

The Way of the Heart: Pope Francis' Prayer Intention for June



We pray that all those who suffer may find their way in life, allowing themselves to be touched by the Heart of Jesus.

The heart has always been a symbol of the miracle of life and of its fragility. The association is inescapable. If our heart stops beating, our life comes to a final halt, too. But the marvel is that it can keep beating unaided for over a hundred years. The heart, too, has been very remote: only in the lifetime of many of us has it been

possible to operate on it. Because it was so central and so mysterious it was seen as the deepest and most precious part of ourselves. We still speak in that way of the heart. To go to the heart of things is to cut away distractions and to understand them deeply. To speak from the heart is to say what you most deeply believe and feel, not in a superficial or self-deceiving way.

The heart, too, has always been seen as a symbol of our feelings and attitudes. To have a hard heart is to be callous. To have a soft heart is to be sympathetic, sometimes too much so. In particular it has been seen as the home of love. We can all think of love songs, many of them pretty dire, in which the heart is mentioned.

When the Scriptures speak of our heart, they usually refer to the depths of ourselves where we reveal what matters most deeply to us. That is the deep level of honesty and self-knowledge at which God wants our relationship to him to be conducted. When the Scriptures speak of God's attitudes and feelings towards us, they cover a range of human feelings — anger, rage, love, tenderness, sadness. But God always returns to love and forgiveness. Love conquers all. Jesus especially, is identified with God's love. In him the Son of God comes to share our messy and murderous world and dies for us out of love. Jesus shows God to be a loving Father and not a judge, executioner or absentee landlord, but one whose love

is tender and conquers death and human viciousness.

We Christians constantly lose sight of God's love and are tempted to see God instead as a hard taskmaster, an impersonal and unfeeling force, or a judge inflicting inflexible punishments. We redefine love as expectation. If our experience has been of stern and punitive figures of authority, our image of God will also be harsh. Saints constantly respond to this caricature of God by turning us back to the Jesus of the Gospel who speaks of God's love both in his words and in what he does: healing, driving out demons, bringing joy out of grief. God is at the heart of things, and the heart of God is love

That is the background of Pope Francis' prayer. If we face great suffering in our lives, it is easy to become depressed and to see God as punishing us for our sins or as not caring at all about us. It is easy to pray in fear or to give up on prayer. That is why Pope Francis begins by asking us to pray that people who suffer - and we all know what it is to suffer - will find their own way in life, and that in doing this they might be touched by Jesus' love.

As always Pope Francis speaks out of a deep relationship with Jesus in which we enter his humanity with its depth and range of feelings, and find consolation in his love.

Most Rev Anthony Randazzo Bishop of Broken Bay Message for BBNeighbourhoods 2 June 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Yesterday, for the Feast of Mary, Star of the Sea, I celebrated Mass in the Cathedral with an assembly of the community of the Church inside the building while livestreaming into homes. I am delighted that Government has eased restrictions on our churches. While we still have a long way to go, we are now able to gather in groups of 50 people for prayer, worship, and most importantly for holy Mass.

As we begin to return to our churches, I would ask that you adhere to the health regulations that are in place. They are designed for the protection of all, especially those who might be vulnerable. We do not want to exaggerate the situation, so simple things like washing your hands before Mass with soap and water is an easy way to ensure your safety. Your priests and community leaders are doing everything possible to make our gatherings safe. I would inviteyoutoassistandhelpwheneverpossible. Ifyouareunwellorphysicallyvulnerabledue to illness, it would seem prudent to avoid coming to the church until you are recovered. However, please do not hesitate to contact your local parish so that the priests, deacons or pastoral teams can attend you, especially in your time of need.

Our Catholic School community has resumed classes and our Schools are well and truly in full swing. While all of our children are important, I would ask that you spare a thought and a prayer for our Year 12 students, in Catholic or Public Schools. The final year of high school is an important time in the lives of our youth. This year has brought added pressure and stress upon them. I am confident that as a community of faith, we will be able to accompany our young women and men as they step out into their future. Might we take the time to reassure them that they are not alone. Can we reassure them that we are with them and most importantly, that God has a marvellous plan for their lives.

