

Dear Parishioners and well-wishers

Glory to God in the highest and peace to his people on earth... I wish each one of you and your family a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year – 2022. A heightened sense of anxiety prevails about the frailty of health and fatality of life. There is a deep longing for the true fullness of life - which is found in a life with God in whose image we have been made. This life that needs to be infused within us is His saving grace that ushers into a lasting life of peace. It is only natural that we yearn for good news; we search for a glimmer of hope; we long for the promise of a brighter future.

We meet Jesus today in all those who live in precariousness. Jesus is born poor, not because of the negativity of the innkeepers. Jesus is born poor by divine choice. Jesus is born poor to tell us who God is. Many have experienced one of the harshest years of their lives. The Christian community celebrates the joy of Christmas, going to any length of sacrifice to embrace those who suffer from the warmth of the God who cares and heals. The Voice of an angel- "Do not be afraid". The Saviour is born today, who is "Immanuel" God is with us. He would bring us glad tidings in due course of time when we are attuned to His message of hope and Love. Once again I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year – 2022.

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings glad tidings, announcing peace, bearing good news, announcing salvation, and saying to Zion, "Your God is King!" Hark! Your sentinels raise a cry, together they shout for joy, for they see directly, before their eyes, the LORD restoring Zion. Break out together in song, O ruins of Jerusalem! For the LORD comforts his people, he redeems Jerusalem. The LORD has bared his holy arm in the sight of all the nations; all the ends of the earth will behold the salvation of our God.

Brothers and sisters: In times past, God spoke in partial and various ways to our ancestors through the prophets; in these last days, he has spoken to us through the Son, whom he made heir of all things and through whom he created the universe, who is the refulgence of his glory, the very imprint of his being, and who sustains all things by his mighty word. When he had accomplished purification from sins, he took his seat at the right hand of the Majesty on high, as far superior to the angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. For to which of the angels did God ever say: *You are my son; this day I have begotten you*? Or again: *I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me*? And again, when he leads the firstborn into the world, he says: *Let all the angels of God worship him*.

Gospel: <u>Jn 1:1-18</u>

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came to be through him, and without him nothing came to be. What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came to be through him, but the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, but his own people did not accept him.
