Dear Parishioners of Pittwater Parish,

As you know, our Bishop of Broken Bay, Bishop Anthony Randazzo, has suspended all public Masses until further notice. (*His full letter to the people of the Diocese is included in this bulletin*). Although all Masses are suspended, I want to make sure that you are aware of all the things our parish can still offer you during this time.

This year our parish is focusing on prayer. We have already been speaking about how important prayer is in our Christian life. At this time when we are impacted by the effects of COVID-19, I particularly want to encourage you to make time to pray. In our liturgical season of Lent, we have been asked to pray, give alms and fast. I invite you as individuals and families to get together and to strengthen our domestic Church by praying together as a household, to be open to the needs of our neighbours, be willing to help as much as possible and to make some sacrifices and offer them to God for the intentions of others.

Our churches, Maria Regina Church, Avalon and Sacred Heart Church, Mona Vale will be opened for private prayer and personal devotion. As Bishop Anthony has suggested, you may wish to pray the Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, asking for the grace that we need in our Church and in our world at this time. You may choose to read the Bible or meditate on the Way of the Cross. There are also the Sundays readings and reflection included in the bulletin each week. We will continue to offer Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Thursdays, between 9am and 11am at Maria Regina Church, Avalon and between 7pm and 9pm at Sacred Heart Church, Mona Vale. Please adhere to the government regulations, gather only in small groups and maintain a safe distance from each other.

Although public Masses in our Diocese of Broken Bay are suspended for the time being, Fr Richard and myself will continue to celebrate the Holy Mass privately and are still ready and willing to serve you. Any scheduled Mass intentions will be fulfilled in this way. Therefore, if you would like to offer a Mass intention, such as for someone who is sick, recently deceased, deceased anniversary or any other special intention, you can organise these through our parish office. We will of course, keep you, our valued parishioners, in our prayers constantly and as the parish priest, I will continue to fulfil my obligation to celebrate one Mass on the weekend for you, the parishioners entrusted in my pastoral care.

We would like to be able to contact you in order to update you on new regulations and any changes, with ways that the Parish can support you during this difficult time and to provide you with resources as they become available. If you would like to stay informed, please ensure that our parish office has your name, email address and telephone number. You can email these details to our parish at office@pittwaterparish.org or call 91570999.

We are working on ways that you can join us in spiritual communion from your own homes and include you in our parish celebrations and we hope to share these with you soon.

In cases of emergency, Fr Richard and myself are available for anointing of the sick and individual confession. Please do not hesitate to contact our parish office to organise the visit.

The money contributed to our parish via our second collection helps us to meet the running costs which our Parish incurs, including wages, electricity, telephones, insurances, rates, building and equipment repairs and maintenance, to name but a few. As we are unable to donate via our second collection at present, our parish will not receive the funds which are truly needed to cover our relentless stream of expenses. Whilst you are unable to attend Mass, if you are able to make your regular donation by way of automatic direct debit from your credit card, please complete the form included in this bulletin. The "Tap and Go Devices" are also available at the back of our Mona Vale Church to support our parish. If you would prefer not to give by credit card, please contact the parish office for other ways that you can contribute.

Our Parish office continues to be open and the staff will be happy to assist. The parish bulletin will continue to be produced each week to keep you informed and will be available on our website www.pittwaterparish.org and at the back of our Churches.

Although the Mass is at the heart of our lives as Catholics and to be deprived of the Mass is a great sacrifice, I pray that this temporary lack of the Eucharist will deepen our need for Jesus, the Bread of Life. Let us put our trust in God during these challenging times and let us keep praying for each other and especially for those who are selflessly putting themselves at the service of our community. In praying, we strengthen the recognition of the presence of God, which draws us closer to Him.





To the People of God in the Diocese of Broken Bay

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ.

The historic and momentous times in which we live have impelled the Australian Government to issue today new preventative measures to limit the transmission of the COVID-19 coronavirus as a matter of public health emergency.

