Sometimes we remember things our parents said, long after they are gone; their words are not dead so long as we are alive and recall them. Even merely spoken words can have an extraordinary life-span. What's true of the ordinary word is even more true of God's. That's what is stressed in today's readings. It's put in the strongest of terms in Isaiah who wrote: "The word that goes from my mouth will not return to me unfulfilled, or before having achieved for what it was sent to do."The only danger we show against God's word is our deliberate deafness. What we call today SELECTIVE DEAFNESS. And being deaf or hard of hearing is something today's Gospel does not recommend. In fact, it urges us to listen to His word attentively. It urges us to let the Word fall into good soil, so that it can yield a rich harvest in our lives.

We are invited to hear the readings in church, and there is no substitute for hearing God's word. Yet, the richest soil for God's message is in the home. Our home atmosphere must be helpful, if it's to be a good place for growth. If space is made for God in the home, through prayers, treating each other with love, participating in the Mass, forgiving one another in love, there is every chance that the seed will take root and grow in our children's hearts! It doesn't always happen, but on an average, it is the best chance that it will! Our education remains even if we have forgotten the text themselves. We forget so easily what was said in church or school. We never forget what happens in the home. The hate and the tension and the fighting, or the hope and the love and the peace. There are many parents who burn the candle in the night praying for one of their children who was sick. Wasn't that extraordinary? Who could ever forget that? Who could fail to be influenced by it? It's the ordinary things that make the impact on most of us, the daily effort, the daily tedious, and the repeated efforts a father or mother make separately or together to think of us and to remind us of God. It's only when somebody dies and people start looking back that the ordinary daily sacrifices take on a heroic pattern, and people say, "God, she was a great woman" or "he was a great man." If we receive God's word every day in our lives and try to live it, then we are scattering the seed ourselves for the younger generation and generations to come.

It is not the impression given that it's only parents who are expected to receive God's word and live it! I think God's call comes to us at its most personal and urgent when we are young. That's when most of us felt called to our particular vocations. That's when I felt the call to be a priest! God's word has fresh soil and a great future when it falls in a young heart. So if you are young, be generous with God. Be truthful and just and caring and good-living. Let us be faithful to our Sunday Eucharist and give it continued life throughout the week in the great commandment of love. Example: The parents of our pattern St Francis De Sales and the founder of our Congregation Fr Peter Marie Mermier, especially their mothers who sowed the seeds of God's word in their hearts when young age. Fr Peter Mermier said, about his mother that his mother was an extraordinary woman. Let us allow our hearts a fertile place to yield a rich harvest. Can we make it our personal resolutions, our greatest objectives, our life-long ambitions? Amen

I think that what we suffer in this life can never be compared to the glory, as yet unrevealed, which is waiting for us. The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his sons. It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the first-fruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

#### **Gospel Matthew** 13:1-23 ©

A sower went out to sow Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such large crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables.

He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'



Then the disciples went up to him and asked, 'Why do you talk to them in parables?' 'Because' he replied, 'the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven are revealed to you, but they are not revealed to them. For anyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. The reason I talk to them in parables is that they look without seeing and listen without hearing or understanding. So in their case this prophecy of Isaiah is being fulfilled:

You will listen and listen again, but not understand, see and see again, but not perceive.

For the heart of this nation has grown coarse, their ears are dull of hearing, and they have shut their eyes,

for fear they should see with their eyes,

hear with their ears.

understand with their heart,

and be converted

and be healed by me.

'But happy are your eyes because they see, your ears because they hear! I tell you solemnly, many prophets and holy men longed to see what you see, and never saw it; to hear what you hear, and never heard it.

'You, therefore, are to hear the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom without understanding, the evil one comes and carries off what was sown in his heart: this is the man who received the seed on the edge of the path. The one who received it on patches of rock is the man who hears the word and welcomes it at once with joy. But he has no root in him, he does not last; let some trial come, or some persecution on account of the word, and he falls away at once. The one who received the seed in thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this world and the lure of riches choke the word and so he produces nothing. And the one who received the seed in rich soil is the man who hears the word and understands it: he is the one who yields a harvest and produces now a hundredfold, now sixty, now thirty.'