This weekend we commemorate the Feast of the Blessed Trinity. It is a feast about love, relationships, fellowship and communion. The Blessed Trinity is the model of life and holiness for us. I have chosen this Feast to admit two of our seminarians as Candidates for Holy Orders, Sam French on Saturday at Woy Woy and Roger Delmonte on Sunday at the Cathedral. Candidacy is a public commitment on the part of the community of the Church to accompany these men as they move to the next stage of their formation for the priesthood. I invite you to pray for Sam and Roger, asking Jesus the Good Shepherd, to form them as shepherds after His own heart.

Please keep safe and well in these challenging times. Be reassured of a remembrance in my daily prayers and at Mass.

As we celebrate the Year of Prayer in our parish... Pope Francis' Catechesis at the General Audience on 27th May 2020



Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

Today's catechesis is dedicated to the prayer of the just.

God's plan regarding humanity is for the good. Yet in our everyday lives we experience the presence of evil: it is an everyday experience. The first chapters of the Book of Genesis describe the progressive expansion of sin in human living. Adam and Eve (see Gn 3:1-7) doubt God's good intentions. They think they are dealing with a jealous God who wants to prevent their happiness. Hence rebellion arose: they no longer believe in a generous Creator who desire their well-being. Their hearts yield to the temptation of the evil one. They are taken in by the delirium of omnipotence: "When you eat of the fruit of the tree, you will become like God" (see v. 5). And this is the temptation: this is the ambition that enters into the heart. The experience goes in the opposite direction, however. Their eyes are opened and they discover that they are naked (v. 7), with nothing. Do not forget this: the tempter is a bad payer, he pays badly.

Evil becomes even more explosive with the second human generation, it is stronger: it is the story of Cain and Abel (see Gn 4:1-16). Cain is envious of his brother: there is the worm of envy. As the first-born, he sees Abel as a rival, someone who threatens his place as the first-born. Evil enters within his heart and Cain does not succeed in controlling it. Evil starts to enter the heart: we tend always to look badly at others, with suspicion. And this also happens with our thought: "This person is bad, he will harm me". And this thought gradually enters into the heart. And so we have the story of the first relationship of brothers that ends in homicide. I think, today, of human brotherhood . . . war everywhere.

Cain's descendants develop crafts and arts, but violence develops as well. It is expressed in Lamech's sinister song that sounds like a hymn of vengeance: "I have killed a man for wounding me, a young man for bruising me [...] If Cain is avenged seven times, then Lamech seventy-seven times" (Gn 4:23-24). Revenge:

"You will pay for what you have done". But the judge

does not say this, I do. And I make myself the judge of the situation. Thus evil spreads like wildfire until it invades the entire picture: "The Lord saw how great the wickedness of human beings was on earth, and how every desire that their heart conceived was always nothing but evil" (Gn 6:5). The great frescoes of the universal flood (chapters 6-7) and of the Tower of Babel (chapter 11) reveal that a new beginning is needed, like a new creation, that will have its fulfilment in Jesus Christ.

Yet, in these first pages of the Bible, another story is also written. It is less apparent, humbler and more devout. It represents the redemption of hope. Even though almost everyone behaves cruelly, making hatred and conquest the driving force behind human affairs, there are persons who are capable of praying to God with sincerity, who are capable of writing humanity's destiny in another way. Abel offers God a sacrifice of first-fruits. After he dies, Adam and Eve had a third son, Seth, of whom Enosh (which means "mortal") is born. It is said that "at that time people began to invoke the Lord by name" (4:26). Then Enoch appears, a person who "walks with God" and who was taken up into heaven (see 5:22-24). Finally, there is the story of Noah, a just man who "walked with God" (6:9), before whom God withholds His plan to destroy humanity (see 6:7-8).

