The readings for this Sunday give us an opportunity to step back from the busyness of our everyday lives to consider more deeply the riches we have been given, and what it is that we truly value. In the Gospel of St Mark, the themes of wisdom, selfless values and service to the Lord are drawn together in the story of the rich young man, whose attachment to wealth prevents him from truly following Jesus. Through this encounter, Jesus teaches us that whatever we leave behind to follow him will be far surpassed by the treasures we will inherit in heaven. During this week, may we pray for the gift of ever greater wisdom to help us recognise and seize every opportunity to show our love of God through the good we do each day.

In last weekend's bulletin, we outlined Bishop Anthony Randazzo's road map for Broken Bay once the NSW Government restrictions begin easing. In his road map, Bishop Anthony announced that once we reached the 70% vaccination rate, our Churches could be opened and available for those who are vaccinated, for private prayer and devotion only. As Bishop Anthony stated, our parishioners need to be mindful of government requirements for this stage of the Roadmap and to engage this opportunity with a sense of responsibility and COVID safety.

As we reached the 70% vaccination rate this week, we are pleased that our churches will be opened for private prayer **from Monday 11 October 2021** as follows:

Maria Regina Church, Avalon will be opened on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8am-10am and Sundays 4pm-6pm.

Sacred Heart Church, Mona Vale will be opened from Monday-Friday from 9am-4pm and Sundays 11am-1pm.

Please remember to use the QR codes or attendance sheets to register and to use the hand sanitiser available.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available by appointment. To make an appointment, please contact the parish office.

#### October–Month of the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary



The Miracle of the Sun (Portuguese: Milagre do Sol), also known as the Miracle of Fátima, is reported to have occurred on 13 October 1917, attended by a large crowd who had gathered in Fátima, Portugal, in response to a prophecy made by three shepherd children, Lúcia Santos and Francisco and Jacinta Marto.



On autumn mornings as we conclude Lauds, the giant window of Our Lady is often blazing bright in the glow of the rising sun. Mary is illumined by the Radiant Dawn, the Sun of Justice, who is Jesus Christ her Son. Baptised into Christ Jesus our lives are meant to glow with his presence as well. One way we may grow closer to him is by praying the Rosary. October is the Month traditionally dedicated to the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

What consolation the Rosary brings. Remembering the mysteries of Christ's life and Our Lady's life, we repeat Hail Mary after Hail Mary. Indeed, the mysteries of the Holy Rosaryjoyful, sorrowful, glorious and luminous- are the mysteries of our own lives as well. As we pray the Rosary, we beg Our Lady to draw us closer to him who is our Light. We remember seeing parents and grandparents so often praying their rosaries, "telling their beads" as some referred to this devotion. We remember as well that for many saints the Rosary was an indispensable part of their daily prayer.

In his biography of Pope Francis, Austen Ivreigh recounts then Cardinal Bergoglio's experience of praying with Saint John Paul:

One afternoon I went to pray the Holy Rosary that the Holy Father was leading. He was in front of us on his knees. With the Holy Father's back to me, I entered into prayer. In the middle of the prayer, I became distracted looking at the Pope, and time began to fade away. I began to imagine the young priest, the seminarian, the poet, the worker, the child from Wadowice in exactly the same posture as he was now, praying Hail Mary after Hail Mary.



His witness struck me. I felt this man, chosen to guide the Church, was the summation of a path trod together with his Mother in heaven, a path that began in his childhood. And I suddenly realised the weight of the words spoken by the Mother of Guadalupe to Saint Juan Diego, "Do not be afraid. Am I not your mother?" I grasped the presence of Mary in the pope's life. His witness did not get lost in memory. From that time onward I have prayed the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary every day. – Excerpts from The Great Reformer: Francis and the Making of a Radical Pope, Austen lvreigh, p.275

#### **BISHOP ANTHONY RANDAZZO'S "ROAD MAP" FOR BROKEN BAY**

Bishop Anthony has considered the NSW Government's "Roadmap" from the current COVID restrictions and all its implications for the Faithful of Broken Bay, and has determined the following to apply to our own diocese:

- 1. From the Monday after 70% vaccination rate has been achieved (forecast to be Monday 11 October) when places of public worship can be opened and be available for those who are vaccinated, our churches will be reopened for private prayer and devotion only. It is for our people to be mindful of government requirements for this stage of the Roadmap and to engage this opportunity with a sense of responsibility and COVID safety.
- 2. From the Monday after 80% vaccination rate has been achieved, public Masses will resume in our churches according to the usual schedule. In accord with the government regulation, the vaccination status of our people who attend our churches, or who undertake a ministry in them, will not need to be verified.

During this stage:

- a. Other rituals such as Baptisms and other services of prayer and devotion may resume.
- b. Confessions will be scheduled again.
- c. The number of people who can attend Mass and other liturgies and services of prayer will be based on the 4 sqm principle (uncapped), including for funerals and weddings.
- d. Congregational singing will not be possible, but a musician and cantor are possible and will be engaged for the beauty of the liturgy.
- e. COVID safe practices related to the celebration of our liturgies will be re- introduced.
- f. It is essential that anyone visiting our churches use the QR code to register their visit, sanitize, and always wear a mask.
- g. The use of our facilities such as meeting rooms and halls will not be possible.
- 3. From 1 December 2021
  - a. Density for gatherings in our churches will shift to one person per 2 sqm for both indoor and outdoor gatherings.
  - b. Congregational singing will be possible at our liturgies.
  - c. There will be no restriction on the use of other parish facilities such as meeting rooms and halls.

Bishop Anthony is confident that the staged return he has outlined, in accord with both the spiritual needs of our people and the Roadmap, will ensure our safety and our unity as we journey forward together into the new environment ahead of us.

away sad, for he was a man of great wealth. Jesus looked round and said to his

disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.' Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land - not without persecutions - now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.

This Sunday's readings confront us with the need to make choices in life, choices for God. They also remind us that no significant choice is without its price. However, if we make the right choice, we are assured that we will be richly rewarded.

We all want to be happy in life. We just don't always know which doors to open, and how far to enter them. We need wisdom for that. The more options that are open to us, the more difficult it is to choose, but choose we must. To choose one option is to relinquish the others. The young man in the gospel wanted eternal life. Surely there is nothing more worthy than that. However, the price he was asked to pay was more than he had expected, and he went away saddened. To choose is to face the consequences of the word of God, and sometimes this is as sharp as a two-edged sword. One of the mysteries of faith is the incomprehensible generosity of God. We choose wisdom instead of all of the good things of the world, and we receive these good things along with wisdom itself. We are asked to relinquish all of the things that we value, and we get them back a hundredfold. We are invited to take a step into the unknown. We are told that we will not fall. However, we are never sure of this until we take the step and discover that we have not fallen. God demands so much, but gives so much more.