A public health emergency of the kind that we are experiencing is a rare event. Today the Prime Minister reminded us that an event such as the COVID-19 outbreak has not been seen for I 00 years. Given the directions provided by the Government and after a most careful consideration of the circumstances of our own Diocese and its various parish communities, it is with great regret and a heaviness of heart, that I share with you the following: Effective from Friday 20 March, in the Diocese of Broken Bay:

- All public Masses are hereby suspended until further notice. Accordingly, this includes a
 dispensation for all the Faithful in the Diocese from the obligation to participate at Mass on Sundays and
 holy days of obligation (cc.87 §I; 1247).
 It will be possible to celebrate the weekday Mass for Thursday 19 March, The Solemnity of St Joseph
 provided that the congregation does not exceed I00.
- The celebration of Holy Mass by the priest privately is to continue and may include, if possible, the assistance of an adult minister. Previously scheduled intentions, including the Sunday Mass propopulo may be fulfilled in this manner.
- 3. The Faithful are encouraged to keep the Lord's Day holy and celebrate Sunday as a domestic church by taking time to pray together as a household (c. 1248 §2).
- 4. The Sacrament of Baptism: Baptisms are still to be celebrated provided that the number attending does not exceed I00. It is important that thought be given to providing families the option of postponing the Baptism of their child. Those families who wish to proceed with the celebration should be advised to limit the number of family and guests attending (preferably immediate family and godparents only). Baptisms must be staggered so that only one child is baptised in the one event, with the water refreshed for each ceremony.

- 5. **The Sacrament of Confirmation:** The Government's announcement today will impact on the celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation and the schedule for the same. I will consider how to attend to this in the coming weeks. All programmes of preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation should be suspended until the schedule can be reviewed.
- 6. Funerals in a church remain possible provided that the number in the congregation does not exceed I00. In accepting bookings for funerals, it will be important that Parishes work with the Funeral Director to so ensure this. The advice is that those attending should be limited to immediate family. Some Funeral Directors are already making arrangements for live-streaming of the funeral so that the number of people in the church is kept to a minimum.
- 7. **Weddings:** It may be that weddings be postponed. However, should a wedding proceed it will be limited to the same provisions of no more than 100 in the church.
- 8. **Sacrament of Reconciliation:** Our churches are to remain open for the availability of the First Form of the Rite of Confession in the usual way. The Second Form of the Rite of Confession should be suspended during this time.
 - I am aware that a number of our Parishes have suspended their programmes of preparation for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. This has been effected in accord with the principles applied to school gatherings. Some of our Parishes, however, have already completed their programmes of preparation and are ready to celebrate the Sacrament. In this event, the following advice is offered:
 - a. It would be unfortunate, having completed the programme, that the momentum for the celebration of the Sacrament be interrupted.
 - b. A gathering of people for the Sacrament in the Second Form of the Rite should be suspended as it is most likely families will express significant concern about this.
 - c. As an alternative, children, supported by their parents, might be invited to individual Confession in the church over a period of some hours on a scheduled day, so that the number of people in the confined space of the church is kept to a minimum.
 - d. If this is not possible due to local circumstances, then the liturgical celebration should be suspended to a later time in the year.
- 9. **Sacrament of Anointing.** In the celebration of the Sacrament, priests are given permission to lay on hands by holding them above rather than upon the head. Anointing the forehead is sufficient
- 10. In respect to the forthcoming Holy Week and Easter Liturgies I am currently considering how best these may be celebrated in the current circumstances and will advise in the coming weeks. I will discuss this with the Council of Priests which is to meet next Tuesday 24 March.
- 11. **As the community of the Church in Broken Bay**, I urge you to pray. It has always been our tradition to turn to God in prayer when difficulties arise, especially when a health emergency of this kind effects so many people. I commend to you in a particular way the Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Rosary, which is a Marian prayer, has Christ at its centre. When we pray the Rosary, we meditate upon the life, death, and resurrection of the Lord, through the intercession of the Virgin Mary. In the words of Saint John Paul II, "With the Rosary, the Christian people sits at the school of Mary and is led to contemplate the beauty of the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love. Through the Rosary the faithful receive abundant grace, as though from the very hands of the Mother of the Redeemer." (Rosarium Virginis Mariae I)