Reading these accounts, one has the impression that prayer is an embankment, that is humankind's refuge before the wave of evil that is growing in the world. We see well that we pray even to be saved from ourselves. It is important to pray: "Lord, please, save me from myself, from my ambitions, from my passions". Those who pray in the first pages of the Bible are peacemakers: in fact, when it is authentic, prayer liberates us from our instinct toward violence. It is a gaze directed toward God, so that He might return to take care of the human heart. We read in the Catechism: "This kind of prayer is lived by many righteous people in all religions" (CCC, 2569). Prayer cultivates flowerbeds of rebirth in places where human hatred was only capable of sowing a desert. And prayer is powerful, because it attracts the power of God, and the power of God always gives life: always. He is the God of life, and He brings about rebirth.

This is the reason why God's lordship is transmitted down the chain of these men and woman, who are often misunderstood and marginalised in the world. But the world lives and grows thanks to God's power that these servants of His attract through their prayer. They are like a chain, which does not make a lot of noise, that rarely makes the headlines, and yet its importance is such that it restores trust in the world! I remember the story of a man: a head of government, important, not of this time, from times past. An atheist who did not have religious feeling in his heart, but as a child used to hear his grandmother who prayed, and this stayed in his heart. And in a difficult moment of his life, that memory returned to his heart, and he said, "But my grandmother prayed...". In this way he began to pray with the formulas his grandmother used, and there he found Jesus. Prayer is a chain of life, always: many men and women who pray, sow life.

God's path and God's story is transmitted through them: it is passed down to the "remnant" of humanity who have not been conformed to the law of the strongest, but have asked that God accomplish His miracles, and above all that He transform their hearts of stone to hearts of flesh (see Ez 36:26). And prayer helps this: because prayer opens the door to God, transforming our heart, very often made of stone, into a human heart. And it takes great humanity, and with humanity one prays well.

What would Fesus Do?

What would Jesus do if He was in your shoes? Would He extend forgiveness or hold on to bitterness?

What would Jesus do if He was in your shoes? Would He resort to violence or show some patience?

What would Jesus do if He was in your shoes? Would He turn the other cheek or give you the end of a stick?

What would Jesus do if He was in your shoes? Would He seek vengence or exercise forbearance?

What would Jesus do if He was in your shoes? Would He call for retribution or forgive you no matter the situation?

What would you do if Jesus was with you? Would you continue in your ways or do as He says?

We acknowledge the lifelong trauma of abuse victims, survivors and their families, the failures of the Catholic Church to protect, believe and respond justly to children and vulnerable adults, and the consequent breach of community trust.

Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity



Each year on the Sunday following Pentecost, the Church celebrates the mystery of the Most Holy Trinity, our belief that God is One and yet Three Persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, equal in majesty and glory, One in Three and Three in One.

This is something so wonderful and sublime that the human mind cannot pretend to comprehend the full meaning of the mystery, which nonetheless is the cause of our joy and our hope as followers of Jesus Christ.

Saint Augustine of Hippo, one of the greatest minds that ever existed in the Church, who died in 430 AD, was trying to comprehend the mystery of the Holy Trinity, in which he firmly believed and placed his trust, yet realised it was no easy thing to full grasp. In his contemplation Augustine decided to take a walk along the seashore. There he saw a child playing in the sand near the shoreline. Having dug a hole in the sand, the child was bringing over handfuls of water from the nearby ocean to fill the hole.

At one point Augustine asked what the child was trying to do. The youngster replied that he wanted to empty the entire ocean into the hole he had dug in the sand. "But that is impossible," Augustine observed, "Can't you see the ocean is infinitely greater than the hole you have dug in the sand?" At that moment Augustine realised a profound truth: it is equally impossible to fill the human mind with the immensity of the mystery of the Holy Trinity.

