

Trusting God in the unknown

The unknown things in our lives are hard. Rarely welcome, they intrude on our sense of well-being.

Are you facing an uncertain future right now? Do you long for the assurance of a specific outcome? Does it seem like the less you know and the longer you wait, the more anxiety and fear chase away your peace of mind?

God cares about you and what's going on in your life right now. He is with you in the midst of what you're facing, and He can help in your uncertainty and suffering.

Here are the stories of three different people with very different unknowns - an unknown future, an unknown illness and an unexpected loss - and how their process of trusting God is transforming their lives.

How to Move Forward After Graduation (Jennifer Wooster)



"No matter what you decide to do, it's never outside of God's plans," shared the speaker at my campus ministry retreat. For me, a graduating college senior, these are comforting words.

God is big enough to use any decision I make. Whichever path I take, God will still be with me. If my first choice after graduation doesn't work out, I know God will provide for me. I can trust the community I've built in my church to help me as well.

How to Move Forward in the Unknown

The difficulty with transition is the many possibilities - of careers or even going back for more schooling. God seems to lead some people to a specific job or place. But I've never seen a flashing sign or a bolt of lightning telling me what to do. So I weigh my options by talking to God through prayer, and then I make a choice. Each step of the way, I pray, "If this isn't what I should be doing, make obstacles for me." But God doesn't always close a door. Often, He leaves me with several opportunities. In any case, I must choose to move forward by faith.

A New Perspective

My post-graduation plans are still uncertain, but I feel safe knowing that God has a plan for my life. And that plan doesn't have to include a straight path. Life is about the journey of maturing and growing wiser. God has never (Jordan Stroman)promised I will be rich or successful if I follow Him, but the Bible tells me that where my treasure is, there my heart is also. If I love God more than other things, it will be harder for me to be disappointed when I don't get those other things, because I will always have God.

I Lost a Friend but Learned How to Trust God (Melody Copenny)



"The same story told from two different perspectives have completely different meanings; that's what life is." This quote by director and screenwriter Ava Duvernay resonated deeply with me during the painful ending of a friendship.

A lot of misunderstanding sat between my former friend and me right before the friendship imploded.

Even when glimmers of hope surfaced that maybe it could be saved, our inability to trust again and be vulnerable with each other sealed our friendship's demise.

The rejection hurt me. Profoundly.

God saw me, and He wanted me to trust Him in the unknowns of grieving that loss. I chose to walk with Him through it so I could learn how to heal.

What I Learned From God

There's a regular inner dialogue taking place between God and me daily. One thing He revealed to me is that one person's experience doesn't get to cancel out another person's experience - both can be valid.

The pain and challenges my friend and I had with each other were real.

Another thing God helped me see is that listening to the other person in a relationship and choosing to see the story from a different viewpoint, even if you may not fully understand it, is hard work.

The work is necessary because it brings change to both people, helping them mature.


God invited me to be faithful to this process of discovery, which gave me a chance to consider:

In what ways could I become a better listener in my friendships? How did God want me to deepen in my compassion and understanding for others?

What were unhealthy parts of that former friendship that I don't need to resurrect in new ones?

God gave me priceless lessons in how to lose and let go. Because of that, I can value my story and understand the experiences of others.

Choosing to Trust God in the Unknown (Jordan Stroman)



How do you respond when suffering enters your world, changes the way you see everything and shows you just how completely out of control you are?

My story that I'm living is about suffering, complex questions and big prayers.

I was born with a neuromuscular atrophy disease. It has caused me to gradually lose every major physical ability I once had: walking, eating orally and swallowing, speaking with volume and clarity, breathing on my own. It's been a continual journey of mourning and discovery.

Doctors have never been able to specifically diagnose the disease that

plagues my body. Because of that, there's no roadmap to give me an idea of what's ahead.

Thankful for the Mystery

Some days, the unknown terrifies me, but most of the time I'm thankful for the mystery. I'm sitting in a space where I have no semblance of control, and because of that, the One who created the stars is my one and only refuge. When you realise that the comforts you know as normal are not actually guaranteed, it's jarring.

