Pope Saint Gregory I, also known as the Great, was the Pope of the Catholic Church between 590 and 604 AD. Gregory's family was very wealthy and owned estates on the island of Sicily which provided income. Pope Gregory was famous for the emphasis he put on missionary work. He sent many people out to bring many to Jesus and into the Church. Pope Gregory made many changes to the Mass, some of which remain today, The position of the Our Father

in the Mass remains where Pope Gregory placed it.

Pope Gregory was well known for his alms to the poor, and he gave quite generously of the riches donated to the Church by the wealthy people of Rome. Everything from money to land was given to the poor in some fashion. He made clear to his subordinates that their duty was to relieve the distress faced by the poor.

When a famine struck Rome in the 590s, Pope Gregory ordered the Church to use its assets to feed the poor. At that time, the Church controlled nearly two thousand square miles of land, overseen by the clergy and used to generate income. Now, instead of selling the produce of the land, Pope Gregory ordered it shipped to Rome and given away for free. In this way, he saved thousands of people from certain death.

Saint Gregory's relics remain in St. Peter's Basilica to this day. In 1969, the Second Vatican Council moved Saint Gregory's feast day from March 12 to September 3 so it would not fall during Lent. During Lent, there are no obligatory memorials. The Eastern Orthodox Church also venerates Saint Gregory, honouring him on March 12. He is the patron saint of musicians, singers, students, and teachers.

Sunday of the Word of God

SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF GOD

A traditional family recipe: A newly married couple was beginning their first Sunday meal preparation. The young woman began preparing a wonderful roast of beef while the man was preparing the vegetables. As they worked, the man noticed that the wife sliced off both ends of the roast and then rolled

it in spiced flour. Curious, he asked, "Why did you do that?" "Do what?" "Slice the ends off the roast," he responded, "Does that make it juicier or something?"

"Well, I don't really know. Mom always does that when she cooks a roast." So they called her mother and were amused to hear that she also didn't know why the ends should be cut off the roast. It turns out it was because "your Grandmother always did that and so I do too." Of course they called Grandmother and asked. she exclaimed, "I can't believe you guys are doing that! The only reason I did that in the early years is because your Grandfather and I had only one roasting pan and it was too small for a roast big enough to feed us all."

This is the power of habit. Once we learn a pattern of behaviour, that pattern tends to rule our lives. There can be other ways of acting or thinking, but we usually give in to the pattern we already know, because it is habitual. This seems to be the problem for the scribes in today's gospel. They inherited a tradition of ritually washing their hands before meals, and they criticize Jesus' disciples for not following the practice. The scribes were not trying to cause trouble. They were simply giving a custom, a habit, more importance and authority than it deserved. The power of the habit prevented them from recognizing that other and even better ways of acting were possible.


The word of God today calls us to look at the habits, the patterns of behaviour in our own life, and to realize the power that they have over us. Certain habits might indeed be good. But there are other habits that hold us back and lessen our ability to live. I imagine that many here this morning have the habit of coming to church on the weekend. If it's Sunday, it's into the car and to St. Mary's. Now in itself that habit of coming to church is good. But we should not confuse the habit of showing up with the worship of God. What God asks of us is not simply to show up, but to be open to God's word in our lives. Being physically present in church is not the same as being open to expect God to address us, to change us, and to call us to service. But all too often the habit of coming is given equal weight with the reality of worship, and that can hold us back from growth.


Some of us might have the habit of comfort, the habit of least resistance. We find ourselves at the end of our work plopping down in front of the television set or the computer screen, and hours go by. Over the course of the week we can waste a great deal of time. We never stop to ask ourselves, "What could I accomplish if I spent that time in another way?" I could call a friend that I've been meaning to talk to. I could ask the kids how things went in school. I could exercise. I might even find a way of serving my neighbour. All of these things are real possibilities, real options for our time. But we never seize them, because the habit of inactivity, the habit of least resistance, kicks in.

Priest returned to his Parish that night and there was a letter expressing the Cardinal's (Cardinal Gilroy) delight at appointing him to Woy Woy.! A phone call to Kincumber the next day began with "Do you know who the poor beggar is ho has been appointed to Woy Woy?" On learning the news, the gentle Irish brogue expressed the words "God help you."



So began an eight year ministry in the beautiful Parish of Woy Woy after three Priests had been and gone within two years and before some seventeen Priests have been and gone since.

Father Walter Baker known to some of his fans as "Doc" greeted the new assistant Priest with great courtesy and affability, somewhat relieved one suspects that someone else had come.

Moses said to the people: "Now, Israel, hear the statutes and decrees which I am teaching you to observe, that you may live, and may enter in and take possession of the land which the LORD, the God of your fathers, is giving you. In your observance of the commandments of the LORD, your God, which I enjoin upon you, you shall not add to what I command you nor subtract from it. Gospel: Mk 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

When the Pharisees with some scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus, they observed that some of his disciples ate their meals with unclean, that is, unwashed, hands. For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews, do not eat without carefully washing their hands, keeping the tradition of the elders. And on coming from the marketplace they do not eat without purifying themselves. And there are many other things that they have traditionally observed, the purification of cups and jugs and kettles and beds. So the Pharisees and scribes questioned him, "Why do your disciples not follow the tradition of the elders but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?" He responded, "Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written: This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines human precepts. You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition." He summoned the crowd again and said to them, "Hear me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile. "From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile."
