We pray for all who have lost their livelihood from the downturn in these troubled times. (Pray in silence)

We pray for the work of local conferences of the St Vincent de Paul Society, that Friday's feast of the Sacred Heart will prompt parishioners to add to their generous support. (Pray in silence)