As you pray the Rosary, I encourage you to ask for the grace that we need in our Church and in our world at this time. Be confident in your prayers and trust that the Mother of Our Lord will accompany you and lead you to her son, Jesus. Recall the words from the Memorare prayer, and be inspired not to lose hope: "Remember, 0 most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to your protection, implored your help, or sought your intercession, was left unaided." The Rosary is a marvelous prayer that can be prayed alone, in families, or in small groups. Through this marvelous prayer, may Mary's motherly compassion keep our whole family safe from every danger. Through her intercession may all the people of Australia be sheltered from harm. And may people everywhere profit by the voice of Catholics united in prayer.

My brothers and sisters, we are living in unchartered times with implications about which we are uncertain. It is essential that our communities of Faith remain beacons of hope during this difficult and challenging time.

It is important that our churches do not close and that they remain open for prayer and personal devotion. There are many ways by which a small number of people in our parishioners may still wish to gather, remaining compliant with the law - for small group Rosary, for Exposition and Benediction, for the Way of the Cross. Indeed, I encourage small groups to use our churches for prayer, especially on a Sunday when the Blessed Sacrament may be exposed for Adoration, according to the norms governing such a practice.

Our diocesan Office for Evangelisation is currently preparing pastoral resources for use in the face of the limitations for gathering.

It is also important that our Parish offices remain open and be available for our parishioners. It is critical that all our parishes consider the most creative ways by which to retain communication with their people.

In naming this emergency, it is essential that each member of the community takes responsibility for maintaining good personal hygiene. It is also very important that those members of our community who require assistance: the young; the elderly; people with disabilities; the poor and the sick; the homeless; are cared for and not abandoned.

It is also vital that we remain good and responsible citizens. Please do not panic or fret unnecessarily. By remaining calm and adhering to Government Health recommendations, we play an important role in the community, as together we are vigilant in our attempt to keep all people safe and healthy.

Over the coming weeks, the personnel of our Diocese will continue in their contact with you and ensure that you are fully apprised of any developments which we are constantly monitoring.

Pope Francis' twin prayers for an "end to the pandemic"



Pope Francis left the Vatican on Sunday to visit two important pilgrimage sites in Rome to pray for the city and the world, in the midst of the Covid-19 coronavirus outbreak.

Two intense moments of prayer: one before the ancient icon of Maria Salus Populi Romani at the Basilica of St. Mary Major, and the other at the foot of a wooden crucifix that protected Rome from a great plague.

Pope Francis spent his afternoon on the Third Sunday of Lent seeking to underline his closeness to those who suffer by imploring the special protection of Our Lady.

Mary before the Cross

The Director of the Holy See Press Office, Matteo Bruni, announced the Pope's visits in a communique on Sunday.

"This afternoon, just after 4 PM, Pope Francis left the Vatican and made a private visit to the Basilica of St. Mary Major, to offer a prayer to the Virgin Mary, Salus Populi Romani, where her icon is kept and venerated. Then, after taking a walk along the Via del Corso — as if making a pilgrimage — he visited the church of San Marcello on the Corso, where a miraculous crucifix is housed. In 1522 it was carried in procession throughout the neighbourhoods of the city so that the "Great Plague" might cease in Rome. With his prayer, the Holy Father pleaded for an end to the pandemic that has struck Italy and the world. He also implored the healing of the many sick people, remembered the numerous victims of these past days, and asked that their families and friends might find consolation and comfort. His prayer intention was also extended to healthcare workers, doctors, nurses, and all those working in these days to guarantee the smooth

functioning of society. The Holy Father returned to the Vatican around 5:30 PM."



Devotion to the Marian icon

Pope Francis' special devotion to Our Lady Salus Populi Romani is well-known. He visits her icon on major Marian feast days, and makes a point to stop in for a prayer both before and after his international Apostolic Journeys.

