#### The Test of Time

o we view an episode in the Gospels as the whole story of Jesus' relationship with a person or just a chapter, albeit very significant, in that story? At the end of today's Gospel, the rich man went away sad. It was step too far for him at that moment to sell everything he owned and follow Jesus. But was that the end of the story of this man's relationship with Jesus? Did he die a rich and unhappy man?

There is much in this story to give us hope that at a certain moment he did manage to let go of his attachment to wealth and give himself totally to following Jesus. Firstly, he was clearly a very good man who faithfully kept all the commandments. He was also a seeker.

Somehow or other he knew that keeping the commandments, while important, was not the whole picture. Something was lacking. And thirdly, he didn't say 'no' to Jesus' request. He simply went away sad, perhaps to ponder Jesus' words, and Jesus' loving gaze which surely touched him deeply. His initial conviction that Jesus was a 'Good Master' remained.

A 'yes' given on the spot is often a superficial 'yes' that doesn't survive the test of time. We have all had the experience of having something huge asked of us, and finding it difficult, if not impossible, to say 'yes'. We needed time to process the request, to understand its implications and whether we can do it, before giving a heartfelt assent. This was quite possibly also the case with the rich man in today's Gospel.

riends, I want to say something about our becoming disciples in God's family. Once we make the decision to follow Jesus, then every other claimant to supremacy must fall away. As I've argued many times before, every one of us has something or some set of values that we consider greatest. Perhaps it is money, material things, power, or the esteem of others. Perhaps it is your family, your kids, your wife, your husband.

None of this is false, and none of these things are bad. But when you place any of them in the absolute center of gravity, things go awry. When you make any of them your ultimate or final good, your spiritual life goes haywire. When you attach yourself to any of them with an absolute tenacity, you will fall apart. Only when we make Christ the cornerstone of our lives are we truly ready for mission. Keep in mind that every encounter with God in the Bible conduces to mission, to being sent to do the work of the Lord. If we try to do this work while we are stuck to any number of attachments, we will fail. Period.

#### He Sees Us

Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him. In this statement, as so often in the Gospels, we understand that Jesus sees with his eyes, with his heart and with his soul. Jesus can see beyond the surface, to the true nature and intentions of others - whether he is addressing the Pharisees as hypocrites or describing Nathanial as a "man without guile". Jesus saw the piety of the young man, his good intentions, his naiveté and his conflicted heart. So here, echoing Psalm 33, the eyes of the Lord are on those who fear [respect] him. And the gaze of the Lord is benign. Jesus challenges the young man to the next level of faith - letting go of the idea he can earn his own salvation; he must abandon his wealth - his security - to rely more radically on the power of God to save. Here, as elsewhere, the benign gaze of the Lord discerns, and seeks to help, those willing to accept the will of God. The young man went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth; but even as all his material needs were met, his spirit was hungry. Jesus held up, as it were, a mirror to his spiritual emptiness.

The gaze of the Lord is benign, just as it is also discerning: the Lord sees us just as we are, in our weakness and in our loveliness, in our failure and in our success. So, we do not fear the scrutiny of the Lord - we know his gaze is a loving gaze, seeking to know us, to affirm us, and to save us. Our familiarity with the four Gospels sometimes dulls our perception of the radical nature of the teaching of Jesus - "he looked steadily at the young man and loved him". The Lord who can see us to the deepest level of our being still loves us! The gaze of the Lord is benign, discerning, and challenging. When we see ourselves through his eyes, we see what is beautiful, what is in his image, and also what is in need of forgiveness. So, knowing we are in this gaze, we are challenged to become our better self, to become the holy people we are created to be. Just as the gaze of God is benign, discerning and challenging, it is also saving - we are not simply passive recipients of a passing glance of the Almighty - we are drawn further into a relationship that saves us, makes us whole, welcomes us into heaven. How wonderful this is!

The all-seeing eye of God is for our benefit. If we can live knowing that we have a God who watches over us, wills us constantly to be wonderful, forgives us when we fail, inspires us when we don't know our next step, encourages us to be a better neighbour, wants us to walk in the footsteps of Jesus - then little by little, day by day, our life will be transformed. In practical terms, we can audit our efforts, track our progress - even if it is just for one week - we can watch, notice and even record how we behave consciously, in the benign, discerning, challenging and saving gaze of God.

Being in the watchful, all-seeing eye of God is not a solitary experience - we are conscious of being in a community, a communion of people whom the Lord is seeking to shape into a body that testifies to God's love, that is a light to the nations, an inspiration to all.
