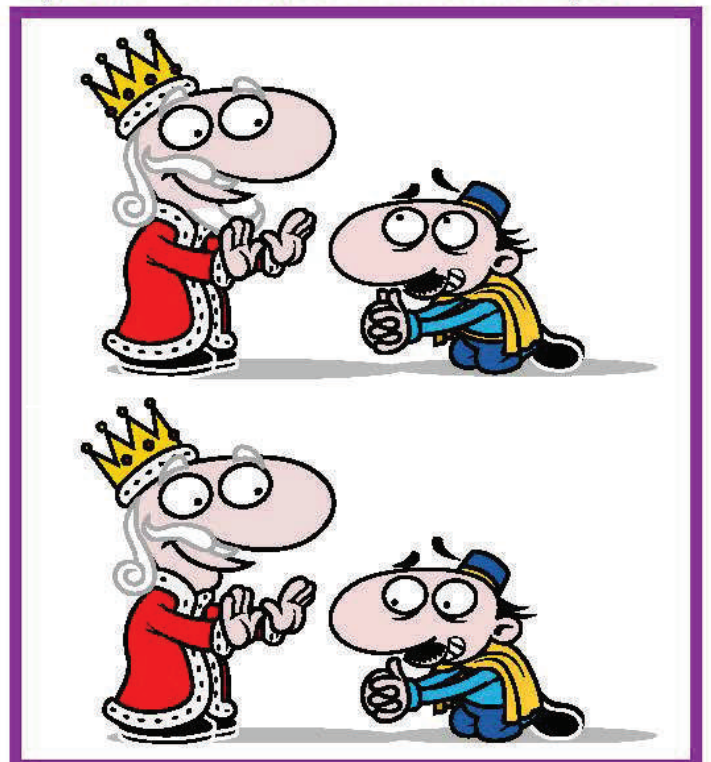

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times.
'And so the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet. 'Give me time,' he said 'and I will pay the whole sum.' And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. 'Pay what you owe me', he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, 'Give me time and I will pay you.' But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him. 'You wicked servant,' he said. 'I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow servant just as I had pity on you?' And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how my heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

A distinctive feature of the teachings of Jesus is his exhortation to forgive. Very explicit about this, Jesus left us his own example by forgiving his executioners while he hung dying on the cross. Until recently we thought that forgiveness begins with the offender repenting of the offence and then asking for pardon.

*Today many maintain that reconciliation must begin with the one offended offering forgiveness. This willingness to forgive transforms a victim into a survivor. Such magnanimity might then touch the heart of the offender, who may thus be transformed from being an offender to becoming a friend.
If God has been so generous in forgiving us, surely we should be generous in forgiving others. The process of becoming a forgiving person takes time. For some, it may take a lifetime. Only little by little are our pettiness and indignation reduced and our desire to strike back diminished. Still, as disciples, we are expected to give the forgiveness that we have been given.
Such forgiveness does not provide an easy way out for offenders, for ultimately justice will prevail. If we remain untransformed by God's forgiveness of us, we will be liable to judgment. Our unwillingness to forgive can eat away at us, and we can carry hurts from childhood far into adult years. Forgiving others, as difficult as that may be, is in the long run much easier than bearing the weight of resentfulness, vindictiveness and unresolved frustration. When we forgive we truly begin to be healed.*



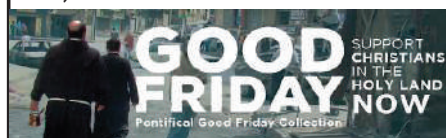
Holy Land Commissariat

The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land normally takes place on Good Friday. This year, due to the closure of churches around the world during Holy Week because of the COVID-19 Pandemic, Pope Francis moved the date for this collection.



This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment and housing. Parishes, schools, orphanages and medical centres throughout the Holy Land also rely on assistance from this collection. It is also used to maintain over 70 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus. Last year, Australian Catholics donated \$1.3 million to this cause, despite tough economic times, rural droughts and the increasing cost of living. This year, we are again facing great challenges due to COVID-19, but your generosity would again be greatly appreciated. We will be doing the collection next week. Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land and please also keep them in your prayers.

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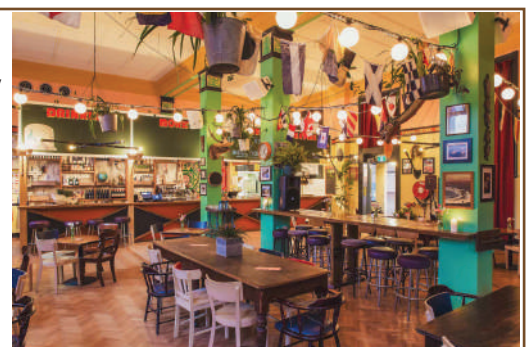
