BISHOP ANTHONY RANDAZZO'S "ROAD MAP" FOR BROKEN BAY

Bishop Anthony has considered the NSW Government's "Roadmap" from the current COVID restrictions and all its implications for the Faithful of Broken Bay, and has determined the following to apply to our own diocese:

- 1. From the Monday after 70% vaccination rate has been achieved (forecast to be Monday 11 October) when places of public worship can be opened and be available for those who are vaccinated, our churches will be reopened for private prayer and devotion only. It is for our people to be mindful of government requirements for this stage of the Roadmap and to engage this opportunity with a sense of responsibility and COVID safety.
- 2. From the Monday after 80% vaccination rate has been achieved, public Masses will resume in our churches according to the usual schedule. In accord with the government regulation, the vaccination status of our people who attend our churches, or who undertake a ministry in them, will not need to be verified.

During this stage:

- a. Other rituals such as Baptisms and other services of prayer and devotion may resume.
- b. Confessions will be scheduled again.
- c. The number of people who can attend Mass and other liturgies and services of prayer will be based on the 4 sqm principle (uncapped), including for funerals and weddings.
- d. Congregational singing will not be possible, but a musician and cantor are possible and will be engaged for the beauty of the liturgy.
- e. COVID safe practices related to the celebration of our liturgies will be re-introduced.
- f. It is essential that anyone visiting our churches use the QR code to register their visit, sanitize, and always wear a mask.
- g. The use of our facilities such as meeting rooms and halls will not be possible.

3. From 1 December 2021

- a. Density for gatherings in our churches will shift to one person per 2 sqm for both indoor and outdoor gatherings.
- b. Congregational singing will be possible at our liturgies.
- c. There will be no restriction on the use of other parish facilities such as meeting rooms and halls.

Bishop Anthony is confident that the staged return he has outlined, in accord with both the spiritual needs of our people and the Roadmap, will ensure our safety and our unity as we journey forward together into the new environment ahead of us.

Volunteering: Glorifying the Lord through service to others By Father John W. Crossin, OSFS | Catholic News Service

At the end of Mass, we are blessed and sent "in peace to love and serve the Lord." But how are we to be disciples of Christ in everyday life, outside of Mass?

We realise that our Christianity is to be lived, but how do we do so in our ordinary life situations that can be so complicated and somewhat secular?

The Gospel imperative is clear: We are to love God and love each other. More particularly, we know that when we serve "the least of these" we are serving Christ.

Our discernment of God's will begins at the Eucharist. It continues in our personal prayer. We should consider and "pray about" what gifts we have been given by God that can be of service to others.

A spiritual director and/or spiritual friends can be helpful in this process of discernment. My pastoral experience has been that Catholics tend to miss or understate the gifts that they have been given by the Holy Spirit. What is obvious to others may not be obvious to us.

If we come to know our gifts, we can still wonder what we can do specifically. Certainly, we should ask the Holy Spirit to guide us. Often the Spirit can speak to us through circumstances we encounter or, as with the parishioners, the invitation of another.

St. Francis de Sales is insightful here. He observes that daily life provides many small opportunities to serve others. If God is calling us to assume a more extended service, this will become clear to us over time.

"Start small" is good advice. We should consider that God can surprise us by his call. The call can be to do something modest but necessary for the welfare of others.

At times we will plant seeds of goodness and others will reap the results in the future. My friend who volunteers with Habitat for Humanity contributes his time and talent but rarely meets the eventual owners of the house.

Our service will call of us to practice the everyday virtues such as patience, humility, gentleness and simplicity.

If we look at social media or other means of communication, it often appears that Catholic teaching focuses on "what not to do." We realise that such an emphasis can spark conflict, attract attention and "sell."

We know from the "inside" that Catholic moral teaching is more positive. Morality is about becoming a certain kind of person. Our service is

about practicing the virtues and becoming more like Christ.

An important daily virtue is humility. Service is a two-way process. We need to spend more of our time listening to others than speaking.

Usually those we think we are serving are also serving us. There is wisdom in paying attention and learning. Service to others can be personally enriching.

A man I knew felt called to serve the dying. He spent many of his Saturday mornings helping at a hospice run by an order of sisters. He told me that he did whatever the sisters told him to do - which included cleaning the floor.

He said he learned a great deal from speaking with the poor people who were dying. I was amazed at the humility of this prominent, successful attorney who for many years quietly served the poor.

Service need not be complicated. Following the guidance of those who are more expert is not difficult, nor is it always hard to listen to others. Service to others can put us in touch with the simple living and detachment from material goods that Jesus teaches.

Gentleness with others shows our respect for their human dignity. This virtue can gradually become evident in all or most of our daily interactions.

Gentleness with others often reflects our gentleness with ourselves. Sometimes we need to silence our "inner critic," rely on God's mercy and share that mercy with the members of our community.

The monsignor and the lawyer were both using their gifts to build a community of service. As Pope Francis continually reminds us, we are called to walk with others and to encounter others on the pilgrimage of life.



Such friendships are one of the keys to our spiritual growth and to a joyful life. We pray for the others and ask them to pray for us. We "go in peace" seeking the guidance of the Spirit in serving others and letting others serve us.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

When we set out to follow Jesus, faithful to the promises that we made at baptism to renounce sin and live lives directed by the Spirit, we normally do so with generosity of heart. However, after we have borne the burdens of this decision and realise some of the implications of our commitment, we begin to wonder if it was worth it. We believe that God will generously bless us. Still, would it be so wrong to hope for a little more, especially if we have made significant

sacrifices along the way? Of those to whom much has been given, much will be required in return. The closer we are to Jesus, the more we will be expected to mirror him. The great ones in the reign of God, the ones who exercise authority over others, must be the servants of the rest. Parents, teachers, civil authorities, managers of every kind, pastoral leaders must all be servants, as Jesus was a servant. We will also have to drink from his cup of suffering and be baptised into his death. As we draw close to the one who gave his life as an offering for sin, we will find that the same self-sacrifice is being asked of us. When we struggle with the misfortunes that we face because of our commitment to Jesus, we will have him as an inspiration and a model to follow. He can sympathise with our weaknesses, identify with our suffering. We can draw strength from his example and hope from his kindness.

Church Tradition has always urged prayer for the deceased, in particular by offering the Eucharistic Celebration for them: it is the best spiritual help that we can give to their souls, particularly to those who are the most forsaken. The foundation of prayer in suffrage lies in the communion of the Mystical Body.

As the Second Vatican Council repeats, "fully conscious of this communion of the whole Mystical Body of Jesus Christ, the pilgrim Church from the very first ages of the Christian religion has cultivated with great piety the memory of the dead" (Lumen Gentium, n. 50).

Remembering the dead, caring for their graves and prayers of suffrage, are the testimony of confident hope, rooted in the certainty that death does not have the last word on human existence, for man is destined to a life without limits, which has its roots and its fulfillment in God.