In our anger and pain, we have a choice: We can turn away from God because "God wouldn't have allowed this if He is who He says He is." Or we can walk toward Him, believing that His love isn't dependent on our circumstances, understanding that He makes all things new, and realising that even in the most difficult experiences, He has given us a beautiful and unique purpose.

This life we've been given was never promised to be an easy one. Through our suffering, we can experience God even more intimately than if our lives were without pain.

Because God is a Redeemer, He restores and repurposes the broken parts of our stories. They become conduits to a deeper relationship with Him and to a fuller grasp of the gospel.

Joy in Suffering

When we choose to trust God in the unknown, in the most difficult parts of our stories, we experience the truest form of joy. It's a joy that isn't dependent on our circumstances - a joy that begins to transform the way our eyes see the challenges around us.

This joy, which is a result of depending on the Holy Spirit, allows us to understand a little more of Jesus' immense sacrifice on the Cross and, therefore, to truly see how this life is a beautiful gift.

"Though you have not seen Him, you love Him. Though you do not now see Him, you believe in Him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory" (1 Peter 1:8).

Parishes have paper forms for adults and special forms for children 8-14 years (you may like to distribute children's forms directly to the children). Parishioners can fill in the surveys and place them in the box provided at the back of the Church, on that same Sunday.

The role will require flexibility with the working schedule, however you will need to have availability for after-hours and weekends.


You will be working closely with Parish schools and those schools within the Pittwater community to strengthen the relationship between school and Parish.



Second Reading 1 Cor 15:1-11 A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I preach what they preach, and this is what you believe.

Brothers, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, the gospel that you received and in which you are firmly established; because the gospel will save you only if you keep believing exactly what I preached to you - believing anything else will not lead to anything. Well then, in the first place, I taught you what I had been taught myself, namely that Christ died for our sins, in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; and that he was raised to life on the third day, in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared first to Cephas and secondly to the Twelve. Next he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died; then he appeared to James, and then to all the apostles; and last of all he appeared to me too; it was as though I was born when no one expected it. I am the least of the apostles; in fact, since I persecuted the Church of God, I hardly deserve the name apostle; but by God's grace that is what I am, and the grace that he gave me has not been fruitless. On the contrary, I, or rather the grace of God that is with me, have worked harder than any of the others; but what matters is that I preach what they preach, and this is what you all believed.

Gospel Lk 5:1-11 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

They left everything and followed him.

Jesus was standing one day by the lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats – it was Simon's – and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat.

When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their

companions in the other boat to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point. When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

The Gospel of the Lord

Communion Antiphon Cf. Ps 106:8-9 Let them thank the Lord for his mercy, his wonders for the children of men, for he satisfies the thirsty soul, and the hungry he fills with good things.

Reflection

Today we consider the call to continue the mission of Jesus by engaging in some form of ministry. The first and the last readings are call narratives; the epistle contains a statement of the faith that undergirds our response to our call; the psalm response celebrates the gracious goodness of God that makes all of this possible.

Our call is more than a summons to faith; it is a call to ministry. Isaiah is called in order to be sent; the fishermen are called in order to gather others to Jesus. So it is with us. We are called to be sent out to the world. This call comes to us in the ordinariness of life. It will usually come to us as we wash our nets or our dishes, as we teach or raise children, as we prepare a brief for trial or examine a patient; as we repair cars or work at the computer. The call of God comes to us in the ordinariness of life. We are called to proclaim the message of the resurrection by any and every means possible. Some, like Isaiah and the disciples of Jesus, will witness in open and dramatic ways. They will teach and preach; they will nurse the sick and care for the elderly. Others will witness in less conspicuous ways. They will insist on fair practices in their own workplaces; they will weed out expressions of prejudice and violence so that a new and just world can be fashioned for , themselves and for their children. Called in the ordinariness of their lives, they will witness to the death and resurrection in that very ordinariness, thus transforming everything into extraordinariness.

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