In 593 Pope St. Gregory the Great carried the icon in procession to stop a plague. And in 1837 Pope Gregory XVI invoked her to put an end to a cholera epidemic.



Miraculous crucifix

The Pope's second stop on Sunday was also significant, considering the critical moment the world is going through.

The church of San Marcello on the Corso houses a venerated wooden crucifix from the 15th century, which scholars hold is the most realistic in Rome. It even survived a fire, and saved the city from a plague. Pope St. John Paul II embraced that same crucifix to mark the culmination of the Day of Forgiveness during the Jubilee Year of 2000.

From the ashes

The numerous traditions of miracles attributed to the "Most Holy Crucifix" began on 23 May 1519.

On that night a large fire completely destroyed the church that bears Pope Marcel's name. The entire building was found in ruins the next morning. But from the ashes emerged the crucifix of the main altar, untouched. A small oil lamp still burned at the Crucified's feet.

The scene greatly touched the faithful of Rome, and several began to meet every Friday evening to pray. Pope Leo X ordered the rebuilding of the church in 1519.



To stop Rome's great plaque

Three years after the fire, Rome was hit by the "Great Plague". The faithful carried the crucifix in procession — despite the bans understandably put in place by the authorities to halt the spread of the contagion. The crucifix was carried through the streets of Rome toward St. Peter's Basilica. The procession lasted 16 days: from 4 to 20 August 1522. As it progressed, the plague showed signs of retreating, and every neighbourhood sought to keep the crucifix as long as possible.

Finally, as the crucifix reentered the church, the plague ceased altogether. Since 1600, the procession from the church of San Marcello to St. Peter's Basilica became a tradition repeated during Holy Years. The names of the Popes who called each Jubilee are inscribed on the back of the crucifix, along with the year.

First Reading A reading from the first book of Samuel In the presence of the Lord God, they anointed David king of Israel.

Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot he from God; he does not keen the be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man. However, the Jews would not believe that the man had been blind and had gained his sight, without first sending for his parents and asking them, 'Is this man really your son who you say was born blind? If so, how is it that he is now able to see?' His parents answered, 'We know he is our son and we know he was born blind, but we don't know how it is that He can see now, or who opened his eyes. He is old enough: let him speak for himself.' His parents spoke like this out of fear of the Jews, who had already agreed to expel from the synagogue anyone who should acknowledge Jesus as the Christ. This was why his parents said, 'He is old enough; ask him.'
So the Jews again sent for the man and said to him, 'Give glory to God! For our part, we know that this man is a sinner. The man replied, 'Now here is an astonishing thing! He has opened my eyes, and you don't know where he comes from! We know that God doesn't listen to sinners, but God does listen to men who are devout and do his will. Ever since the world began it is unheard of for anyone to open the eyes of a man who was born blind; if this man were not from God, he couldn't do a thing.' 'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away. Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' 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

Humans see and judge by appearances, but God looks into the heart, and there finds the real person. God's standards are not superficial, as are so many of the standards of the world. It is not age, beauty or physical strength that is important; it is not social position or religious role that is preferred. God chooses whom God chooses. God saw in David, the insignificant shepherd, the potential for being the chief shepherd of his people. The man who was born blind became the one through whom others would see the mighty works of God. Yet, neither young David nor the man in the gospel made the initial step; each simply responded with openness to God's choice of him.

By what criteria do we judge others? Do we consider some people too insignificant for greatness? Are we overly concerned with status? Do we categorise people according to the disease or physical limitation that they must endure? Do we sometimes blame them for their disability? Do our eyes perceive life in accord with the standards of a materialistic, body-orientated, pleasure-seeking society? Or do we look into the other's heart, as God does? As with the other scrutiny Sundays, catechumens and long-standing members alike are exhorted to make a choice. Jesus is the one who gives sight to blind eyes and religious insight to those open to receive it. However, there is a price to pay. Will it be the standards of the world, or the power of God in Jesus Christ?



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
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
