The Gospel reading today offers us the opportunity to reflect on the importance of being honest regarding our civil responsibilities. The Pharisees make another effort to trap Jesus by asking him a question about paying taxes to Caesar. They want to create problems and force Jesus into agreeing with them on matters relating to religious traditions and civic duties. However, Jesus provides a counter-balance to the argument and instead gives them a lesson in honesty and transparency. This Gospel reading can teach us about the need to fulfil our responsibilities towards the civil society in which we live and about the significance of the sacred. What are the essential duties that we need to fulfil in the communities where we live? How do we, who are made in God's image and likeness, give to God what belongs to God? Using the gifts God has given us to respect and value life is one way we may begin this process.

You Belong to God

Jesus lived the whole of his life in an occupied country. The Romans were probably not such an immediate presence in Galilee, leaving its control to their puppet king Herod Antipas, but their presence in Jerusalem was much more evident, their main garrison being attached to the Temple Mount, much to the chagrin of the Jews. The question put to Jesus by the Pharisees, who were no lovers of the Romans, was devious. If Jesus says the Roman taxes should be paid, he can be accused of being a traitor to his country. If he says they should not be paid, he can be accused of being a rebel and handed over to the Roman authorities.

As ever, Jesus avoids the direct answer and takes the question to another level. The story of Cyrus, who freed the Jews from their exile in Babylon, is just one good example from biblical history of how God makes use of Gentiles for the good of God's people. Jesus, however, uses the Roman coin to make a distinction we would think of today as that between the secular and the spiritual. The head on the coin is that of Caesar, so give him back his coin. But we are made in the image and likeness of God, and that is what we should be paying attention to.

Our identity is intimately bound up with God. What does that mean? In the book of Genesis it says God made human beings in God's own image and likeness, "male and female he created them". The first element in our identity is being male and female. It does not say whether this is a statement about our separate identities as male or female or whether each of us is to consider the male and female elements within ourselves. It is certainly an appeal for us to use our male and female qualities to work together to imitate God in His creativity.

Here is the second element of our identity with God. God hands over to us the stewardship of the world and asks us to carry out that stewardship as creatively as God has demonstrated Himself. This is initially illustrated by our being asked to name all that surrounds us, the plants, the animals, the natural world. In modern ecology we are discovering the full depth of this responsibility, a sensitivity more often held by other traditions. A Maori, for example, in asking where you come from, will ask you to tell the name of your mountain and your river. God is creator and sustainer, God is healer and inspirer. God loves this world and loves us. Our challenge is to discover whether we can love in the same way as God loves.

Heart-Broken Love

Jesus spoke frequently of his "hour," the culmination of his life's work, and this hour coincides with his cross. In what is perhaps the most disturbing mystery of the New Testament, this macabre glorification through crucifixion is not simply the result of evil human choices; it is also willed by the one whom Jesus called "Abba, Father." Somehow, it is the deepest purpose of the Incarnation; somehow it is why he was sent.

And therefore the assault on death was the ultimate mission of the Son of God. There could be no place untouched by the divine mercy, no refuge from the press of God's relentless love. Because the Son has gone to the limits of godforsakenness, we run from the Father only to find ourselves, at the end of our running, in the arms of the Son.

As a parent would go anywhere in order to rescue his child, so God, the parent of the human race, went into the darkest reaches of body and soul in order to save us. And therefore this is the meaning of the cross: God is heart-broken love.
