

The Source

What is the source of our hoping, our believing? It is the reality that 'the Lord comes' according to today's psalm. Whatever the situation we find ourselves in, the Lord comes into it with us. Jesus experienced betrayal, even by those close to him; he knew hatred. From his experience of human reality, which is also our reality, he asks us to trust in him when we experience betrayal or hatred of whatever kind. Today he calls us for he 'comes' and is always coming, to encourage us towards a new spirit of endurance, believing that with him we 'win' our lives.

The end is near, Jesus points out, reminding us of the temporary nature of our life on earth, and all the things that make up our lives. The Communion antiphon captures the essence of today's readings and liturgy: 'To be near God is my happiness, to place my hope in God the Lord.' Whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you will receive, and it shall be given to you', says the Lord, for I come, helping you to live joyfully and endure with me.

Stand Firm

The Jews were completely attached to the temple of Jerusalem. The temple was utterly destroyed by the Romans in 70AD. This event had disoriented them. They even felt that it was the end of the world. Luke uses this imagery to focus on the end times, in his eschatological discourse. This is the chief message that there will be distrust, disharmony, destruction, trouble, violence and even persecution, not only from outside but from your own also. But Jesus actually instils in us hope; he assures us that we will not perish. He exhorts us to stand firm and believe that he is with us, even though it may seem that all is lost.

A Place for Sleeping

The Church, through its maternal granting of indulgences, teaches us to visit cemeteries. In November particularly we are encouraged to pray for the dead. (In the first week of November you may obtain one plenary indulgence each day, which is applied to a soul in Purgatory - that is to say, that soul most definitely leaves Purgatory and enters Heaven - if we visit a cemetery and pray there for the dead. The other days of the year, the indulgence is partial, not plenary.)

Of course, we must fulfill the usual conditions for the granting of an indulgence: a whole-hearted detachment from all sin, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, and, within a reasonable time (one to two weeks before or after), making a sacramental Confession and receiving Communion.

The word "cemetery" means "place for sleeping" (from the Greek verb for sleeping, *koimaō*). It was never applied to pagan graveyards but rather coined specifically for the graveyards of Christians and Jews who believed in the resurrection of the dead.

We must learn to see Christian "sleeping places" in this way. They must come to appear to us in a certain way. They are not dreary places of hopelessness and annihilation. - "She is not dead, but sleeping." (Luke 8:52)

Rather, they are places of anticipation, of assurance of the quick passing of this world. The bodies there, the remains, are as if longing to be called from their tombs, like Lazarus.

A cemetery is a holy place, an extension of a church, the hard-won ground of many battles, a democracy of the Christian dead, a nexus of reckoning, and a rebuke and affront ("Let me go back and warn my brothers" (*Luke 16:28*). To a pagan it is merely spooky; to a Christian, it is a visible and tangible mystery.

World Day of the Poor

Pope Leo XIV has declared this Sunday to be the ninth World Day of the Poor, with the theme of "You are my hope," taken from the Psalmist's cry "You, O Lord, are my hope" (*Ps 71:5*).

In his message the Holy Father urges us to recognise those experiencing poverty as "witnesses to a strong and steadfast hope, precisely because they embody it in the midst of uncertainty, poverty, instability and marginalisation."

The poor are not a distraction for the Church, but our beloved brothers and sisters, for by their lives, their words and their wisdom, they put us in contact with the truth of the Gospel.

Communion Under Both Kinds

Bishop Anthony has instructed that in Broken Bay Diocese from the Feast of Christ the King (23 November) each parish will make Communion under both kinds available at each Mass celebration. We will slowly introduce this with 1 chalice only at this stage.

Those wishing to receive the Chalice need to line up on the left-hand aisle for the Host then go to the left to receive the Chalice. As is the church custom the minister will give you the Chalice to consume a small amount of the Precious Blood and then you will hand it back to the minister.

N.B. After the minister says 'The Body of Christ', or 'The Blood of Christ' we reply with: 'Amen'.

A reminder that the church allows us to receive the Host either on the hand or on the tongue. If receiving on the hand, please place your hand well out in front of you for the minister to place the host upon. If receiving on the tongue, please open your mouth wide enough and place your tongue out so that the minister does not contaminate their hand with saliva.