As Saint Augustine realised, the human mind is too limited to take in all the greatness of the Trinity, he also admitted that only God can fill and satisfy the human heart. "Our hearts are restless until they rest in you, O Lord," Augustine so wisely expressed it. In other words, there are many things about God that we cannot fully understand with the mind, but that we can with the heart.

God is so much and is in fact everything: Creator, Father, Sustainer, Son, Redeemer, Infinite Wisdom, Holy Spirit, Sanctifier, Comforter, Love, Advocate, who cannot but act for the welfare of the human family, drawing all things and persons toward the knowledge and love of God.

As the Catechism of the Catholic Church rightly expresses it: "The mystery of the Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life" (number 234).

The Holy Trinity is above all a mystery of love and the complete expression of the love of God, which in turn transforms those who come to God, who live and die in God.

Furthermore, the Holy Trinity is a mystery of unity, being indivisible, meaning the Trinity cannot be divided, yet at the same time composed of three Persons, Father, Son and Holy

Spirit, as we said at the beginning. In other words, "We do not confess three gods, but one God in three persons" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, number 253).

This unity in diversity of the Holy and Blessed Trinity is all-inclusive, meaning each and every human being is welcome to partake of the life of the Trinity. The Holy Trinity in turn gives true and lasting life to others whose lives are touched by God. That is the heart of our life in the Holy Trinity. Furthermore, the life we live becomes a source of encouragement and redemption for others hungering for rest in the One God who is our origin and goal.

We are each being invited to engage more than the mind as we ponder the mystery of our living under the watchful care of the Holy Trinity. We are invited to open "the ears of our heart," as Saint Benedict so beautifully expressed it, in order to comprehend, to the degree that we can, the greatness of our God.

While living this life, we will never understand fully the God who saves us, but that is no reason to give up in our search for God, and our ardent pursuit of God's will for our life, as well as our proclamation of the Gospel by the lives we live.

God is Love, Scripture tells us, and whoever lives in love lives in God and God in the one who loves. Let us put God in the centre of our existence and go to God frequently in prayer, in praise, as well as adoration, petition, and thanksgiving. It is always a righteous thing to do and in fact gives nourishment and encouragement for our daily existence. We form a family with God. As the Trinity dwells in unity, we are called to do likewise. May God be found in the heart of our communities, our families and our relationships.

The Holy Eucharist (Mass) we celebrate is the supreme act of God's bestowing life upon human beings. We are offered the possibility of partaking in divine life when we receive the Precious Body and Blood of the Lord. It is mystery to see before us bread and wine and yet believe that contained therein is the very Body and Blood of the Redeemer of all people, our God who loves us without measure.

May we never cease to thank our God for the gifts we have received and may we remain today and always united to the Holy Trinity, our One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.


REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

The readings for this feast do not directly explain the doctrine of the Trinity as we have come to know it. Rather, they offer us glimpses into the nature of our Triune God. The psalm response suggests that our primary response to God should be one of praise for the love that God has for us.

The God who is beyond our comprehension is also the God who has saved us. We see this theme in both the first reading and the gospel. The covenant language in the reading from Exodus underscores God's unfathomable goodness. God's graciousness and mercy are not rewards for our fidelity. They are extended to us in our sinfulness. It is God's saving grace that transforms us, not any merit on our part. In the gospel we are assured that Jesus was sent into the world to save it, not to condemn it.

The Trinitarian phrase found in the letter to the Corinthians is so expressive of the love that God has for us that it has been incorporated regularly into the liturgy. It declares that through his death and resurrection, Jesus has opened for us the treasury of divine grace. It also proclaims that the love of God has forged the bonds of community that unite us. Created in the image and after the likeness of this God, we are called to unity among ourselves. As incomprehensible as it may seem, it is primarily through the unity that we share that we will manifest the unity that exists in God.

The CWF works every day by providing funds to those who are deaf or hard of hearing through the Ephpheta Centre.

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





